Barrie Edwin Pitt - Life Member

An extract from Graeme Causon's Eulogy

I am honoured to say Barrie Pitt was my friend and it saddens me to realise that, in future, when I call in at the Dee Why Surf Club on a Sunday morning on the occasions when I am in Sydney, that Barrie will not be there to put a beer in my outstretched hand.

I have known Barrie for about 34 years, not as long as quite a few of you here, but in that time we developed a deep friendship, and I came to respect Barrie as a man of principle, of indefatigable commitment to a cause, and ready to lend a helping hand whenever requested, despite a sometimes gruff exterior.

Barrie spent his early years in Artarmon but moved to Dee Why with his parents when he was 14. Despite what some of you may think, he was not the first member of the DYSLSC, neither was he born in the Club. He joined the Club when he and his parents moved to Dee Why and, because he did not have any friends in the area, he thought it would be a good way to meet people.

Barrie had his secondary education at North Sydney Boys' and from there went on to study Accounting, qualified as a Chartered Accountant and was employed by Austin & Farrer Chartered Accountants. Later he commenced a partnership with Don Morgan in Dee Why under the title Morgan Pitt and Associates and, after Don Morgan retired, he practiced as Barrie Pitt.

Nobody who knew Barrie didn't know of his love for Dee Why and life saving in general and the work he put into both.

At Dee Why Barrie held every Executive Position on the Club's Management Committee including Club Captain and President. At age 25 he was awarded Life Membership of the club, the youngest member ever to achieve that honour, and this will remain so due to a change in rules requiring a longer period of membership. Barrie was also awarded Life Membership of Sydney Branch of Surf Life Saving and, more recently, Life Membership of Surf Life Saving Sydney Northern Beaches Branch. In 1981 he was appointed National Treasurer of Surf Life Saving Australia, and in about 1994/95 he was elected Finance Director of the Sydney Northern Beaches Branch. He was also a Life Member of Surf Lifesaving NSW. It is said by some, that Barrie didn't bleed red but blue and white – the Dee Why colours.

I first met Barrie in 1982 when Monier Limited, the company of which I was Company Secretary and General Counsel, decided to sponsor a Surf Life Saving Club. NSW State Council recommended we approach Dee Why, and for some 5 years the company provided a \$10,000 pa sponsorship plus t-shirts and wine for functions, etc. Barrie was one of the senior members who made sure that the sponsor was well-served.

At surf club functions and branch functions he also made sure that guests were looked after. Barrie was concerned that the club, the branch and surf lifesaving was held in high esteem. It was during my time as Club Secretary and then Branch Administration Director that I worked with Barrie on club and branch committees, and observed at first-hand, his dedication to Surf Life Saving and to its advancement and to its people.

To many people Barrie could seem like a grumpy old so and so, who was blunt with his speech and critically questioning in his approach. At times maybe he was, but that was because he always wanted the best outcome. But, if you got inside Barrie, you found a heart of gold. A man who found it difficult to say no to helping somebody.

Farewell fine friend – life will go on but it will not be quite the same without you. To Barrie's wife Judy and family we extend our sincere sympathy.



Gavin Gracie

Our Long Service Member, Gavin Gracie passed away on 3rd December 2016.



Prominent Service

Adam Hockley

Adam Hockley joined the Dee Why SLSC as a Nipper in 2005, since then he has gone on to receive 50 SLS awards, most notably the SRC in 2010, Bronze Medallion in 2012, Advanced Resuscitation Certificate in 2013, Silver Medallion IRB Driver in 2014, Silver Medallion Basic Beach Management in 2015, and this season he achieved the highest Surf Lifesaving award, The Gold Medallion.

In 2016 Adam received the SLSA National Patrol Service Award, with in excess of 1,000 patrol hours. In the 2015/16 season he contributed 180 hours to patrolling and providing water safety on Dee Why Beach.

Adam has been involved in many aspects of Club life including becoming a member of the Management committee in 2014 as the Male Youth Representative.

He is a Probationary Training Officer for the Bronze Medallion and is also a keen competitor, representing the Club in Lifesaving events and the Coolangatta Gold.

A mentor for our younger members the Nippers and Cadets often assisting the Age managers and SRC training officers. He is currently being mentored to become a Patrol Captain. As IRB Driver he has provided water safety for the Club, and carnivals.

At the Branch level in 2013 Adam attended the Junior Lifesaver of the Year (JLOTY) workshop providing input invaluable to his peers. He also came onto the Board of Member Services. He was a Panel judge for the Branch 2014 JLSOTY



Outstanding Service

David Spink

David joined the DYSLSC in 2003 and has gone on to receive 58 SLS awards. He has been involved in nearly all aspects of Club life. A committed Patrolling Member, Committee Member, Training Officer, Assessor, and Support Services RWC Operator.

David has provided water safety for the DY2K swim since 2004 and more recently the Ocean Thunder Boat Series at Dee Why. He is a keen IRB competitor, and has represented the Club in beach events and IRB racing.

Last year, following a call out from SLS, David assisted other emergency services to protect property at Collaroy Beach, spending 5 hours filling sandbags.

As a patrolling member David has logged over 538 hours. This season alone he amassed over 53 hours for his service on Dee Why beach and as a Support Service RWC operator.

Darren Armitage

Darren Armitage first joined the DYSLSC in 2004. In his first season he gained the Bronze Medallion, IRB Crew Certificate, Silver Medallion IRB Driver and was endorsed as a Bronze Medallion Training Officer. Since then he has gained 65 SLS awards.

Darren has served on the DY SLSC Management Committee and the Executive Committee.

Patrol Service:

Active Reserve B Patrol Captain. In his career as a Surf Lifesaver Darren has amassed 998.25 hours despite being rostered on for 'only' 412 hours. In 2004 his first patrolling season, Darren patrolled for a total of 204.25 hours. He has also served as a RWC Support Service Operator from 2013 to 2014. In 2014 he received the award of DYSLSC Patrol Captain of the Year.

Education:

As a Bronze and IRB Training Officer and IRB Assessor Darren has assisted with training since 2004 and 2005 respectively and is committed to quality training of all IRB drivers and crew persons. He has conducted IRB proficiencies and assessments for the Club and the Branch.

Surf Sports:

Darren is a Level 1 Surf Sports Official, officiating at Junior Carnivals to ensure DY meets the required quota. He also coaches the Nippers. As a competitor Darren competed in the Club DY2K board-6th place overall. Has competed in IRB racing events as IRB Driver and Crew and represented the Club in Beach events.

Club Fundraising:

Darren was always there as water safety in the IRB when we ran the 2k swim events and water safety for Ocean Thunder, setting cans and water safety for ocean ski events. He assisted with the Sun Run and Pub2Pub events at Dee Why.

Allen Lakeman

Allen joined Dee Why in 1996 and since that time has obtained 54 awards including his Bronze Medallion, Silver Medallion IRB Driver and Silver Medallion Basic Beach Management. He has a Level 1 Surf Sport Officiating License and is both a Training Officer and Assessor for the Bronze Medallion. In 2012 Allen was on the branch selection panel for NSW Life Saver of the Year and NSW Lifeguard of the Year and in 2014 was Chairman of the SLSNSW Appeals Tribunal.

In 2005 – 2007 and 2014-2016 Allen was on the Sydney Northern Beaches Board of Management and in 2014 – 2016 was a member of the Board of Education and Board of Surf Sport.

During his membership with Dee Why he has held many positions including Honorary Legal Officer, Kiosk Committee, Building Committee, Sponsorship Committee, Chairman of Judiciary Committee, Child Protection Officer, Nipper Secretary, Nipper Coordinator, Club Secretary and Club President.

Allen has officiated at many carnivals including local carnivals, NSW Championships and Australian Championships from 2007 to the present. He has also competed, particularly in the First Aid events.

Over the years Allen has used his legal experience to represent the club with Liquor Licence applications, assisted with court cases on behalf of the club and attended conferences with members of the Building Committee in negotiations for the grant of the lease for the new Northern Room, including meeting with Council over the period 2004 – 2008. He was also invaluable with advice for the Sponsorship and Marketing Committee.



Life Membership

LIFE MEMBERSHIP - CRAIG BARNES - 2015/2016 SEASON



Craig, aka Barnesy, joined the Club as an Under 11 Nipper in the 1972/73 season and apart from a 3 year stint coaching rugby league interstate has maintained his membership over the last forty odd years. During this time he has served the Club as a Patrol Member for 14 years, progressing to Vice Captain and Patrol Captain whilst gaining his Qualifying Certificate (SRC), Bronze Medallion, Radio Operators and Advanced Resuscitation awards. He served on the Management committee in a number of positions for 16 years where, in a number of seasons, he took on extra positions no one else wanted. He has represented the club in all levels of competition in beach football, Rugby 10's, beach, craft and surfboat events winning Branch Titles and as a finalist at National level. He assisted in numerous Club events such as Fun Runs, Golf Days, Ocean Thunders, Pub2Pub and Surf Swims. Although it was a bit too far from Dee Why for him to attend, he took part in all fundraising activities for the first World Life Saving Titles in Bali in 1981. He also ran the Pub Raffles held during the patrol season every Friday night for 3 years at the Dee Why hotel in the late 80's, although not always the convenor responsible for the raffles.

As with all Lifesavers, our training extends beyond the beach, and in 1975 just after completing his Qualifying Certificate (SRC) he was a young teenager on family holidays in the Snowy Mountains when this training came to the fore. In his own words "on the way back from lunch, still in the carpark, my brother and I noticed a commotion and a crowd gathering so we went to investigate. People were frantically digging in the snow as a young boy had fallen through the ice into a creek. The call went out – does anyone know mouth to mouth (as it was referred to in the day). I said I do and they threw a blue little boy on the snow from the frozen creek. He was about 9 years old. I went to him and checked his airway and gave 5 quick breaths then checked his pulse. Knowing I wasn't supposed to, but left with no option I quickly spaced out my compression point on his chest when an adult turned up to do the compressions. Soon my breath went in and to my joy and disgust out came milk arrowroot biscuits. I was surprised that this had worked so quickly and rolled him on his side, covered him in a blanket and monitored him till the ambulance arrived. I went back to the snow with my brother and told Mum and Dad. Later that night we heard on the radio that he was ok. I still don't eat milk arrowroot biscuits!

On the lighter side, not long after the junior boaties won their Aussie Title they were at the club and feeling like a social Sunday wave session but their sweep, Tom Hand, could not be found so Barnsey volunteered his services (wanting to practise sweeping and feel how a good crew could move a boat) so out they went. Tom, on arrival at the club noticed them out near the point and asked who Barnsey had in the boat as they were rowing well and really moving the boat along. When advised that it was his junior crew from last season he exclaimed loudly "How did HE get them together, I can't!"

The 1981/82 State Titles were just over the hill at North Curl Curl and with no surfboat competitors that season and Tom assisting Queenscliff, a group of experienced rowers and Barnsey decided to 'show the colours' by entering the Open Boat race. Upon arrival they were greeted with a nice 3-4 metre swell which promised a speedy return from the cans. Whilst deciding where to pitch the tent, what to have for breakfast, etc the call came over the PA system for the first heat of the open boat and you guessed it, Dee Why was in it! The boat and crew were quickly stripped of gear and raced to the start line just as the starter's whistle blew. No major dramas on the way out and in good position to qualify, after the buoy turn the normally talkative Barnsey grew strangely quiet. Rowing onto a big one the crew were expecting the comeback call but there was justsilence. About halfway down the wave the stroke, in desperation, called the comeback and the crew responded magnificently but to no avail. Executing a perfect bottom turn and traversing the face until met by white-water, which was breaking towards us, the boat abruptly reversed direction, but not orientation nor speed, shooting backwards to whence it came and then rolled. After surfacing to tumultuous applause from perhaps the entire beach and checking that everyone was ok we returned to shore where Barnsey was asked, "Why didn't you call the comeback earlier" to which he replied, "I was just about to but someone beat me to it!" The crew retired to the beer tent to observe proceedings with most returning the next day, beer tent again, to ensure that our title aspirations were not in jeopardy (and to bring the boat back). We needn't have worried as the boating fraternity unanimously voted Dee Why 'Best Rollover of the State Titles'the only title for the Club that weekend.

Craig has proven over many years that his approach to Surf Life Saving is very much down to earth with his expertise being on the beach and around the club, supportive and willing to advise and assist young up and coming life savers. A true club member with the interests of all his primary thought he is not the person if asked where is something would say it might be there, rather he would go and find it.

This season however has been a difficult one fraught with some significant rescues and the treatment of people injured in the surf. I wish to thank our Club Captain, Ben Davies and our 198 patrolling members for their contribution to making Dee Why Beach a safe place for members of the public. I also wish to thank all Council Lifeguards who performed with great professionalism in conjunction with our patrolling members. The Club would like to acknowledge Scott Mortimer, Josh Wall, David Hooper, Madison Quinn, Clinton Rose and Tim Donkin. The NBC Beach Summary report for

the weekends of the 2016/2017 season show Dee Why beach attendance at 433,676 with 47 rescues, 746 first aid treatments, 19,797 preventive actions and the recovery of 37 lost children.

One of the pleasing features of the membership of the Club is the number of Families with young children. It was a pleasure to see Nippers numbers continuing to increase and young mums with babes in arms who helped at patrols and Club activities. The Nippers also celebrated Halloween and Christmas with functions in the clubhouse.

The Club has been particularly active in providing officials in the Life Saving Events of Patrol Competition, Champion Life Saver and First Aid Competition. I would particularly like to thank Steve Haggett and Adrienne Lowe who took leading roles as Senior Officials at Branch, State and the Aussies 2017. Other officials up at the Aussies were Jan Lakeman, Robyn Parker and myself. Robyn who has only joined the club this year was instrumental in helping to set up a computerised system for the marking of theory papers and recording results in the Lifesaving Events. Greg Punch is also to be commended for his role as an announcer, particularly at the Aussies where he called some of the major events. Greg was also involved in the SLSNSW Beach to Bush 2016 Surf Education Program, as a Lead Presenter which delivered presentations to over 900 children in country New South Wales. The season commenced on Saturday, 24 September 2016. In September, the Club had 174 volunteers, making up 8 Active Patrols and 6 Active Reserve patrols. It is always an honour and pleasure to see members returning season after season to take up duties on Dee Why Beach.

Officials

President's Report

In respect of our patrolling commitments this season we had a major hiccup with the Council Lifeguards who had claimed additional space for their wire caged area. This dispute with Council was resolved when the wire caged area returned to its normal position. The Club was able to enlist the support of our local State Member (and then Premier), the Hon Mike Baird, to intervene in this dispute. Our thanks to Mike and his local electoral office staff.

On the beach, the new ATV, the Defender HD8 started service at the beginning of October. A valuable new addition for the club.



Proficiencies end on 31 December each season. Members who do not become proficient for the 2016/2017 patrol season, must make special application through the Chief Training Officer (Matt Molina) to obtain approval from SLSNSW for late proficiencies. Late proficiencies are usually only granted in special circumstances, such as ill health or being away overseas. This year four members of the club almost missed being eligible to compete at the Aussies. SLSA has set up members' portals for every member of SLS to access which will give details of their membership status and patrol hours. Every member is responsible for ensuring they are eligible to compete. I personally want to thank Matt Molina for taking the competitors' eligibility issues up with Denise Lees and John Restuccia at the SLSNSW. Matt, thank you for taking the time away from your work and using your expertise to deal with these last-minute problems.

Following our considerable success at the State Titles at Blacksmith's Beach, Swansea Belmont we had 19 competitors heading off to the Aussies at North Kirra and Tugun. Building Committee Report

One of the objectives of the Sub-committee is to prepare, over five years from 2015, a Strategic plan to explore the potential for commercial activities, including costs of various building works, together with an assessment of the future needs of club members for use of the building that would benefit from improved facilities. The inaugural meeting was held on 24 September 2015.

Membership: Susan Sky (Chair), Allen Lakeman, David Lang, Jeff Tucker, Jenny Graves, Jacqui McLeod and Adrienne Lowe

The Club, unlike many other NSW surf clubs, has a Deed of Grant with council. The deed is a key factor in establishing the unique position of DYSLSC as not being lessee of Crown/Council land but having an equitable interest recognizing the land swap which established the clubhouse on its current location.

The NSW government has a policy in regard to commercial activities on surf club sites, recognizing this as a means to assist with funding the functions of surf clubs. To progress commercial use plans for the Swan Room, preparation of design concepts, including works to ensure compliance with Disability Access legislation, was proposed by Jeff Tucker. The potential cost would be in the order of \$20,000.

In 2016 Warringah Council was dissolved and an Administrator Mr Dick Persson and General Manager, Mr Mark Ferguson were appointed to lead the Northern Beaches Council. An election for new councilors will be held in September 2017. No action was taken, in view of the new administration, until talks were held with them. The Manly Daily included an article on the Committee's interest in including commercial activities within the clubhouse. Following this article the President Allen Lakeman sought discussions with the Administrator or senior staff on the policy considerations of a commercial project. No response was received.

Issues with the storage facilities within the existing building, including the area shared with Council's lifeguards diverted resources. The President Allen Lakeman explored the opportunity to construct further storage facilities on the site of the substantially commenced addition to club facilities/public facilities, adjacent to the existing club, that were associated with the 2000 development application approved by Council. A Section 96 Modification of Consent application was lodged with Council in November 2016 to construct a new Storage facility to be shared with Council's lifeguards. The club is waiting Owner's Consent from Council to proceed further with this application.

Summary of Significant Account Policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

- AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements
- AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows
- AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
- AASB 1031 Materiality
- AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards
- AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Property, Plant and Equipemnt (PPE)

Plant and Equipment and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. the depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.



Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Financial Instruments

Recognition, initial measurement and derecognition

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below. Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- loans and receivables
- financial assets at Fair Value Through Profit or Loss (FVTPL)
- Held-To-Maturity (HTM) investments
- Available-For-Sale (AFS) financial assets

All financial assets except for those at FVTPL are subject to review for impairment at least at each reporting date to identify whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. Different criteria to determine impairment are applied for each category of financial assets, which are described below.

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs or finance income, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

Financial Report

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Group's trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments.

Individually significant receivables are considered for impairment when they are past due or when other objective evidence is received that a specific counterparty will default. Receivables that are not considered to be individually impaired are reviewed for impairment in groups, which are determined by reference to the industry and region of a counterparty and other shared credit risk characteristics. The impairment loss estimate is then based on recent historical counterparty default rates for each identified group.

Financial assets at FVTPL

Financial assets at FVTPL include financial assets that are either classified as held for trading or that meet certain conditions and are designated at FVTPL upon initial recognition. Assets in this category are measured at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss. The fair values of financial assets in this category are determined by reference to active market transactions or using a valuation technique where no active market exists.

HTM investments

HTM investments are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturity other than loans and receivables. Investments are classified as HTM if the Association has the intention and ability to hold them until maturity. The Association currently holds long term deposits designated into this category. HTM investments are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

If there is objective evidence that the investment is impaired, determined by reference to external credit ratings, the financial asset is measured at the present value of estimated future cash flows. Any changes to the carrying amount of the investment, including impairment losses, are recognised in profit or loss.

AFS financial assets

AFS financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that are either designated to this category or do not qualify for inclusion in any of the other categories of financial assets. The Association's AFS financial assets include listed securities.

All AFS financial assets are measured at fair value. Gains and losses are recognised in other comprehensive income and reported within the AFS reserve within equity, except for impairment losses and foreign exchange differences on monetary assets, which are recognised in profit or loss. When the asset is disposed of or is determined to be impaired the cumulative gain or loss recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified from the equity reserve to profit or loss and presented as a reclassification adjustment within other comprehensive income. Interest calculated using the effective interest method and dividends are recognised in profit or loss within 'revenue'.

Reversals of impairment losses for AFS debt securities are recognised in profit or loss if the reversal can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised. For AFS equity investments impairment reversals are not recognised in profit or loss and any subsequent increase in fair value is recognised in other comprehensive income.

Classification and subsequent measurement of financial liabilities.

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payable.

Financial liabilities are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, except for financial liabilities held for trading or designated at FVTPL, that are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss.

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net

amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.



Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. (the Association), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 April 2017, the statement of profit and loss and other comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows for the year then ended, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the responsible entities' declaration.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the *Basis of Qualified Opinion* section of my report, the financial report of the Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as at 30 April 2017 presents fairly in all material aspects the financial position of the Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the basis of accounting described in Note 1 to the financial report and satisfies the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth) and the Club's constitution including:

I have also fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

The Committee's responsibility also includes such internal control as the Committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Trust Funds

Since 1975 when the late Frank Conroy established an anonymous donor fund, the club has been the beneficiary of a number of bequests. Committees of the day have nominated these funds outside of general income either by virtue of conditions attached or a desire to provide for the long term future of the club.

Frank Conroy Scholarship

At the time of his initial donation, Frank expressed the wish that the funds be established to help junior members improve their competitive abilities. To date, grants have been made to junior members to assist in subsidising their costs on professional instruction. In his will Frank hoped, without binding the club, that the funds should continue in this vain. To ensure that Frank's scholarship continues to support junior members, the committee decided to put some restraints on the monies. It was decided:

- Only the annual interest accrued on the capital be allocated for assistance
- Candidates are chosen through selection criteria laid down by the junior and senior club committees.

James MacLachlan Fund

Jim MacLachlan was an associate member of the club from 1955 who on his death in 1981 provided for us as a beneficiary in his estate. No specific conditions were attached to the grant. The funds have been invested and the income has been applied at certain times to defray costs of the club patrol efficiency competition.

Betty Barry Memorial Scholarship Fund

The Betty Barry fund was established by the then Ladies Auxiliary to remember the contribution of their late President and Life Member. The club now administers the fund in similar terms and conditions to the Frank Conroy Scholarship..

Dee Why hosted the Active Youth carnival with our cadet competitors setting high standards for the season ahead. Thanks to Matt Mollinia (Active Automotive) for his support of the cadets and his sponsorship of this carnival.

Warren/Marty and Pete gained a 2nd at Freshie Masters in 170+y board relay. Manly and Freshie Carnivals saw Emma Jeffcoat and Madison Quinn return to the water for some solid ski racing. Along with Ben and Charlie (Freshie & Manly), Jamie (Manly) put in big efforts. The anticipated local carnival East Coast Masters delivered a stand out performance by Richards/Hannam/Sharkey and Luiz Leal. In the First Aid Competition events, Allen Lakeman competed with Joe Karlek at North Narrabeen and Roz Elliott at Dee Why. Despite some heavy weather conditions leading to dangerous surf and some carnivals cancelled the 2016-17 season lead up to Branch/State/ Aussies and Worlds was successful across training and competition opportunities.

Branch Championships were staged across the Peninsular for the 2016/17 Season with Dee Why hosting Branch Patrol and Champion Lifesaver/First Aid Events and Branch Masters (Water). All credit to the Club and members for hosting these events and supporting competition on our home beach. The events went smoothly with the help of competitors and other club members turning up to set up the beach and help out across the days when and as needed. Thank you to all involved for the big effort they put in. The Branch Masters competitors made the most of home break advantage with a swag of medals and some great racing. Outstanding results included Gold 150y taplin (Crittles/Wylie/Hannam), Gold double ski 50-55y (Hatfield/Crittles), Gold board rescue 35-39y (Hannam/Richards), Silver 170y ski relay (Sharkey/Weisse/Quinn), Silver single ski 55-59y (Geoff Crittles), Silver ironman 35-39y (Steve Richards), silver tube 70y+ (Ian Nicol), Bronze double ski 35-39y (Richards/Quinn) and Bronze swim 70y+ (Nicol). Over the previous couple of weekends the Open competitors had represented Dee Why in the best spirit of surf life saving. Charlie Mowbray landed 10th in u15 board final whilst James Berriman competed in U17s semi final. Stand out results were Dee Why Milkmaids open Women's boats - Silver and Steve Richards 1km beach run 35-39y - Gold. In the Overall point score for Branch 2017, Dee Why sustained a placing of 10th.

State Championships returned to Swansea Belmont with Dee Why represented in the open category by Charles Mowbray and Ben Ferguson in U15 events as well as Women's, Opens and Reserves Men's boat crews. The cadet competitors did Dee Why proud in big surf conditions and Charlie just missing out on a board finals berth. Masters competitors with stand out results in their age categories included Warren Hannam - board final, Peter Hatfield - ski final and Steve Richards who narrowly missed Bronze with a solid 4th in 35-39y 2km beach run to gain Dee Why 3 points for the State Masters carnival rankings.

Congratulations to Marty Quinn, Peter Sharkey, Cam Wylie and James Marsh representing Dee Why at the World Masters Takapuna Beach NZ. Despite chilly conditions the team achieved outstanding results including 2nd swim team (James/Peter/Cam), 2nd board relay (James/Marty), 3rd ski relay (Cam/Marty/James), 3rd beach relay 170+ (James/Cam/Peter/Marty), and 3rd taplin relay (Peter - ski /Marty - board / Cam - swim). Individual excellent performances from Marty Quinn (Bronze 60-65 board) and James (Silver 50-54 board) topping solid performances from all competitors. The team was ably managed by Simon Moriarty and supported by Jo Quinn and Kathy Sharkey.

Dee Why Boat Crews have been swept throughout the 2016/17 season by Shaun Stacey who has prepared a detailed report on behalf of the Boat Rowers. Dee Why continued as the location for the Ocean Thunder series. Graduating SRC Groups and Trainers

Courses:

Our Intensive SRC and bronze courses continue to gain momentum with 18 SRC's doing the SRC course over the October long weekend. Even more impressive was the SRC to Bronze course run in a similar intensive format. We managed to get out of a pool of 20 who did their SRC course 2 years ago, 16 returned to do their Bronze course. An 80% retention in our youth is fantastic and this can be attributed not only to good training but to a great youth program and great patrolling environment for our members.

Aside from our younger members upgrading their skill level to Bronze medallion and more we had a small group of nipper parents and members from Orange that also committed to the Bronze course. This is a great effort for our members from Orange and shows a great commitment especially due to the fact that they commit to their required patrol Quota. Our nipper parents are always more than welcome and fulfil a necessary requirement not only on patrol but for nipper water safety and for the encouragement of their own children or age group to also do their Bronze and help out.

Club Captain's Report

Another season has closed and now we are to have the winter to follow other worthy pursuits. Some will become coaches or supporters of their children's sporting and recreational past times or perhaps like me enjoy the break doing things they don't normally have the time for. A couple of members have moved further on and won't be joining us next season. A special thanks to John Asquith (203 hrs) and Marian Matus (148hrs) who are both leaving us, John to another Sydney club for local convenience and Marian who has taken his family to Brisbane to start a new chapter in their story. My best wishes to them both and anyone else who may not intend to join us next season.

Firstly I would like to welcome the new Bronze and SRC members who completed their training and achieved their respective awards. Also my special thanks to current members who have gone on to complete further awards such as ARTC, IRB & Beach Management.

According to Surfguard (our Surf Life Saving Program) we had 363,052 visitors and users of our beach this season. We provided 1,704 preventions which of course can be anything from assisting the public as to the current surf conditions and directions to safe managed areas, finding displaced parents for their children or vice versa to shark alarms and their management. The 2016/2017 season had 76 rescues performed on our beach either by tube, board, IRB & PWC. Looking at past records I would offer that they indicate the word is getting out to the public about surf awareness. Our first aid treatments totalled 219, mostly from blue bottle stings, cuts & scratches. There were three cases with major wounds and two spinals. My thanks go to Anne Henshaw who, in her capacity as Vice Club Captain, entered the log details into Surfguard each week. Her job was not made easy by members who cannot write legible details on the log books and who did not distinguish between a voluntary or substitute status. We went back this season to filling in the log book prior to the weekend so as to make this easier but alas we still had issues.

Our overall patrol hours this season was 6,447 hrs in total.

Boat Report

The pre-season preparations kick-started well with cold training commencing during mid July with 3 crews, culminating to form one Open Mens, one Reserve Mens and one "new" Open Womens crew. The Womens crew was already established over prior seasons at Mona Vale, but with talks during the off season of a possible change they saw an opportunity and decided to make a welcome switch to their new club at Dee Why.

The crews;

The Milkmen - Reserve Mens Crew;

Willis Casey, Harrison Selby, Jono Roel, Declan Michell and myself as sweep. Willis Casey (due to building work commitments) made a tough decision to step down from his position in the Open Mens Crew which he gave great service to for the past three seasons. However still maintaining a passion to stay involved in the sport he loves, he set out to form a crew to row with in the Reserve Grade. By the time the carnivals rolled in the quality of our form was exciting. Early days we perhaps were a little too eager to dominate our rivals which possibly affected the mental approach in a few of the early carnivals feeling disappointed with minor placings. As a group we identified this and adopted a more relaxed approach with more focus on backing "ourselves" rather than beating our rivals.

The stepping down of Willis Casey left this crew in need of a replacement. However, it didn't take long to find one in Ned Larsen. Ned also made the switch from another club, North Steyne, being scouted by Chris McKinnon.

Due to the influx of new rowers to Dee Why, in particular experienced rowers, we now found ourselves with a new dilemma. Dee Why rowers have traditionally rowed with "Round" rowlocks as opposed to "Squareback" rowlocks. With the successful recruitment of



these new rowers, the majority of rowers at Dee Why were better skilled at the concept of the "Squareback" method. After much discussion with all rowers (current and new comers) I made a tough call to upgrade from the older "Round" rowlock concept to the modern "Squareback" version with a vision to build the ranks over time in one direction.

This crew now spent a lot of time honing in on the new concept and at times this may have hindered their progression but their patience and motivation remained solid.

Whilst remaining very competitive throughout the early and mid parts of the season in the top grade, it was towards the later part of the season when the hard work started to pay off. Another successful season, thanks to the many people who contribute to make everything relating to the IRB's work.

Congratulations to all the people who received awards relating to the IRB's this season.

Our activities include Patrolling, Nipper's, Training, Carnivals (both on our beach and others) as well as numerous swimming and paddling activities which require an IRB for safety.

Again this year we trained up a large number of Crew but unfortunately not as many drivers as we would like, our aim is to have 2 proficient drivers for every patrol. As our drivers can only come from our pool of crew proficient members our aim is to train as many crew as possible and improve their skill levels to such that the ones who wish to will go on to train as drivers.

This coming season we will run another 3 crew courses as well as 1-2 driver's courses. We will also be offering training and upskilling most Sunday mornings from 7:00am – 9:00am.

Our club is lucky to have a supportive committee and our equipment is better than many clubs who sometimes struggle to get by. However IRB's require a high level of maintenance to keep operational, the hulls require proper care and maintenance to avoid damage. The motors work in an environment of salt water, waves and shallow water all of which do everything possible to put extra strain on our motors, it is important that the boats and motors are washed and flushed properly every time they are replaced in the shed. It is also worth reminding everyone that the IRB is to be left operational 24/7 as we have had call outs, out of our normal operating hours.

This season we also had a couple of injuries, fortunately not too serious. While there will always be a certain element of risk, IRB's by their very nature of operating in a surf zone, they need to be light, quick and manoeuvrable. This also means that at times they can be rough, unstable and even at times be partially or fully out of the water, this can at times put both the driver and crew at risk to injury (especially the crew). It is the commitment of all the IRB trainers at Dee Why to train both the crew and drivers to best eliminate or reduce the risk to the absolute minimum possible. This is achieved by setting best training practices as well as the constant improvements of techniques.

Once again it has been a pleasure this season to work with a great bunch of volunteers dedicated to making Dee Why Beach safe for all.

We look forward to seeing you all on the beach soon.
