Neil Etherington



At the time of his passing in March this year Neil was one of our longest serving members, with his membership spanning some 67 years. Neil joined the Club in the 1941/42 season gaining his Qualifying Certificate that season and Bronze Medallion in 1942/43. Remaining an Active member until 1951/52, Active Reserve until 1982/83 (until 1980/81 Active Reserve was generally a non patrolling category) then Long Serving until his death.

In 1978 he met a couple of old mates who took him for a ride in the Jet boat (fully clothed) and Neil's active involvement was reinvigorated, gaining his ARC and JRB Drivers Certificate that season. Neil served as Cap and Costume Steward 1943/44 – 1944/45 and as Assistant Instructor 1944/45 before joining the Air Force, returning to beach patrols when his service finished. He patrolled with the jet boat section which he captained for 3 seasons 1981/82 to 1983/84. Neil has been awarded his 25 year National Patrol Service Award and the 25, 50 and 60 year Long Service Award. Neil was also awarded the Royal Shipwreck Relief and Humane Society (NSW) Bronze Medal and Certificate for a rescue he performed at the beach on 11th December 1941 as a 14 year old Cadet in his first season with the Club. Neil was having a day off school and having lunch with his Auntie at the beach, which was closed due to dangerous conditions, when he noticed 2 men in difficulties in the water. Donning a belt he swam out to the first man putting the belt on him and then brought the second man to shore unaided. The reel and line was 'manned' by the local baker who was passing at the time, Mrs Nora Mawson (a member of the Ladies Swimming Club) and his Auntie. He was awarded his Medal by the State Governor's Representative on 13 May 1942. Retiring to Sussex Inlet with his wife Wilma, he immediately joined the local Royal Volunteer Coast Guard with whom he patrolled as driver and crew for many years.

We offer our sincere condolences to his family.

Tom left his native Scotland as a 17 year old and sailed to Australia with the Big Brother Movement. In due course he became a Medical Representative for

Roche Products and settled in Cromer. In the Annual Report of 1964-65 the Hon Secretary Barrie Pitt wrote under Domestic Competition: "we saw a new face as Race Secretary in Tom Higgins. Tom introduced a whole new concept to our Sunday Morning events which was very much appreciated by all our members. Upwards of 60 members competed regularly, and enjoyed the wide variety of events which he devised." At the start of each race Tom announced handicaps straight out of his head which resulted in hilarious banter from the competitors. This was a lot of fun.

Tom initiated a weekly report on Club activities Manly to Palm Beach which was published by the Manly Daily. This grew into a column in the Sunday Telegraph covering Surf Life Saving Sydney wide. Naturally affairs at Dee Why were well reported. Displaying his wonderful congeniality Tom was the consummate Raffle Ticket seller when we used to raid the shoppers in Pittwater Road on Saturday Mornings. Tom lost a battle with cancer at 79. Our sincere condolences Dymity, his wife of 56 years, and their extended family.

Prominent Service

Janine Portelli

Janine joined the club in 2003 as a nipper parent. Since that time she has been very involved in many areas of the club, often holding multiple positions during the same season. She has been an Age Manager, Junior Club Treasurer, BBQ Coordinator, Nipper Carnival Official and most recently Uniform Shop Coordinator – a position she has held for the past 5 years.

This season Janine gained her First Aid certificate and has patrolled on a regular basis. She helps with carnivals whether it be officiating or catering – both at Dee Why and other clubs, is involved in the Junior Development Camps and Orange exchange program, helps with events at Dee Why beach such as Surf Swims, Fun Runs, Pub to Pub, Australia Day celebrations etc. and is always available to help with club social events.

Adrienne Lowe



Adrienne obtained her Bronze Medallion at Dee Why on 8 December 2002 and has performed 637.25 hours on patrols and as a Patrol Captain. Adrienne has 84 awards including four Silver Medallions for Life Support (2003), IRB Driver (2003), Patrol Captain (2004) and Beach Management (2004). She is qualified as a Training Officer for Advanced Resuscitation (2003), Bronze Medallion (2005), Advanced Resuscitation Techniques (2010) and Advanced Resuscitation Techniques AID (2014) and as a Facilitator in Spinal Management (2012) and Basic Beach Management (2012). Adrienne has been recognised by Surf Life Saving Australia at the National Leaders Conference in 2010 and as the National Assessor of the Year in 2013.

Adrienne has held positions in the club of Assistant Chief Instructor (2004-2005), Chief Instructor (2005 – 2007), and Club President (2007- 2010). She was awarded the Jock Ewing Trophy for the Senior Club Member of the Year in 2005. She is currently the Director of Education and Assessment for Sydney Northern Beaches Branch.

Adrienne has provided countless hours of training, assessing and facilitating for the club. She has been a competition official for the club mainly in the Life Saving Events (Champion Life Saver, Patrol Competition and First Aid Competition). She has also been a successful competitor for the club winning a state silver medal in the Patrol Competition in 2005, five state medals in First Aid Competitions between 2011 -2015 and a Bronze medal at Aussies 2015.

Matt Molina



Matt joined the club as a nipper parent in 2005. He gained his Bronze Medallion in 2006 and has patrolled in excess of 22 hours each year for most years since that time. Some of the many other awards he has obtained include ARTC, IRB Crew and Driver, Spinal Management and First Aid. Some of the other awards she has achieved include First Aid, ARTC, Patrol Captain, IRB Crew, Spinal Managements, and Training Officer Bronze Medallion.

Over the years of her membership she has been a Patrol Member at Dee Why beach where she patrolled an average of 50 hours during the 13+ years of her patrolling history. She also patrolled at Surfcom. She was Dee Why SLSC's tenth female patrol member.



Rowena has held many positions in Dee Why Surf Club some of which included Club Vice-Captain, Assistant Chief Instructor, Nipper Age Manager, Junior Education Advisor, March Past Coach, SRC and Bronze Trainer and Examiner. 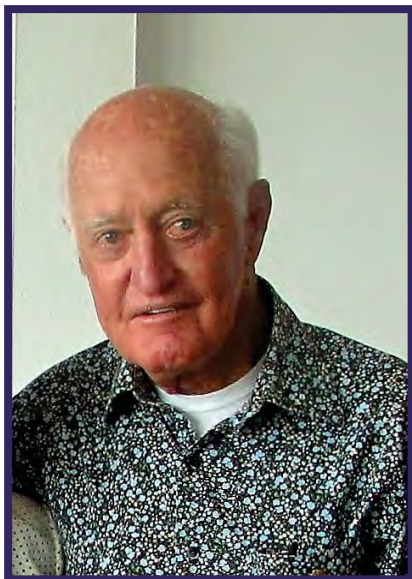

Barry Cardiff was born in 1937. He has lived in Dee why for 76 years and joined Dee Why SLSC during the 1951/1952 season. He is married to Vee and has two sons. He worked at St Augustine's College, Brookvale for 27 years initially as Sports Master then obtained second degree in Pastoral Care, and retired in 2012. He is a Life member of St Augustine's College Sports Club.

Barry is a foundation member of Dee Why Ice Picks and Dee Why Surfing Fraternity.

During the years of his membership at Dee Why SLSC he gained many awards including Qualifying Certificate in 1951/52; Bronze Medallion in 1953/54; Long Serving Member in 1985/88; 50 year Long Serving member in 1992/93; Bronze instructor certificate in 1992/93. - Officiated at Sydney Morning Herald MH 2 km Swim Race; Officiated at Fun Run Sydney Morning Herald from Dee Why to Manly;
- As Race Secretary organised Sunday morning events for competition in a variety of skills related to lifesaving ie, swim, craft and sand events
- Maintained a point score base related to annual awards night.
- Conducted annual club championship events in all disciplines for specific member groups ie juniors/seniors.
- In 1984 when the Coolangatta Gold was first introduced as an Iron Man event, it spurred him on to start thinking how Dee Why could do a similar event on a small scale at the Surf club. In 1987 he introduced the Clark Kent Cup to the club using the four disciplines, swimming, cycling, running and paddling with the winner being crowned "Clark Kent/ Superman". The other category winners were Jimmy Olsen/Junior, Perry White/active reserve and Lois Lane/female. The annual event continued until 2003
- Along with the Clark Kent Cup, other special events such as President's Trophy, Club R & R, and Peter McKenzie Trophy, were all the responsibility of the Race Secretary of the day.
- Introduced and promoted for 5 years the Silver Swans dinners with special guest speakers,
- Was a member of the Centenary Committee and involved in the production of the 100 year book and assisted with the promotion and sales for such at various venues eg the Grand and Australian Day and is still involved in sales of the book

President's Report

It gives me great pleasure to present the Annual Report for 2015 – 2016 to the 103rd Annual General Meeting of the Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club.

It has been an honour to serve the club as your President for the last twelve months. I have been privileged to have the support of an enthusiastic and dedicated Committee of Management who have in the last year done so much to advance the objects of our Association.

The activities of the Club continued well after the end of the season. On Sunday 5 June 2016, cyclonic conditions, fuelled by a massive low pressure area off the East Coast, hit the Sydney Northern beaches, in particular Narrabeen and Collaroy. Dee Why was not spared. During the high tide on Sunday night, the waves came over the embankment in front of the Club, tearing up the wooden walkway and smashing it into the Club's roller door. Hugh Long, our resident Deputy President, sent an email saying, "It is 2:55am and every fire alarm in the Swan Lounge had gone off and there are problems with the lights." Volunteers from Dee Why, including Matt Molina, Ron Tyson, Sam and Tom Serisier and others, attended the worst hit areas being Collaroy and Narrabeen.

A working party was also arranged to clear the sand from the front of the clubhouse on the following Saturday. This storm is probably the worst to hit Dee Why beach since the Promenade, now the Ted Jackson Reserve, was destroyed in 1998.

Other big surf conditions during the year required members of the Club to perform rescues under difficult circumstances. One of most notable was the rescue by Ron Tyson's patrol on 20 April 2016, which involved a major spinal injury. Peter Hatfield's patrol on New Year's Day performed a mass rescue with the support of the lifeguards and other members of the Club who happened to be on the beach. A well-publicised rescue by Jay Yeomans occurred at South Curl Curl beach in the early part of the season. There was also a near drowning in the Dee Why Rock Pool. The pool rescue and South Curl Curl rescue received considerable publicity in The Manly Daily.

It was certainly a difficult season and the Club is to be congratulated, not only in the way it responded to the challenges at Dee Why, but in assisting other clubs whose beaches were more badly affected than our own.

The Club is again proud to report that there was no loss of life on the patrolled areas at Dee Why

Beach this season.

The Club's primary object is to provide patrols for Dee Why Beach. The Club regards competition as a secondary objective designed to promote and encourage participation in patrol activities. The Club does not support Surf Life Saving Australia's new initiatives for elite sportspeople and recreational sportspeople to be members of the Club with reduced proficiency and patrolling obligations.

A total of twenty-two competitors from Dee Why competed at the Aussies 2016 Open and Youth Championships. Our most successful competitor was Geoff Horner who won a silver medal in the Board Riding competition. Our boat crews performed well. Four members of our Club Harrison Crowley, Charlie Mowbray, Reuben Sharma and Louis Mitchell competed well in the Youth Championships. Adrienne Lowe and I won Bronze medals at Branch and State but "lost" a patient at Aussies resulting in a 6th place.

President's Report

Several club members including Anthony Molina, Jack-Henry Bryant and Madi Quinn competed in the Coolangatta Gold. Madi won an individual Silver medal in her age category in the short course and we had three teams in the Opens and Masters. Anthony and Jack-Henry (a team of two) placed third.

The Club also competed at the East Coast Masters, and the State and Branch carnivals. Marg Roberts has done a great job this year with the carnival entries and organising the competitors.

Training, education and assessment has always been a significant feature of our Club. This season our Chief Training Officer Matt Molina and his team of eleven instructors put through ninety-nine candidates for Bronze, SRC, ARTC, radio operators and IRB drivers and crew awards.

Greg Punch is also to be commended for his role as an announcer, particularly at the Aussies where he called some of the major events.

The nippers and their parents make up the majority membership of our Club. Matt Molina, Warren Hannam and Cam Wylie again provided many hours of coaching, training and as competition officials. A special thanks to Warren who continued on in his role as Nipper Coordinator notwithstanding a significant spinal injury in the surf.

Congratulations to Zizo Ayoub, a young man on a mission. He was born in Jordan and only became a nipper last season. He is Sydney Northern Beaches, 2016 Junior Life Saver of the Year.

For four days over the Australia Day Long Weekend

the Orange Bush Nippers came to Dee Why for the annual BBM Junior Development Camp. They generously reciprocated by inviting the Dee Why to stay at Orange. Mark Hodges presented the Club with a certificate of appreciation for the Club's support of the Orange nippers and patrolling members.

Dee Why ran the nipper Over the Hill challenge with North Curl Curl. For the nippers, Dee Why also held the Bennett Board Classic on 25 October and the Youth Fast Fives board carnival run by Matt Molina on 13 December.

In respect of the Branch sponsors we would like to recognise Unilever trading as Streets Ice Cream and Lipton's Ice Tea, Dee Why RSL, URM, Westfield Warringah Mall, Cancer Institute NSW, Bill Buckle Auto Group and RFI Group. URM were the Club's existing waste disposal provider who are now offering these services as part of the sponsorship with Branch.

The Warringah Lifeguards also performed with great professionalism in conjunction with our patrolling members. The Club would like to acknowledge Scott Mortimer, David Hooper, Josh Wall, Madison Quinn, Cameron Bealey, Emma Jeffcoat, and Steve Downman as well as Clinton Rose and Tim Donkin, many of whom are or were members of the Club.

The season has been a very successful one. Thank you to our Club Captain Ben Davies and our 188 patrolling members on their vigilance and service and the fine manner in which our patrols were conducted.

For the Future

Ten years ago, when I first prepared my report for the annual general meeting in 2006, I had little guidance to what was expected and used earlier reports to gain some idea of what should be said. The reports of earlier presidents proved invaluable and, as far as I am aware, I received no criticism of the two reports I prepared in 2006 and 2007.

Things have now changed and Surf Life Saving NSW has provided a detailed statement called Annual Report Guidelines for 2015-2016 as to what should be contained in an annual report and how to comply with government requirements in relation to charitable fundraising

and the acknowledgement of government and commercial organisations that support Surf Life Saving. I have endeavoured to do that in a separate report, which I have prepared with the other members of the Sponsorship Committee, Peter Hatfield, Matt Molinia and David Lang.

Looking forward to the 2016-2017 season, there are seven areas on which the Club should continue to build which have been key aspects of the Club's administration for the last several years.

1. Education and training has been an important feature of our Club in recent years. In 2015, at the Branch Awards of Excellence night, Matt Molinia received the award for Trainer of the Year and the Club received the award for the Most Outstanding Club in Training and Education as well as being the Most Outstanding Club of the 21 Sydney Northern Beaches clubs. This season Matt Molinia has continued his excellent work as Chief Training Officer. At the June committee meeting, Matt put forward a proposal that the job formerly done by the CTO should be split in three with the CTO attending to administration and new positions of Training Coordinator and Proficiency Coordinator. In that way this onerous job, requiring as it does the entry and updating of all the awards in the Club, can be spread among the three willing workers. Matt is also to be congratulated on taking on the additional responsibility of the Branch Sports Advisor.

2. The Club has implemented and adopted policies in relation to social media and online services. The Club has been extremely fortunate to have Emily Buckle as a member. She has not only updated our web page but undertaken a review of the Club's eleven Facebook pages that are currently in operation as well as establishing Twitter and Instagram accounts. There have been a number of issues for older members of the Club having access to online registration through the Surf Life Saving Australia online

portals. Emily has kindly offered to review the interaction between the Club's online and registration facilities with those of Surf Life Saving Australia.

3. The management committee this year was keen to establish a physical office presence at the clubhouse one morning on the weekends and one morning during the week. To carry out this objective, an administrator has been appointed who has assisted the Club with the Cash Housie obligations to Dee Why RSL this year. Next season the administrator should report to the new management committee on proposals for an administrative presence within the clubhouse and by telephone and online. The Club hopes to streamline any membership or other enquiries, leaving the members of the Management Committee with more time to fulfil other strategic objects for the Club.
4. The focus on youth retention has in recent years been an objective of the Club. Plans are now in progress for the Youth Room inspired by the After Dark program that was presented to the Club two seasons ago by Zack Dibben and Jessica Cotterill. The youth retention program is intended to take advantage of the old training room, giving our younger members a space to call their own. As part of the youth retention program, the Orange Bush Nippers have been instrumental in providing another source of youth involvement both in their activities at Dee Why Beach and inviting the younger members of the Club to participate in their activities in the City of Orange. A third element of the youth retention program has been in the Life Saving Events, particularly the Champion Life Saver and Patrol Competition and the First Aid Competition. These events should appeal to younger members of the Club with all round ability in surf life saving as well as elite athletes in the water and on the sand. The fourth area is the sharing of venues by the Club at Dee Why and the Mid North Coast Branch at Tacking Point and Port Macquarie organised by Rowena Clarke.
5. The fifth area is the appointment of senior members of the Club to a Betty Barry Room committee or similar. The objects of the committee are to address the presentation of the photographs and other memorabilia in the Betty Barry Room, decide whether the room should be carpeted or refurnished, to look after the Honour Boards in the Club's entrance and to advise the Club on the preservation and retention of its records, photographs and other items that have been collected by or donated to the Club over many years.
6. The Building and Development Committee has been revived in the last two years.

Headed by Susan Sky, the committee has a number of members who have expertise in various professional areas that should contribute to the redevelopment of the Swan Lounge and Northern Training Room. Susan Sky and Jacqui McLeod have experience in town planning, Jeff Tucker is experienced in property development, through AMP and Landcom, and there are two lawyers on the committee, Jenny Graves and myself, as well as the past Club President, Adrienne Lowe, who make up the committee. Recently, the state government, through our local member, the Honourable Mike Baird, announced secure leaseholds for all clubs on Crown land. As part of that announcement, a template was also put in place for commercial development on Surf Club sites that has opened the door for our Club to approach the Northern Beaches Local Government area administrator, Mr Dick Persson, and General Manager, Mr Mark Ferguson, to renew the Club's interest in a redevelopment of the first storey of the clubhouse as a commercial venture. These plans have been on foot for many years, with the goal posts moving each time the committee approaches an in principle proposal with Council. As council elections are not expected until September 2017, the Club has a window of opportunity with the new administrator before the new council is elected.

7. The Club also anticipates providing wider community involvement. I have referred already in this report to the various activities that the Club has been involved in, including the Pub2Pub with Brookvale Rotary and the Fairfax Sun Run. One of the important organisations that has arisen out of the activities from Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club is TIPS (Trauma Incident Peer Support). Trish Newton and Steve Haggett have been particularly involved in this organisation and last year represented TIPS at an international trauma conference in Boston. From its small beginnings in Dee Why, TIPS has become internationally recognised and provides

invaluable service to those members of the Surf Life Saving movement traumatised by the rescues we are often asked to perform.

The future for the Club is bright. We hope to encourage our young members to stay with Surf Life Saving and to promote the objects and aspirations of the Surf Life Saving movement.

Social Media Report

The 2015/16 season saw the creation of a new position for Social Media Coordinator on the Club's Management Committee. I was both delighted and daunted to be the first person appointed to this role.

Building and Development Sub Committee

The purpose of the Sub-committee is to prepare a Strategic plan for Building and Development over the next five years.

The inaugural meeting was held on 24 September 2015 and has since met three times and a meeting was held with Senior Officers of Warringah Council on 29 September 2015.

The Club, unlike many other NSW surf clubs, has a Deed of Grant with council. The deed is a key factor in establishing the unique position of DYSLSC as not being lessees of Crown/Council land but having an equitable interest recognizing the land swap which established the clubhouse on its current location.

Since at least 1994 various proposals have been explored to create a revenue stream from parts of the building, especially those areas currently made available as public halls for community events and private functions.

The NSW government has in the past twelve months developed a new policy in regard to commercial activities on surf club sites, recognizing this as a means to assist with funding the functions of surf clubs.

As Warringah Council is now dissolved and a new Northern Beaches Council is in formation, the process of exploring opportunities for the use of the clubhouse will require a new approach.

The Subcommittee's next step in preparing the Strategic Plan is to explore the potential for commercial activities, including costs of various building works, together with an assessment of the future needs of club members for use of the building that would benefit from improved facilities.

Finances

Trust Funds

Since 1975 when the late Frank Conroy established an anonymous donor fund, the club has been the beneficiary of a number of bequests. Committees of the day have nominated these funds outside of general income either by virtue of conditions attached or a desire to provide for the long term future of the club.

Frank Conroy Scholarship

At the time of his initial donation, Frank expressed the wish that the funds be established to help junior members improve their competitive abilities. To date, grants have been made to junior members to assist in subsidising their costs on professional instruction. In his will Frank hoped, without binding the club, that the funds should continue in this vein. To ensure that Frank's scholarship continues to support junior members, the committee decided to put some restraints on the monies. It was decided:

- Only the annual interest accrued on the capital be allocated for assistance
- Candidates are chosen through selection criteria laid down by the junior and senior club committees.

James MacLachlan Fund

Jim MacLachlan was an associate member of the club from 1955 who on his death in 1981 provided for us as a beneficiary in his estate. No specific conditions were attached to the grant. The funds have been invested and the income has been applied at certain times to defray costs of the club patrol efficiency competition.

Betty Barry Memorial Scholarship Fund

The Betty Barry fund was established by the then Ladies Auxiliary to remember the contribution of their late President and Life Member. The club now administers the fund in similar terms and conditions to the Frank Conroy Scholarship..

Notes of the Financial Statements

Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc.

For the year ended 30 April 2016

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows

AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 1031 Materiality

AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards

AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Plant and Equipment and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Financial Instruments

Recognition, initial measurement and derecognition

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below. Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- loans and receivables
- financial assets at Fair Value Through Profit or Loss (FVTPL)
- Held-To-Maturity (HTM) investments
- Available-For-Sale (AFS) financial assets

All financial assets except for those at FVTPL are subject to review for impairment at least at each reporting date to identify whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. Different criteria to determine impairment are applied for each category of financial assets, which are described below.

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs or finance income, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Association's trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments.

Individually significant receivables are considered for impairment when they are past due or when other objective evidence is received that a specific counterparty will default. Receivables that are not considered to be individually impaired are reviewed for impairment in groups, which are determined by reference to the industry and region of a counterparty and other shared credit risk characteristics. The impairment loss estimate is then based on recent historical counterparty default rates for each identified group.

Financial assets at FVTPL

Financial assets at FVTPL include financial assets that are either classified as held for trading or that meet certain conditions and are designated at FVTPL upon initial recognition. Assets in this category are measured at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss. The fair values of financial assets in this category are determined by reference to active market transactions or using a valuation technique where no active market exists.

HTM investments

HTM investments are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturity other than loans and receivables. Investments are classified as HTM if the Association has the intention and ability to hold them until maturity. The Association currently holds long term deposits designated into this category. HTM investments are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

If there is objective evidence that the investment is impaired, determined by reference to external credit ratings, the financial asset is measured at the present value of estimated future cash flows. Any changes to the carrying amount of the investment, including impairment losses, are recognised in profit or loss.

AFS financial assets

AFS financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that are either designated to this category or do not qualify for inclusion in any of the other categories of financial assets. The Association's AFS financial assets include listed securities.

All AFS financial assets are measured at fair value. Gains and losses are recognised in other comprehensive income and reported within the AFS reserve within equity, except for impairment losses and foreign exchange differences on monetary assets, which are recognised in profit or loss. When the asset is disposed of or is determined to be impaired the cumulative gain or loss recognised in other comprehensive income

Finances

is reclassified from the equity reserve to profit or loss and presented as a reclassification adjustment within other comprehensive income. Interest calculated using the effective interest method and dividends are recognised in profit or loss within 'revenue'.

Reversals of impairment losses for AFS debt securities are recognised in profit or loss if the reversal can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised. For AFS equity investments impairment reversals are not recognised in profit or loss and any subsequent increase in fair value is recognised in other comprehensive income.

Classification and subsequent measurement of financial liabilities

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payable.

Financial liabilities are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, except for financial liabilities held for trading or designated at FVTPL, that are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss.

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

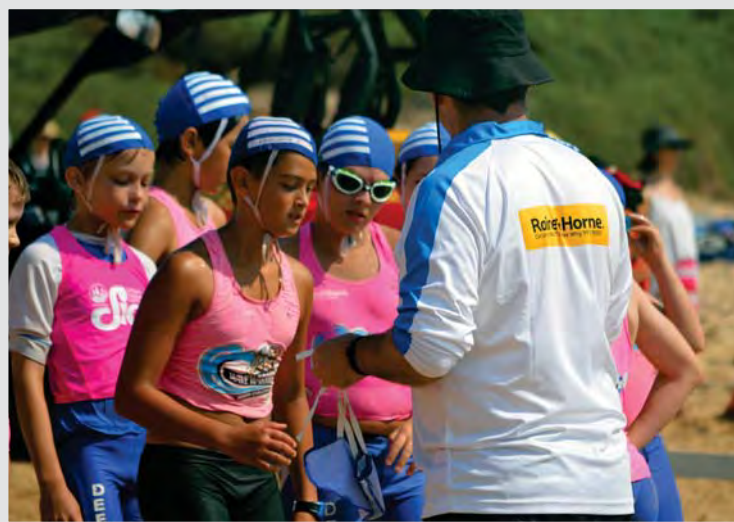
Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

Inventories

Inventories comprises goods for resale at no or nominal consideration as part of the Association's charitable activities. Inventories may be purchased or received by way of donation.

Goods for resale

Inventories of goods for resale are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.



Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

Training and Education Report

Our focus at Dee Why has always been on the quality of training and the improvement of our members. This season in excess of 100 awards were attained by Dee Why members in courses run at Dee Why and approximately 20 more awards in Branch run courses. We are constantly improving the skill set in our existing members and hence building stronger patrols.

Courses:

Our younger members are the future of our club and with our numbers growing for our SRC course run over the October long weekend, patrol numbers and sustainability has improved. For the second year now, run in parallel with the SRC course on the October long weekend was the SRC to Bronze update course. This shows the number of youth members staying with the club and continuing to patrol putting the future of the club in good stead.

Some of our bronze courses ran several weeks over time this season, not because of the group training but due to conditions. Several assessments were cancelled or moved due to closed beaches. To their credit the training groups stuck with it and went through, the extra time only improving on their abilities and confidence.

Herve committed to long shifts on the jet ski patrolling his region and ready for emergency response. Not only did Herve take on this massive responsibility but he also managed to commit to all his patrols at Dee Why and when called upon would sub or volunteer on a patrol when needed

The way forward:

After three seasons in the Chief Instructor position, as many of my predecessors have noted before me, and with the increased requirements for paperwork due to being an RTO the position is beyond being sustainable for a single individual. A trial proposal has been initiated where the Chief instructor position has been split into 3 departments in order to manage the load. The CTO position is ultimately responsible for the management of administration, courses and proficiencies and working in with the Branch and other departments including Nippers and Patrolling. The Training advisor position manages all training courses, including trainer and assessor allocation, ensuring all candidates receive their awards. The Proficiency Advisor works closely with the Club captain to ensure all patrolling members are given a fair opportunity to become proficient. I believe this new format will encourage new enthusiasm in the CTO position and possibly more continuity and longevity in the position as opposed to it being a position that is avoided due to the massive work load.

Boat Report

In my first year, proudly as Boat Captain of DY SLSC, I put forward the Surfboat report for season 2015/16.

The pre season preparations kick started well, with training commencing during mid August with 3 crews. One Open Mens, one Reserve Mens and one new Junior crew (recruited by Tommy Wilson) began preparing for what was expected to be a long and exciting season, with the National and State Titles being shifted back by one month from previous seasons. Sadly by Christmas the new junior crew faced with School/study and other recreational activities found it hard to meet the consistency required to stay together as a crew and chose to relax the remainder of the season.

The crews;

Jungletouch's

Reserve Mens Crew; Grant Conran, Justin Lowry, Dan McMillan, Aaron Reilly and myself as sweep. I've been coaching / competing against these fellows for over 20 years and recruited to DY last season (2014/15) as training partners for the young A crew. We felt we had some unfinished business ahead as this crew finished in the top eight at the previous season National titles at Tugun, falling short of a Final birth by a frustrating run of bad luck in the qualifying semi final, our desire of improving on this was set high to say the least.

However from early on in the season injuries, work and family commitments seemed to plague these guys intermittently throughout the season, thus hindering the progression of performance that we set for ourselves.



But notwithstanding these niggling obstacles the crew due to their experience, maturity and skill was still able to stay in the front running group of crews at the limited amount of carnivals that we attended. Whilst we collectively as a crew agreed

that the season was an "Underachievement" by our own standards, I cannot end this report here! These fellows are all Business owners, Self employed, Managers, Husbands, Fathers and have families / mortgages to service.

To stay as competitive as they did with the setbacks and workloads as mentioned against other crews half their age is truly admirable.

Chingans

Open Mens "A" Crew; Willis Casey, Jay Yeomans, Chris McCinnon, Scott Cable and myself as sweep.

We managed to recruit Chris MacKinnon (from North Steyne) during the off season who fitted into the team with surprising ease even though he was faced with adjusting to now rowing with "Round" Rowlock oars as opposed to his prior "Square Back" Rowlocks at Nth Steyne. This difficult feat could be compared to a right handed Golfer changing to left handed clubs!

Training started well with a detailed program written and solid competitions identified as targets to achieve in. A top eight finish in the Ocean Thunder Series was one of the targets.

We hit the ground running with a win in the first SNB Boat carnival at Bilgola in solid surf.

Backed it up the following week in round one of the Ocean Thunder Series with a well fought 7th place.

Newport was the next SNB Boat carnival with a fifth place in messy solid surf on a day where staying injury free and damage prevention was of our higher priorities.

Ocean Thunder round two was next on the calendar. After performing well through the points rounds we earned the right to the better lane draws for the semi finals. Drawing the south end for the first semi final we were well on our way to a Final birth when tragedy struck. In a freakish accident I partially severed a finger on the seaward journey and we were forced to withdraw from the race (and the rest of the day's competition) but still earning 9th place for the round. Consequently we sat out round 3 and lost our momentum and fell outside of the top ten.

With the injury recovering well and Christmas upon us we decided to take a well earned break for a few weeks. Returning to racing again at Manly where in BIG surf we were narrowly eliminated in the semi final due to taking safety precautions to avoid a collision on a day that saw many of our rivals choose to sit out the day due to the surf. The boys showed great courage and skill to handle the conditions and stay upright all day. Two days later, Australia Day at Freshwater the surf had subsided and the conditions allowed

for great racing again. The fellows didn't disappoint and fought through to the final and placed 2nd in a photo finish being edged out by the crew from Grange SA.

The solid consistent results saw the crew now sitting in 1st place on the SNB Open Mens Boat point score.

The final big three carnivals (Branch, State and Aussies) although brought no medals home were impressive given the quality of our opponents. This crew displayed enormous maturity to go head to head against a bigger, more experienced field of crews in the top grade. They now after only a couple of seasons in the top grade have their opponents weary of their increasing speed and skill. It's been a pleasure for me to coach these fellows, and I know there is still more improvement to come.



Ocean Thunder

As this goes to print we are in talks working towards rescuing the relationship between DY SLSC and Ocean Thunder going forward into 2016/17. Unfortunately the relationship broke down during the off season, negotiations with both parties unable to agree to a financial deal for the 2015/16 season, thus DY SLSC having no involvement and no income from Ocean Thunder last season.

Eleven years old, Ocean Thunder has now become the biggest event for surfboats on our calendar, alongside the National Titles. Fox Sports televise this four event series and broadcasts it worldwide, showcasing DY as the "Home of Ocean Thunder". We have this event four times across the season at our home beach. We also now have a very competitive entry in the Mens division. The TV commentary love to call the "Home" team.

It seems (to me) ridiculous if we do not seek to find a way to make this work. Hopefully we can shake hands, erase the past disagreements and work to renew another fresh partnership with Ocean Thunder. Then shape this into a commercial business model of our own to create another network of possibilities using Ocean Thunder and our "Home Of" location to promote further interests of exposure through our own doors. Watch this space!

Looking Forward

As this off season ticks over, we are laying focus heavily on recruitment of younger personnel (no experience necessary) with ambition of fielding more crews in the coming season/s. With the current senior group we have now built, I believe we have as good as any club anywhere, the coaching structure, facilities and equipment available to become one of the Premier Boat clubs in the country.

Reilly & Sons

Pre season talks amongst the current group of rowers and sweeps are very exciting with high ambition.

However this ambition could not be seen as a possibility without the generous support from our Reilly & Sons Food Services sponsorship. In the surfboat fraternity sponsorships are critical for recruitment and survival. The sponsorship that Reilly and Sons provide DY SLSC is of the best I've seen in my thirty plus years in the sport. Australia wide this generous Sponsorship is one that is highly envied by our opponents.

For example;

Over the past two seasons the donations have provided us with two brand new surfboats complete with new Trailers, three new (top of the range) sets of Oars and Sweep oars, Pumps, Batteries, Tent plus quality clothing packs and sports bags for all rowers.

This I estimate to be of a value in excess of \$100k! Adding to this Reilly & Sons have also set aside one of their warehouses at their works depot in Cromer to provide for a fully equipped gymnasium with an abundance of weights training equipment, rowing machines and ample space to house the two new boats that I mentioned earlier. There is even a kitchen and bathroom at hand.

Steve & June personally covered the costs and did the road trips, towing the boats to and from both of the previous Aussie titles at Tugun (2015) and Alexandra Headland (2016).

A massive THANK YOU must go out to Steve, June, Aaron and Family.

The coming season see us enter the third year of our current three year sponsorship deal with Reilly & Sons, and I intend to make it our highest priority to see to it that we embrace the relationship to gain the renewal of a further matching term.

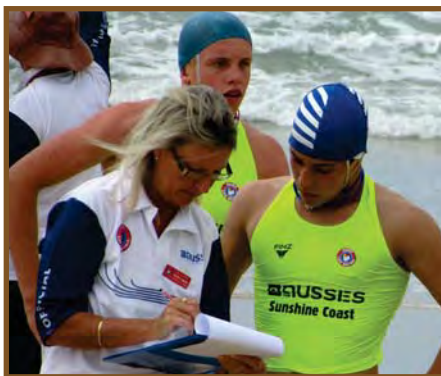

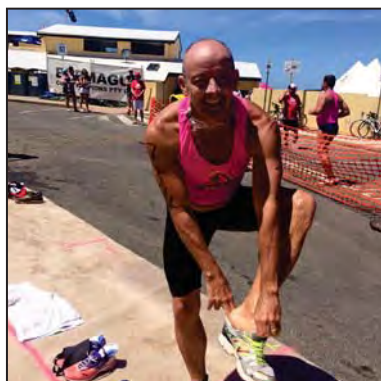
