Vale - Joe Wyer Long Serving Member

Joe Wyer gained his Bronze Medallion at Byron Bay Surf Life Saving Club in 1953 and was a member of Burleigh Heads and Mackay SLSC in the 1950's and 1960's where he was known as a champion rower and sweep..

During this time he competed in many Queensland State and National Championships in Surfboats.

Joe joined Dee Why SLSC in 1995 after his son Alex joined in 1988 and they were subsequently joined by Joe's daughter Julianne and son Matthew.

He was occasionally seen sweeping surfboats when they were short a sweep.

Joe continued his membership until his passing in December 2017.

Our sympathy is extended to Joe's wife Geraldine and his family.



Richie Burke - Life Member

Richie Burke joined Dee Why Life Saving Club on the 26th December 1941 as a 15 year old junior member and was a continuous member of the Club until his passing on 3rd August 2017. He gained his Qualifying Certificate in his first season and his Bronze Medallion in the 1942/43 season.

His passion for Surf Life Saving and Dee Why SLSC in particular was evident by the numerous positions he held on the Management Committee, including Treasurer for 4 years from 1954 followed by Vice President in 1960 and President in 1963 where his 11 year stint made him the longest serving President of Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club.

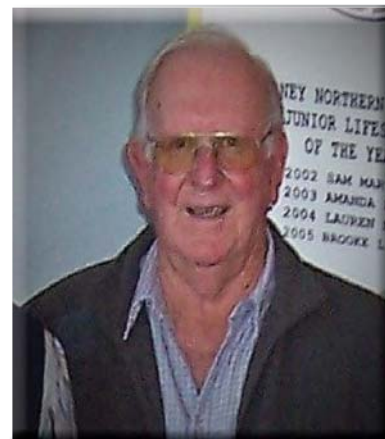
Richie was instrumental in the commencement of Nippers in 1965. 22 boys turned up to attend the first day of nippers at Dee Why, which expanded to 106 three Sundays later. By the 1966/1967 season there were 225 junior members, not including girls who did not join until later.

Under his leadership as the then President, and with the enthusiasm and drive of member Cameron Copeland, Dee Why hosted it's first Australian Surf Championships in 1975. The Club may not have won a medal but won the highest praise for hosting one of the very best Australian Championships on record.

In his later years, he spent many hours extracting and recording information as Club Historian.

Richie was rewarded for his contribution to Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club by being awarded Life Membership at the 1964 Annual General Meeting, and for his contribution to Branch by receiving Branch Life Membership in 2005.

To Richie's wife Nola and family we extend our sympathy.



Dannealle Hannam - Member and Club Administrator

Dannealle Hannam joined DYSLSC in September 2009 when her children were enrolled as nippers and was very actively involved across all aspects of the Club. Even though not a Bronze holder Dannealle actively patrolled as an award member ensuring she attended all of her patrols.

Along with being the Club's Child Protection Officer, Dannealle was very active on the Nipper Committee holding several roles even after both of her own children had finished nippers.

Dannealle not only ran the BBQ for the Nipper Sunday events but also for all other Club events including Ocean Thunder. She assisted at all Club fundraising functions and events and was involved in the management of a number of them, including the Pub to Pub and Sun Run.

Dannealle was seen (and heard) at nearly all Club events and was a big promoter of the social side of the Club.

Dannealle held the position of Club Administrator, but extended herself above and beyond this role. She worked enthusiastically and tirelessly filling in wherever it was required, without needing to be asked or prompted, to ensure things were done and the Club ran smoothly.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP - PHIL THOMAS - 2016/2017 SEASON



Phil Thomas has been a member of Dee Why SLSC for 25 years. His passion and dedication to Surf Life Saving is evident when highlighting his many achievements. Phil involved himself in every aspect of club life and invested countless hours across a range of areas at club and branch level. A natural leader and keen competitor, Phil has dedicated himself to helping Dee Why become one of the strongest clubs on the peninsula.

Phil began his lifesaving career at Dee Why in the 1992/1993 season and has never looked back. He is the epitome of a dedicated member of the Club. He has involved himself in every aspect of the Club and does it with passion and commitment. As the core of Surf lifesaving is patrolling Phil has directed his priorities towards this.

The season immediately following Phil getting his Bronze he stepped up as a Club Vice Captain and an Instructor for Bronze and IRB. Phil dedicated a great deal of time to ensuring the future of the Club by assisting with the implementation of quality training in the Club.

Within a couple of years Phil stepped up to take on one of the most challenging positions in the Club, Club Captain, which, over a period of 6 years, he maintained and consistently improved upon. It is in Phil's nature to be motivated and well organised and lead by example. There were seasons where Phil patrolled in excess of 100 hours personally. He has patrolled well in excess of 850 hours throughout his career and was always there to motivate his team on the beach. Even in the present day Phil is often on hand when a patrol is short or in need of a higher qualification. He will often just step up and fix the problem and

fill the gap as required as is his nature.

Over and above Phil's passion for lifesaving he also had a passion for competition. Phil competed in anything from IRB racing to Swim, Board and Ski events to First Aid and Patrol Competition events. Phil did very well in team events especially the lifesaving events taking out medals in all levels of competition from Branch to National.

Phil's obvious passion for surf sports was apparent when he took on the Competition Manager position and maintained this position for in excess of 12 years. He ensured that he was across all aspects of surf sports even to the point of becoming an official and up to the level of a Carnival Referee. With this experience he had an intimate knowledge of the rules and workings of surf sports events. Not only was Phil meticulous in ensuring that the competitors had all the correct qualifications and prerequisites for carnivals, he also ensured that gear and equipment such as tents and boards and ski's were there for the competitors. He often resolved issues on the day (which unfortunately occurred regularly at State and Aussies) to ensure the competitors got a race and weren't left out of competition due to system and administration issues. Phil not only ensured entries were put in but also supported and attended many of the carnivals that he was not personally involved in. It was not unlike Phil to turn up to an IRB racing event on the South Coast just to watch and support Dee Why. It even went to the extreme where Phil would put his hand up to be a driver or Board Guide at the Coolangatta Gold, travelling at his own expense to support the team.

As a club Dee Why is involved in the running of many events from the Pub to Pub and Sun Run to the 2 km ocean swim and Ocean Thunder. Phil Thomas is one of those members who is always there at these events to help out, regardless of if he has put his name down, if he is around he will lend a hand and help out wherever a gap needs to be filled.

Phil's ongoing commitment to the management and maintenance of the high standards of the Club across all aspects of the Club makes him a very worthy and deserving nominee for Life Membership. It was a great honour to be able to put together a nomination such as this for such a deserving member who is still very active and visible in the Club and always willing to share his experience and knowledge.



President's Report

It is with great pleasure that I present the Annual Report for 2017 - 2018 to the 105th Annual General Meeting of the Dee Why Surf Lifesaving Club.

Well another year has passed and in my first year as President it has been a wonderful year of learning and discovery and I would like to thank the committee and all our members for all their help and support throughout the year.

This year has not been without its challenges but out of those challenges you come to realise just how great this Club is and the special people it is made up of.

"The mission statement of SLSNSW is to save lives, create great Australians and build better communities."

Many people in this Club have put in an extraordinary effort this season and because of those efforts we can stand proud as a club who has made a big contribution to supporting that mission.

We have kept the beach safe with no loss of life on Dee Why Beach. We have mentored and coached our nippers, our Surf Rescue Cadets (SRCs), new and existing bronze members and supported the community.

Early in the season due to unforeseen circumstances two of our key personnel, the Club Captain and IRB Captain, needed to take some time off. Furthermore, some patrols experienced a decline in patrolling members and some IRB drivers became unavailable throughout the season so a challenge was ahead of us. Responding to the challenge Warren Hannam, Dannealle Hannam and Matt Molinia stepped up to manage the situation.

Warren moved up from Club Vice Captain to assume responsibility for Club Captain duties and assisted by Matt, worked very hard to ensure that all patrols had the required numbers and awards on patrol. It was good to see how all our patrolling members responded to the call for help and volunteered to do extra patrols when needed especially Warren and Matt who put in a lot of extra hours on and off the beach doing 201.5 and 160.75 hours of patrol respectively. Dannealle Hannam went over and above her role as Club Administrator. Seeing a need, Dannealle took up the patrol administrative duties and managed the Patrol Rosters, Surfguard entries and messaging.

Dannealle's contribution to the Club throughout the season has been enormous looking after our administration, coordinating the BBQ, organising fundraisings events and functions and anything else wherever she could help as real champions do.

A big thank you to everyone for their support. While it was great to see how the club members pulled together and what a great culture we have it did highlight how we needed to review our processes, planning, strategy and how we need to adapt to a changing world.

As a group we worked together to identify some areas we could improve or changes we might adopt.

The key areas that were identified

- Recruitment and retention. We have done an analysis of member retention to get an insight into how long new members stay with the Club. We prepared a survey which will be sent to members who have left in the past three years to get their feedback and suggestions. We are also sending a survey to existing members for their feedback on what they feel could help with attracting and retaining members. This will help us identify how we can improve member satisfaction and retention.

- **Adaptability.** A critical period for our younger members is around their last two years of school where they have commitments to study and exams. We recognise the pressures faced by these young members with studies and other commitments and we are looking at how we can support them through those times so we don't lose them completely but give them an option that aligns to their situation and allows them to stay involved in the Club.
- **Transition and succession planning.** A key aspect of succession planning is transitional training so that when someone moves into a role they have all the information, and knowledge they need for the role and they understand the processes and objectives. We are looking at what processes we can put in place to identify our future leaders and mentor them so they are prepared when they move into senior roles.
- **Skill development.** Many new bronze members only attain the basic skills during their bronze course. We are looking at a program to put in place set sessions where new and existing members can further develop their skills and learn new skills.
- **Community engagement.** We are looking to enhance the Club's community profile through leaflet drops, information pamphlets and information sessions to be held at the Club eg water safety awareness.
- **Process and procedures.** We need to have clear and easily accessible processes for patrol captains, patrolling and club members. We are looking to develop simple guides and more regular communication to the patrol captains, patrols and members to keep them better informed and aligned to current requirements and changes.

The management group will be working with a view to getting these in place for the start of the 2018-2019 season or as early as possible into the season.

These are the immediate objectives while the team works on a longer-term strategy and vision for the Club.

Clubhouse and Facilities

There have been several changes to facilities in the Club this year including the relocation of the club office, refurbishment of the Club change facilities and Club entry. Matt Molina managed these projects. The club office was relocated from upstairs down to the Captains room which underwent a new fitout to accommodate the office. The office is now open for public enquiries Wednesday afternoon and Sunday mornings. Matt not only managed these projects but with

the help of Andrew Vezzola did most of the work. It was common to see Matt and Andrew working late at night on the renovations. Matt designed and built new cupboards for the office and youth room and manufactured new security grating for the men's and ladies change rooms, youth room and new office. Matt and Andrew installed all the new fittings and Andrew installed a false ceiling in the entrance to the Club. Matt also negotiated with Bunnings for the supply of materials, paint and workforce assistance to paint the lower floor and Club's entry.

As part of the ongoing maintenance the Swan Lounge walls were painted and floor sanded and recoated.

A Swan Lounge kitchen renovation is scheduled between 30th July and 10th August which will include stainless steel bench tops, 2 sinks and hand basin, a new under bench dishwasher and resealed floor. Thanks to Peter Hatfield for arranging all the work done in the Swan Lounge.

The patrol trailer was redesigned and modified by Matt Molina during the off-season to make it more functional and easier to manoeuvre.

Training and assessing

The training and accessing group have been busy during the season running SRC and bronze courses, hosting assessments and assessing at venues.

While there has been a decline in the number of new members completing their bronze medallion course this year those who did the training are enthusiastic new members with a desire to be more involved in the Club.



We have scheduled training every afternoon for the nippers ranging from board training at Manly Dam, beach event training, board and swim training at Dee Why Beach. It is good to see the number of nippers involved growing as well as the parents in the water assisting.

The 100km winter, which is a program introduced by Matt Molinia to keep the nippers engaged during the offseason, is in its second year after its success in the initial year.

Competition

We saw some good results in competition with some of our members bringing home medals from the State Championships.

Congratulations to Cam Wyllie with Silver in the tube rescue 55-59 years, a fitting reward to a member who this year celebrates his 50th year in Surf Lifesaving. Allen Lakeman with a Silver in the Open Champion Lifesaver, Allen Lakeman and Emily Buckle with Silver in the Open First Aid, and Peter Hatfield and Geoff Crittle with Bronze in the 55-59 double ski. Allen and Emily also travelled to Perth to compete at Aussies in the Open First Aid and Allen also competed in the Open Champion Lifesaver.

We also had several DYSLSC members go to Aussies as officials.

Trish's services and achievements for Surf Life Saving NSW Sydney Northern Beaches Branch include: Founding Chair and Coordinator, Traumatic Incident Peer Support Team, since 1994; Distinguished Service, 2003; Branch Life Member, 2008 and for Dee Why SLSC: Member, Life Membership Sub-Committee, 2009-2010; Member, Rules and Regulations Committee, 2006-2009; Distinguished Service, 2007; Outstanding Service, 2002; Club President, 1998-2000; Junior President and member since 1983

Trish continues to serve on many committees utilising her considerable talent, and is a former SLSNSW Administrator of the Year and received the International Crisis Response Leadership Award from the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation in 2015.

She has mentored and motivated Club members in all facets of surf lifesaving including Club Presidents and Vice Presidents and Branch Directors.

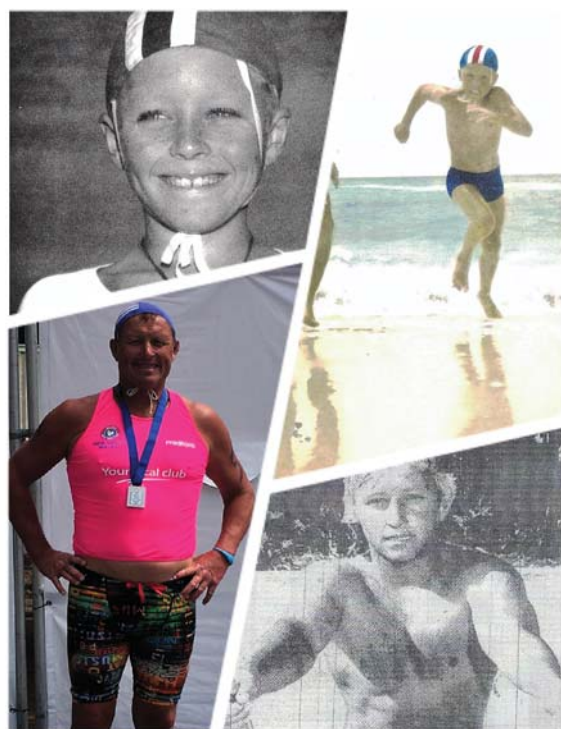

Building Committee Report

The purpose of the Building Sub-committee is to prepare, over five years from 2015, a Strategic plan to explore the potential for commercial activities, including costs of various building works, together with an assessment of the future needs of club members for use of the building that would benefit from improved facilities.

Membership: Susan Sky (Chair), Hugh Long, Allen Lakeman, David Lang, Jeff Tucker, Jenny Graves, Jacqui McLeod, Adrienne Lowe and Warren Hannam.

The inaugural meeting was held on 24 September 2015.

The Club, unlike many other NSW surf clubs, has a Deed of Grant with council. The deed is a key factor in establishing the unique position of DYSLSC as not being a lessee of Crown/Council land but having an equitable interest recognizing the land swap which established the clubhouse on its current location.

The NSW government has a policy in regard to commercial activities on surf club sites, recognising this as a means to assist with funding the functions of surf clubs.

Exploration of commercial use of the Swan Room was carried out with officers of Warringah Council during both the time of the Administrator Mr Dick Persson and after the election for new Councillors held in September 2017.

Exploration of commercial use of the Swan Room was carried out with officers of Warringah Council during both the time of the Administrator Mr Dick Persson and the appointment of the new Council in September 2017. In addition a Modification of a Consent (for a toilet block) application was lodged in November 2017 in order to construct a new storage facility on the Reserve site opposite to the clubhouse, to be shared with Council's lifeguards.

A meeting was held with Council officers in November 2017 where it was established that Council could not give its consent to the Modification of Consent application as the Plan of Management (P of M) for the Dee Why Lagoon Wildlife Refuge does not cover the use of the reserve for storage.

Any additional uses of Reserve land, for example an extension of the existing clubhouse for additional storage, would need to be addressed in a revised or new Plan of Management. Council advised that such a revision could take 18 months. Allen Lakeman as Deputy President has written to Council, requesting an amendment of the P of M and offering representatives the DYSLSC as community members of any stakeholder process to be involved in the P of M preparation. Council may await an amendment to the Local Government Act 1993 to introduce significant changes to the administration of council land as recommended in a 2013 Report on a new Act.

A first step in progressing commercial uses of the Swan Lounge is to prepare a Business Case (BC) to Council. Concept plans will need to be prepared as part of the BC. A quote has been obtained from Bluesky Drafting for the Concept Plan. Progress on these matters is challenging however efforts continue to be made both to improve the club's storage areas and to manage its assets to improve DYSLSC's facilities.

Steve Haggett, Adrienne Lowe, Robyn Parker, Jan Lakeman, Emily Buckle and Allen Lakeman officiated at Branch, State and Aussies in the Lifesaving Events. Steve and Adrienne were appointed to senior roles as

Sectional Referees and Chief Judges. Robyn and Jan set up and implemented a new digital computer-based recording system for the Life Saving Events using their own computers, and through the purchase of software and a printer at their own expense.

Notes of the Financial Statements

Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc

For the year ended 30 April 2018

Summary of Significant Account Policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the Club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

- AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements
- AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows
- AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
- AASB 1031 Materiality
- AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards
- AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Plant and Equipment and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's



carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probably that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Financial Instruments

Recognition, initial measurement and derecognition

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below. Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- loans and receivables
- financial assets at Fair Value Through Profit or Loss (FVTPL)
- Held-To-Maturity (HTM) investments
- Available-For-Sale (AFS) financial assets

All financial assets except for those at FVTPL are subject to review for impairment at least at each reporting date to identify whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. Different criteria to determine impairment are applied for each category of financial assets, which are described below.

Financial Report

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs or finance income, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Association's trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments.

Individually significant receivables are considered for impairment when they are past due or when other objective evidence is received that a specific counterparty will default. Receivables that are not considered to be individually impaired are reviewed for impairment in groups, which are determined by reference to the industry and region of a counterparty and other shared credit risk characteristics. The impairment loss estimate is then based on recent historical counterparty default rates for each identified group.

Financial assets at FVTPL

Financial assets at FVTPL include financial assets that are either classified as held for trading or that meet certain conditions and are designated at FVTPL upon initial recognition. Assets in this category are measured at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss. The fair values of financial assets in this category are determined by reference to active market transactions or using a valuation technique where no active market exists.

HTM investments

HTM investments are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturity other than loans and receivables. Investments are classified as HTM if the Association has the intention and ability to hold them until maturity. The Association currently holds long term deposits designated into this category. HTM investments are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

If there is objective evidence that the investment is impaired, determined by reference to external credit ratings, the financial asset is measured at the present value of estimated future cash flows. Any changes to the carrying amount of the investment, including impairment losses, are recognised in profit or loss.

AFS financial assets

AFS financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that are either designated to this category or do not qualify for inclusion in any of the other categories of financial assets. The Association's AFS financial assets include listed securities.

All AFS financial assets are measured at fair value. Gains and losses are recognised in other comprehensive income and reported within the AFS reserve within equity, except for impairment losses and foreign exchange differences on monetary assets, which are recognised in profit or loss. When the asset is disposed of or is determined to be impaired the cumulative gain or loss recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified from the equity reserve to profit or loss and presented as a reclassification adjustment within other comprehensive income. Interest calculated using the effective interest method and dividends are recognised in profit or loss within 'revenue'.

Reversals of impairment losses for AFS debt securities are recognised in profit or loss if the reversal can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised. For AFS equity investments impairment reversals are not recognised in profit or loss and any subsequent increase in fair value is recognised in other comprehensive income.

Classification and subsequent measurement of financial liabilities.

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payable.

Financial liabilities are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, except for financial liabilities held for trading or designated at FVTPL, that are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss.

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.



Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.


The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity and that this special purpose financial report should be prepared in accordance with the accounting policies outlined in Note 1 to the financial statements.

In the opinion of the committee:

1. The financial report which comprises of the statement of financial position as at 30 April 2018, and the statement of profit and loss and other comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes is in accordance with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and
 - a) complies with Australian Accounting Standards as set out in Note 1; and

Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. (the Association), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 April 2018, the statement of profit and loss and other comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows for the year then ended, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the responsible entities' declaration.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the *Basis of Qualified Opinion* section of my report, the financial report of the Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as at 30 April 2018 presents fairly in all material aspects the financial position of the Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the basis of accounting described in Note 1 to the financial report and satisfies the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth) and the Club's constitution including:

- a) giving a fair and true view of the registered entity's financial position as at 30 April 2018 and of its financial performance for the year ended; and
- b) complying with Australian Accounting Standards to the extent described in Note 1, and Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013*

Basis of Qualified Opinion

I have also fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

I draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Association's financial reporting responsibilities under the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth) and the Club's constitution. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibility of the Committee for the Financial Report

The Committee of the Association is responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth) and the needs of the members. The Committee's responsibility also includes such internal control as the Committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Financial Report

In preparing the financial report, the Committee is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Committee either intend to liquidate the registered entity or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.


Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

Trust Funds

Since 1975 when the late Frank Conroy established an anonymous donor fund, the Club has been the beneficiary of a number of bequests. Committees of the day have nominated these funds outside of general income either by virtue of conditions attached or a desire to provide for the long term future of the Club.

Frank Conroy Scholarship

At the time of his initial donation, Frank expressed the wish that the funds be established to help junior members improve their competitive abilities. To date, grants have been made to junior members to assist in subsidising their costs on professional instruction. In his will Frank hoped, without binding the Club, that the funds should continue in this vain. To ensure that Frank's scholarship continues to support junior members, the committee decided to put some restraints on the monies. It was decided:

- Only the annual interest accrued on the capital be allocated for assistance
- Candidates are chosen through selection criteria laid down by the junior and senior club committees.

James MacLachlan Fund

Jim MacLachlan was an associate member of the Club from 1955 who on his death in 1981 provided for us as a beneficiary in his estate. No specific conditions were attached to the grant. The funds have been invested and the income has been applied at certain times to defray costs of the club patrol efficiency competition.

Betty Barry Memorial Scholarship Fund

The Betty Barry fund was established by the then Ladies Auxiliary to remember the contribution of their late President and Life Member. The Club now administers the fund in similar terms and conditions to the Frank Conroy Scholarship.

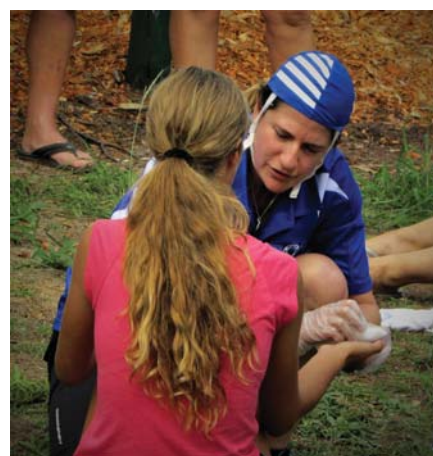
D. BOATS

Proficiencies:

As mentioned Sam, new to the role of proficiency coordinator, did an excellent job of managing proficiencies. Early communication and follow up with all patrolling members and competitors was the key. The proficiencies were scheduled around patrol changeovers and some evening and early morning proficiencies were scheduled. This gave all members the opportunity to attend a proficiency that suited them. By December all scheduled proficiencies were run and a notification was sent to all members that had not yet completed their proficiency to organise to attend a newly scheduled

proficiency or contact and make arrangements. This system worked excellently with all members managing to become proficient without the need of a last minute rush.

Courses:

Our Intensive SRC and Bronze courses run over the October long weekend continue to be successful. This season the radio operators certificate was included as part of the SRC course making that weekend a little more intense, but the candidates managed and all were successful.

Our start of season Bronze course stalled with only one candidate attending the induction. The trainers got together and changed the format, combining with the nipper parent Bronze and putting together a very successful group. With the assistance of the single candidate that attended the first induction we gained several others due to his recruiting skills. Our post Christmas squad, for the first time, was an all-female group. The ladies worked very well and very hard. They had a diverse skill set and encouraged each other along constantly doing additional training and board and surf swim sessions. They were a very enthusiastic group and very excited when they achieved their award.

Even though this season we only had small training groups for the bronze course and the usual volume, this was made up for with the enthusiasm and quality of the members.



We had a small number of members updating their skill set and attaining their ARTC and Spinal management awards. Alex Lakeman, amongst the other awards he gained, attained his Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue and his Gold Medallion this season. The most promising result was the number of members, 14, stepping up to gain their Silver Medallion Beach Management award (Patrol Captain award). They all gained a new appreciation of what was involved in ensuring a patrol is managed and our beaches are kept safe.

This season we had 3 very worthy candidates for the Bruce Richardson Award. Alex Beatty who upgraded from his SRC to Bronze this season in the intensive long weekend course did 100% of his patrols and stepped up to do his ARTC and IRB crew. He showed definite leadership skills especially in the ARTC course. 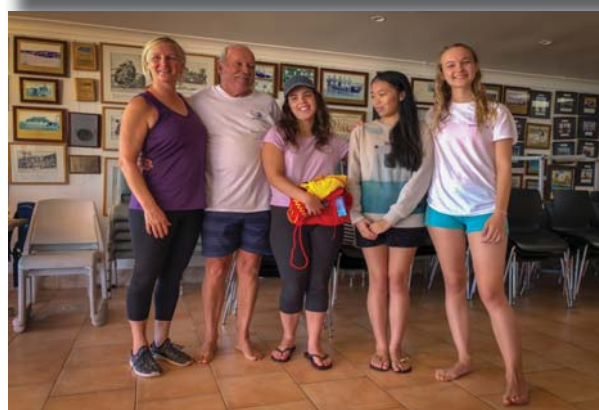

Watching the candidates on patrol they are always keen to keep up their newly learnt skill and get in the boat

whenever possible. They will hopefully be our new drivers in up coming season. Unfortunately we had no candidates for Drivers this season but with a larger pool now to choose from and the enthusiasm in the current crew members we should get some new much needed IRB drivers.

The way forward:

After 5 seasons as the CTO I am looking to continue my career in a different direction in surf lifesaving. Over the last 2 years I have restructured the position in order to assist with succession planning. With the sharing of the workload and the satisfaction gained from training new members and watching them develop I look forward to seeing new and fresh ideas and enthusiasm come through from my successor. I am confident that the high quality and standard of training will be maintained and that the entire training group will support them fully.

The corresponding camp at Orange was held in March and it also marked the 10th anniversary of the establishment of Orange Bush Nippers and our association with them – so congratulations to our friends in Orange and the work they do promoting Nippers and Surf Lifesaving.



Over the course of the season we only had 2 weekends out of 21 when we could not go in the water because of the surf conditions. Unfortunately it just happened that those 2 weekends also coincided with our Club Championship rounds. Hopefully next season our luck improves and we can hold all 4 rounds without being affected by the weather.

Junior Activities Report
