# Vale - Tommy “Wockeye” Hand - 1938-2021

Tom tried to join the Club in 1957 but couldn't swim eight laps of Dee Why pool (440 yards) in 7 and a half minutes. He then got called up for National Service until 1961 after which he caught up with former school mates who coaxed him into joining the Surf Club in the 1962-63 season gaining his Bronze Medallion. He gained his Resuscitation Certificate in 1970-71, Instructors Certificate in 1973-74 and ARC in 1975-76.

During the late 50's and 60's he was a keen motor bike competitor on the local dirt tracks scattered around the peninsular, a skill he happily demonstrated to the members of the 1974 Dee Why instructional team that toured Bali which he was a part of and got a great kick out of teaching the Balinese how to row a boat.

He became a regular competitor on the board and ski over many years and was a part of the team that swept the 1970-71 Branch long board and malibu team events. Tom also had a love of beach sprinting. There was a cricket team at Dee Why Surf Club when he joined and all the team were sprinters. He regularly placed in Board and Beach Sprint events in Club Championships from the mid 1970's to 1980 and later played beach football for the Club.

Even though he had little knowledge of surf equipment his first position was Gear Steward in the 1963-64 season which he held for the next 4 seasons. The following was recorded in the Annual Report of that season: “If a starting point for the lift in the Club has to be found, it could possibly be traced to the preparation of our gear for the start of the season, as this was the first time we went on show. Tom Hand (Gear Steward) burning the midnight oil, presented gear for the S.L.S.A. inspection of a standard that raised our position in the points table from the lower levels in 1962-63 to a close fourth, a fact that earned very favourable comment from Association officials.”

“It should be known that the work done was on existing gear by way of maintenance and general care, as no new equipment was purchased especially for the inspection. We were indeed fortunate to have Tom to maintain the gear, which was kept in A1 condition throughout the season.”

It is worth mentioning that gear in that era consisted of six Reel, Line and Belt sets which were laid out on the beach by the Patrols, plus a dedicated set for the R & R Team and the March Past.

Tom earned even greater praise in the next Annual Report accompanied by his photo which is reproduced here in part: “1964-65 saw the same member undertake the dual position of Gear Steward and Boat Captain, and working on the identical equipment, took the necessary steps so that we were judged as having the top gear in the Branch. This status, which we have never before achieved, set the stage for what was to follow. Too much cannot be said for Tom's efforts in the preparation of the gear, a job that he achieved almost entirely on his own, and we must surely owe him a vote of thanks that must go beyond the recording of our gratitude in this report. With the close of the season, we can be assured that all our gear will be in complete readiness for another year.”

Traditionally the wooden surf boats were carefully varnished during the off season, another task in which Tom excelled. He also received an honourable mention for a rescue: “...which involved a group of members raised by Boat Captain Tom Hand, who [rowed out and] recovered a catamaran and it's crew after the craft had capsized off Long Reef and was in danger of being blown to sea in a stiff westerly.”

Billy Gee was stepping down as Boat Captain after the 1963-64 season and asked Tom to take over. Tom was shocked as he knew nothing of boats. His first experience was one Sunday morning when there was a surf race on and needed a duty boat out the back. They had four crew but no sweep and asked Tom – who had never swept before. And that's how it began. He served as Boat Vice Captain for the 1965-66 and 1966-67 seasons during which he started taking a junior crew to carnivals and returned as Boat Captain in 1967-68 holding that position until 1987-88 when he moved to Queenscliff as there were no crews at Dee Why. He returned as Boat Captain for the 2000-01 to 2002-03 seasons. With no other crews at the club at the time and with his love of rowing he returned to Queenscliff where they wanted him for a crew.

He won his first Gold medal at the Manly Warringah Branch Championships and over his 50+ year career amassed a total of 61 SLS Championship medals – Australian 2 gold 2 silver 6 bronze, State 2 gold 5 silver 3 bronze, Metropolitan 2 gold 4 silver 2 bronze and Branch 12 gold 11 silver 10 bronze almost exclusively in surfboats but also board teams and an Over 70's Beach Flags bronze at Nationals. He enjoyed coaching the juniors – he liked to see their development and over his career it is estimated that he coached and mentored hundreds of rowers, if not more, as well as a few sweeps along the way.







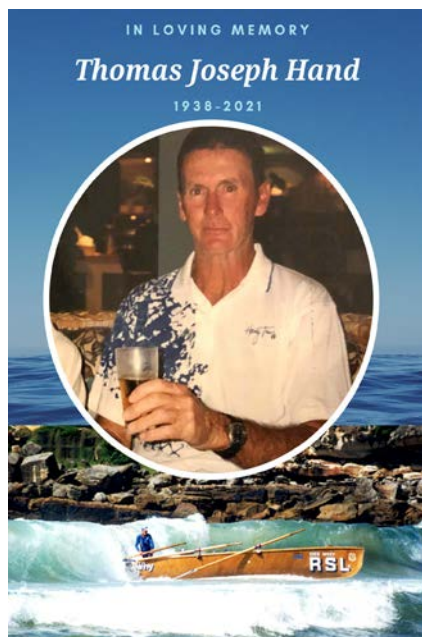
Steve Scott – club member, sweep at Collaroy and a PE teacher at Killarney Heights High School rang to tell him he had some kids interested in rowing. In their first season the crew of Tom Hand – Sweep, Gary Palmer, Dave Lang, Peter Young and Craig Bell were 3rd at Manly Warringah Branch, 4th at Metropolitan Championships, 2nd at State and 4th in the final at the Australian Titles. They stayed together and had a phenomenal season in their second year, winning Manly Warringah Branch, 2nd at Metropolitan, first at State and Gold at Nationals at Trigg Island WA. At that time Clubs had to enter an Open Men's crew in order to compete in other grades and the junior crew would have qualified for the Open final if Tom hadn't stopped them just short of the finish line as he was concerned about a possible re-run in the junior final.

One of his most memorable victories was the win with the Reserves at the Australian Titles at Blacksmiths in 1994 with the crew of Mark and Shaun Ballesty, Bill McLerie and Ashley Cardiff who lead from start to finish.

He had another crew in 2001-02 who showed great prospects and won Branch and Metropolitan Titles then made quarter finals at state and fourth round at Aussies, however they were not available to continue their success the next year.

He was awarded Clubman of the Year in 1970-71 and Life Membership of the Club on 29 August 1976, the same year he became a NSW SLSC Boat Inspector. Not long after he became a National Council Boat Inspector. He received his 25 Year Patrol Service and Long Service Awards in 1988, 30 and 40 Year Long Service Awards in 2009 and his 50 Year Long Service Award in 2014.

The Club has lost a true legend and we offer our most heartfelt condolences to his wife Lynne and children Cherene and Thomas Junior.

# DYSLSC Awards - 2019/2020 Season

## Prominent Service

### **Courtney Campbell**

Courtney joined DYSLSC as a nipper at age 6 and has grown with the club to the point where she is now a Patrol Captain and training Bronze candidates. She takes time to ensure all candidates are following the material and moving forward as a team. If she notices a candidate falling behind, she will take the time to offer different perspectives and techniques to engage with the task. If she does not know the answer to a question she will research and report back.

A committed and inspirational member of Dee Why SLSC Courtney has continued to develop her skills within the organisation as uses her experience and ability to enhance our club.

Courtney is working her way through the suite of SLSA Awards, having completed the Advanced Resuscitation Technique Certificate, Silver Medallion IRB Driver, Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue, Silver Medallion Beach Management and Silver Medallion Advanced First Aid awards. She has also attained a Certificate III in Public Safety and enrolled as a Probationary Bronze Trainer. Additionally, Courtney has been accepted into the Rescue Watercraft Operator Course which began in June 2020.

As Captain of Patrol 6, Courtney successfully oversees the largest Patrol at Dee Why. They are an enthusiastic team that continues to avoid major rescues through their preventative measures. This mindset was apparent in Courtney's support of our Club Captain's initiative to extend Patrol by 1 hour from 21st December 2019 to 27th January 2020. Her Patrol had 4 shifts within that timeframe and she successfully coordinated her team at short notice to ensure all positions were covered.

During 2019, Courtney joined the Education Team as a Probationary Bronze Trainer. She opted to contribute more broadly to Surf Lifesaving by participating in the Female Mentoring Program initiated through SLSNSW. We celebrate her ongoing commitment and contributions to the organisation.



### **Colin Kjoller**

Colin is one of our members from the Orange Bush Nippers Group who has been a member for 8 years. Not only does he have an exemplary record of patrolling, putting in the extra time to help out on other patrols and having more patrol hours than many active members, he has stepped up and attained additional awards including his Silver Medallion Beach Management to assist on patrol.

Colin's efforts go beyond patrolling hours. He puts in a great deal of time training the new SRC and Bronze members from Orange, ensuring they are ready when they come to Dee Why and competent even before they start their course. This goes beyond just a few sessions in the pool at Orange but includes working with them on all their dry skills and taking additional time, before and after patrols and on weekends when the Orange patrol is not rostered, to work with them on their board skills in the surf.

Colin is a strong promoter of ensuring that the members on his patrol are always doing things and keeping their skill levels up. He does this by leading by example and being active and positive on patrol.



### **Mark MacKenzie**

Mark joined the club 9 years ago, starting as a nipper parent working his way up to Age Manager, a position he held for 6 years. It wasn't long before he took on the top job in nippers, Junior Activities Coordinator, an integral part of the Management and Executive Committee. The Junior Activities Coordinator is one of the biggest and busiest jobs in the club, and Mark threw everything into it.

Mark has also been an official for 4 years, representing Dee Why by fulfilling our requirements and enabling our members to compete at both junior and senior levels. He was awarded Sydney Northern Beaches Official of the Year in the 2019/2020 season.

He is an avid promoter of encouraging other nipper parent members to improve themselves by initially becoming parent helpers, and then going forward to become Bronze holders, officials and coaches. The pool of nipper parents is our largest pool of potential new Bronze members and Mark does well to tap into this, not just for the good of the nippers but looking at the bigger picture and the good of the entire club. Mark also has actively followed up on sponsorship, securing the Channel 10 sponsorship and Icon Homes sponsorship.

Mark is another member that joins in on club fundraising events where possible and helps out in any way he can.



## **Andrew Vezzola**

Andrew has been a member of the club for 12 years, mainly as a nipper parent and is a Nipper Parent Representative on the Committee. As a non patrolling member Andrew manages to have a large degree of involvement in the club, from being a regular feature at the BBQ, setting up and packing down for nippers and all club events, assisting with Ocean Thunder, assisting on all the Dee Why fund raising events and with the Dee Why social events.

Over and above this Andrew has put in his time with the maintenance of the club from general repairs and improvements to assisting with the refurbishment of the Youth Room and down stairs office. He has also put in countless hours working towards the refurbishment of the Betty Barry Room. Andrew is always there to assist when club members are called upon and just gets in and gets things done

## **Outstanding Service**

### **Steven Polley**

Steven Polley is a young member that has come up through the ranks of nippers and become an effective and crucial member of the Dee Why team. He has been a member of the club for 12 years and over that time has completed over 2,000 patrol hours at Dee Why and additional volunteering at Surfcom brings his total to in excess of 4,500 hours. Steve is always there to help out, always on patrol as rostered, or as a sub or volunteer.

A crucial part of patrol is an IRB driver, he has answered the call countless times to step in and help out ensuring not only compliance for the patrol but more importantly that the beach is safe.

Steve has helped out in all club fundraising activities, even before he was old enough to patrol. His service hours to Dee Why speaks for itself. Steve is one of the few 20+ youth members in the club and is still enthusiastic and keen to put in the time.

### **Ron Tyson**

Ron has been an active member for some 15 years. He is an enthusiastic Patrol Captain, a position he has held for more than 6 years, but more so an enthusiastic IRB driver.

Even having been awarded Long Service last season, Ron still volunteered, at crucial times, 60 hours this season alone. He has patrolled over 850 hours in total.

Ron has been an Age Manager for in excess of 10 years, always on the beach helping out or in the IRB doing necessary water safety for the Nippers. He assisted with courses and trained IRB drivers and crews, holding the position of IRB Captain for several years. He was also the IRB Coordinator for Nippers for several years. Ron is one of those members that is always happy to sub in for patrol and be out there, encouraging the youth members and ensuring the new IRB crew members get some time in the boat.

## **Distinguished Service**

### **Darren Armitage**

Darren has been a member of DYSLSC for over 17 years. He is an integral part of the Dee Why SLSC operations. He has been a Patrol Captain for 15 years and has patrolled over 1000 hours during his membership. He has been involved in Bronze training and IRB training for over 15 years and has also been an IRB Assessor for 8 years. He is always there to fill in and assist.

In the 2019/2020 season Darren stepped up as a Club Vice Captain to assist and ensure continuity of patrols and help with getting the gear ready. He has been involved in getting gear such as boards, tubes and IRBs ready for in excess of 10 years.

Darren assists with coaching nippers several times a week in both beach and water events, both during the season and in the off season and is committed to the development of our future patrolling members. He has been an Official for over 5 years, officiating for Dee Why at carnivals, does water safety in the IRB and is a fundamental member of the team when setting the courses for carnivals at Dee Why. He makes himself available to assist in all club fundraising events including the Pub to Pub and Sun Run. He is also a member of the important after hours call out team.





## **Vivienne Cresswell**

Vivienne has been a member of DYSLSC for more than 20 years. Although she could have applied for Active Reserve or Long Service long ago, Vivienne has been a diligent Active Patrol member as she believed it was important to patrol. She has been a Patrol Captain for 12 years, patrolling in excess of 800 hours over her patrolling years.

Over and above her faultless record in patrolling, Viv has been involved in training for most of her surf lifesaving career. She has run a start of season course, producing many strong Bronze members. As a regular surfer, she goes the extra mile to assist with board skills and is keen to follow up on the candidates once they start patrolling.

Viv also assists with the proficiencies ensuring that all members are up to date and competent. She ensures that she is up to date by attending branch Board of Education meetings, having an input and ensuring Dee Why is recognised and considered.

Viv has also been an Assessor for over 12 years, representing Dee Why ensuring that we do our part in ensuring the quality of the candidates.

She is a member that helps out where needed and with her necessary skill set training and volunteering ensures the smooth functioning of the club.

She is a worthy recipient of the Bruce Richardson Award and Senior Club Person of the Year Award.

## **Adrienne Lowe**

Adrienne joined DYSLSC in October 2002 and obtained her Bronze Medallion in December of the same year. In her first season she obtained a total of 6 Surf Life Saving awards and won the club's Bruce Richardson Medal, awarded to club members who achieved and used their awards and new skills to benefit the club.

She has been a Patrol Captain for 12 seasons and has completed over 1200 patrol hours at club and branch level.

Adrienne has been a training officer since 2003 and continues to train members for the Bronze, Surf Rescue Certificate, Advanced Resuscitation and Spinal Management awards, including annual proficiency testing for the members.

Over the last 18 years she has demonstrated continuous and ongoing commitment to the conducting of assessments at both the club and branch level. She has been extensively involved in Education, Lifesaving, Competition, Administration, Member Development and Support Services. She has also contributed to the local community. This work was recognised by Warringah Council in winning 2010 Citizen of the Year.

She has held numerous committee positions including Assistant Chief Instructor, Chief Instructor, Club President, Building Committee and WH&S Officer, a position she currently holds. She has also been a member of a number of panels and selection committees and has been the recipient of many awards including IRB Crewperson of the Year, Club Person of the Year, SNB Assessor of the Year, National Assessor of the Year.

As President, she coordinated an appeal for the victims of the Victorian Bushfires. DYSLSC donated the profits from the Ocean Thunder Boat Carnival and Nipper BBQ held over the weekend and provided a collection point for public donations.

Adrienne oversaw and liaised with Committee members to develop a program designed to teach children from rural Orange water safety and surf skills. DYSLSC hosted a three-day camp for Orange and Dee Why Nippers. This program continues to the present day and has expanded to educate members living in Orange in the SRC and Bronze Medallion awards.

Warringah Council hosts the Australia Day Breakfast at Dee Why Beach. Adrienne was directly responsible for coordinating events with Warringah Council.

Adrienne as Assistant and Chief Instructor designed and presented new member induction and information sessions. She has been instrumental in implementing improvements in the Bronze Medallion assessment process. She has worked extensively with potential Surf Life Savers candidates to improve their swimming skills, volunteering swimming training and coaching. Adrienne still offers her coaching services to new club members and those working towards their Gold Medallion.



In 2012 Adrienne nominated and was selected by SLSSNB to be the Branch Bronze and Gold Medallion Advisor. In this role Adrienne has had a hand in developing and improving the Central Venue Guidelines. She also worked closely with Branch to formulate the Central Venue assessment calendar and has worked with Clubs to host assessments.

In 2014 Adrienne was elected by the SNB Board of Management as Branch Director of Education, a position she currently holds.

## **Matthew Molina**

Matt joined Dee Why as a Nipper Parent in 2005 quickly moving on to gain his Bronze Medallion in March 2006 and just kept going from there, adding awards such as IRB Crew, Driver, Bronze and IRB Trainer and Assessor, Surf Coach and Surf Official just to name a few. He has been an Age Manager for 14 years and is a Patrolling Member wracking up over 1,000 patrol hours over his 14 years to date.

Matt has worked tirelessly over the many years to mentor and train our young and senior members alike. He has devoted himself to the club and Surf Lifesaving and has been instrumental in improving club facilities, improving club processes, maintaining a high standard on the beach to reflect a positive image for the club and Surf Lifesaving and has introduced initiatives to improve nipper and patrolling members skills, confidence and participation.

He has shown his commitment to the club through his roles as Nipper Coordinator, Club Captain, Chief Training Officer, Sponsorship and Building Development Committee, as well as several years serving on Branch committees. He is involved in officiating at carnivals and participation in training and assessments. Matt was recognised for his contribution to training when he was awarded the 2014/15 Trainer of the Year at the SNB Awards of Excellence.

In 2017/2018 Matt developed a “100K Winter” program during the ‘off’ season which runs from May to the end of September. The concept is that nippers commit to completing 100km of mixed paddling and swimming in order to maintain their skills and to adapt to new craft required for the ensuing season. In May 2019 it was extended to Bronze Medallion patrollers and a 500K element, combining swimming, board paddling, ski paddling and running was added to improve fitness and skills required on patrol.

Matt has been involved with the relationship between Dee Why SLSC and the Orange Bush Nippers since the partnership started as a Big Brother Movement initiative in 2007. The initiative has seen 43 members from Orange and its surrounds achieve their SRC and/or Bronze awards. As a result, Dee Why has 2 patrols chiefly made up of these members who regularly travel to fulfil their patrolling commitments.

Matt is always actively involved in club fundraising events including Sun Run, Ocean Thunder and Pub to Pub. He has organised nippers to be present at community events such as the annual parade at Warringah Mall, the ANZAC Day Service and Australia Day Colour Party on Dee Why Beach as well as other miscellaneous events as required.. The long and varied list of Matt’s contributions over this season and previous seasons is a testament to Matt, not only as a Surf Lifesaver but as a person. Matt exemplifies what the spirit of Surf Lifesaving and volunteering is all about and what it is to be a true volunteer. He has shown leadership across every facet of our organisation and motivates members to achieve their potential. With Matt there is no job half done he always goes the extra mile to make sure he delivers the best that he possibly can. Matt’s passion, leadership and commitment to Surf Lifesaving drives others to want to do more. He is a worthy recipient of Distinguished Service.



## **David Spink**

Dave has been a member of DYSLSC for more than 17 years. As a long serving member of Dee Why SLSC, he may not be as visible as some, but is well and truly someone who works for the benefit of the club. He was a Patrol Captain for 6 years and has patrolled over 600 hours during his membership to date. He is now a Long Service member, but is happy to fill in whenever required on patrol.

Dave has assisted with getting all the gear ready for gear inspection for more than 10 years. In times of need, while not holding the official IRB Captain position, Dave has stepped in where necessary to ensure the IRB and area are rescue ready. He is a diligent IRB trainer and as well as training the Dee Why members he has set aside additional time to specifically train the members from Orange. He has also been an IRB Assessor for more than 8 years.

Dave became a Bronze trainer to help out when there was a shortfall in trainers. He put his hand up to become the Club’s Member Protection Officer, seeing the need for a more formalised position and went about formalising procedures and managing this through the committee. Dave always makes himself available to assist with the running of Bronze and IRB proficiencies. He is also a member of the important after hours call out team.

Greg has served on the Management Committee in a variety of positions, including Club Vice Captain, Club Captain, IRB Captain, Chief Instructor, Assistant Chief Instructor, Publicity Officer and Marketing and Sponsorship for 18 years where, in a number of seasons, he took on an extra position no-one else wanted to do.

Bruce Richardson, the then Chief Instructor recognised Greg's passion for education and suggested he join the instructing team and he hasn't stopped since, gaining his qualifications in 1995/96 (that's 25 years of effort including a number of seasons as Chief Instructor!), putting through innumerable candidates in SRC, Bronze, ARC and so on to bolster patrols, all trained to the high levels that he and the Club expect of candidates.

He gained his Level 1 Competition Official accreditation in 1998/99 and commenced officiating at carnivals in a number of disciplines and eventually moved into announcer roles at

Branch, State and National levels. He has also been involved in

conducting 5 Beach to Bush Surf Education programmes run by SLSNSW.

Greg was a volunteer at the Sydney 2000 Olympics stationed at the sailing venue in Rushcutters Bay, was a first aid volunteer for the 2008 World Youth Day at Randwick Race Course and has assisted in Red Shield Appeals for the Salvation Army.

# Secretary's Report

# Administration Report

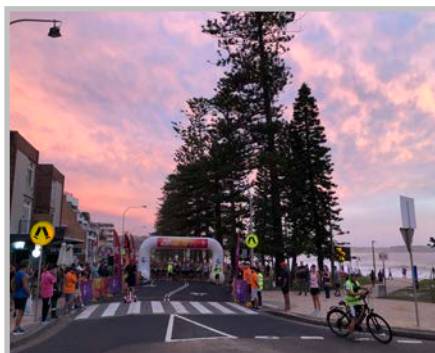

This season became a very different environment for all of us and in order to comply with the various restrictions imposed by the Federal and NSW Governments I was appointed as the COVID-19 Safety Officer for the Club in addition to my regular administrative duties. I would like to compliment our members on how well they have adopted and complied with the restrictions and procedures required as we navigate the COVID-19 world. I know that it has been difficult for some members to understand why we implemented some of the procedures that we did, I even overheard the phrase “over the top” on one occasion, but I have taken my role as COVID-19 Safety Officer very seriously and feel that it is my personal responsibility to keep our community safe. Thankfully our club did not become a ‘hot spot’ as a couple of our neighbouring clubs did, and I thank our members for complying with our very high standards of hygiene to prevent that. It has certainly been a roller coaster ride from not being able to procure any hand sanitiser, masks or gloves to receiving ample supplies from Branch given to them by an anonymous donor. I would particularly like to thank one of our Nipper Age Managers, John Flood, for his very generous donations of these products at a time when my back was to the wall with supplies.

Like all Surf Life Saving Clubs it has been very difficult to comply with the NSW and Federal Government requirements of operating a COVID-19 safe venue, as we do not fit in to their standard business models. I have had to adapt our COVID-19 safe practices by picking the eyes out of various COVID-19 Safety Plans and when we were inspected by a NSW Health Official he came to understand the difficulties this posed to SLS clubs. At the start of the season, when restrictions were still high, we required 6 separate COVID-19 Safety Plans for the various activities conducted within and by the club. Thankfully many of the restrictions we experienced then are no longer required and we are starting to get back to some of the freedoms we knew BC (before COVID-19). However, one of the conditions that I believe may stay with us permanently is registering attendance via the QR code so we must stay vigilant with this practice.

This last year has seen a few repairs and improvements to the club building for which I liaised with council to find solutions. In January 2020 I commenced communications with the Northern Beaches Council regarding the replacement of the roller doors on the eastern side of the building which had suffered from storm damage and the wear of time. After quite a drawn-out process Austral Monsoon replaced all 4 doors at the end of July.

In February the Northern Beaches Council ran the Sun Run which was the first major running event held in NSW post COVID-19 restrictions. I would like to thank all of the members who woke up crazy early and volunteered their time to assist with this. Unfortunately we couldn't have our usual brekkie afterwards, but hopefully by the time the Beach2Beach run (formerly Pub2Pub) is held this August, we might be able to and I look forward to the support of our generous community for that one too!





# President's Report

I took on the role of Club President this season as I saw a need not only to come up with new fresh ideas and methods but to ensure the implementation of them. I have taken on several projects and initiatives to ensure that the club moves forward and remains current and relevant. All these projects and initiatives are great ideas but require the support of the Committee and membership to ensure their success. Due to COVID-19 and other circumstances, these may not have progressed at the rate I would have liked but progressing all the same.

The members of the Executive and Management team are all working together towards the same goal of ensuring our club is current and up to date. As a club we will never ignore the invaluable knowledge of our experienced members and will always take their guidance and historical knowledge into account. We hope to couple this with the enthusiasm and fresh perspective of new keen members prepared to step up to ensure that there is a pathway for innovative ideas and methods and that we keep up with changing times, technology, and culture.

One of the tasks involved in this is to update our constitution, primarily written almost 30 years ago, with some updates done along the way, ensuring it is up to date and relevant to our current environment and how things are now done. A sub-committee has been put together to ensure that we not only follow the required rules of the corporations' act and do not contradict SLS Branch, NSW or Australia constitutions but that rules and regulations relevant to our specific club policies and workings are clear and unambiguous. This is a task that has been started and hopefully completed at the end of the 2021-22 season to be reviewed by the membership and voted on.

One of the initiatives I took on, with a great deal of assistance from my Deputy President Emily Buckle, was to create a strategic plan and streamline the management of the club. Looking at a simplified approach to the committee and by breaking it up into Departments, Lifesaving, Education, Finance, Administration, Junior Activities, Surf Sports, and Member Services, we hope to have more productive meetings and allow the Department heads to manage their team more effectively. This new management approach will be reflected in the positions offered in the 2021/22 season. In our strategic plan, our focus is on our members and our core business, providing a safe environment on the beach for the community. We will do this by ensuring we continue to provide the required and necessary services to the community and that we create a welcoming inclusive environment for our members and recognise their contributions. Our members are the key to an effective implementation of our core business and in the current socioeconomic environment it is essential we keep them happy and committed and understand the current pressures and limitations that they face when attempting to manage

their time as a volunteer. It is also essential to ensure that we appropriately recognise our volunteers and record their service. A great deal of this recognition process is related to how volunteer activities are being stored and I am currently working on new procedures to ensure that all volunteer activities are being stored, not just patrols. We have also created an honours subcommittee so that our members are suitably recognised in a timely manner and that there is a level of consistency in this process.

There was a great deal of focus on our members this season. With lockdowns and the club being restricted for member functions and socialising Justine worked to engaging the members where possible. Her Friday friendlies program encouraged all members, competitive or not, to come down and improve their essential lifesaving skills in a fun and friendly environment with some socialising afterwards where possible. Justine also took the initiative to run (when we could in this COVID-19 restricted world) affordable theme nights at the club just to enhance the socialisation of all members of the club. These events were set to run once a month, kicked off with a Mexican night followed by an Italian night with more to follow. These events started off slow and due to COVID-19 attendance was limited but I am sure that they will grow in popularity.

A great deal of thanks is due to our club sponsors, who throughout this difficult financial period have continued with their support. Considerable effort goes in from Peter Hatfield working and communicating with the sponsors and understanding their needs. Even in this uncertain time Peter is fielding calls from companies requesting the opportunity to become a club sponsor.

The COVID-19 virus cut last season short and had a massive effect on everyone this season. It hit close to home with an outbreak on the Northern Beaches in December. Even though this was a great focus, especially in relation to background procedures, our key department leaders ensured that it did not affect the necessary operations that apply to our core business, keeping our beaches safe.

Before we could even start with patrols and our normal surf club operations, COVID-19 plans were required to

comply with legislation and for the safety of our members. Our Club Administrator, Justine Head, worked tirelessly to ensure all COVID-19 safety plans were ready for the start of the season. Plans for patrols and for training, building access protocols for contact tracing, plans for nippers and for events once restrictions eased. This was not just a one-off job. Restrictions and rules were constantly changing which challenged the patience of Justine along with the patience of the membership.

Mark Mackenzie and the Patrol Captain's Team was the first to be hit. Justine created notes and briefed all patrolling members as to the required protocols, cleaning procedures and expectations on patrol. Once this was dealt with and it was understood that we were not the COVID-19 police, it was patrolling as usual.

Thank you to all members for your understanding of the mandatory COVID-19 restrictions and any inconvenience they caused. We appreciate the time and patience you devoted to engaging with the protocols and ensuring they were followed. It was great to see everyone working so well together to minimise the risk of undue exposure.

Last season a change to patrolling hours was put forward due to the number of after-hours rescues that occurred within one hour of the beach closing, when there was still plenty of daylight and the beach was still busy. This change was fully implemented this season, with lifesavers patrolling until 7pm during the peak Christmas holiday period. The Council and Lifeguards also supported the change and extended their hours as well. The entire community witnessed the necessity and positive impact of this change.

The drone project also had an impact on our club. Even though we were not a beach listed as an SLS volunteer drone venue, several of our members gained their qualifications in this new and likely to be mandatory method of beach surveillance. We were requested to host a program in conjunction with the Department of Primary Industries (DPI) where every weekend, drone pilots would fly observing our beach and recording and collating data. On top of this there would be a drone available and training for our members to use for surveillance and lifesaving activities. The project needs additional work and some more thought to be implemented correctly, but it is the way forward.

New course formats coupled with the COVID-19 requirements and restrictions presented some challenges to Felix Forbes and his training team. Investment in water rescue dummies assisted with safe training processes and exposed new and existing trainees to the complexities of managing an unconscious patient that cannot assist with the rescue. The enthusiasm of the candidates was in no way diminished by the required enforced COVID-19 protocols and there was no decline in the number of new or existing candidates gaining awards.





### Bronze Training Group

Dee Why has always been a keen host for central venue assessments and this season was no exception. Even though there were restrictions to the numbers allowed at assessments, as a club we were happy to host anything from SRC/Bronze to ARTC and IRB assessments and happy to be a backup in case of poor conditions at other venues, even to the point of running an assessment after the season had finished to ensure candidates from any club could finish their bronze assessment, some had started training at the start of the season only to have their assessment cancelled due to poor weather or conditions or COVID-19 restrictions. They were thrilled to have finally achieved their goal.

Our Nipper program was also impacted by the COVID-19 guidelines, particularly regarding maximum group sizes and finish times. The Nipper Committee managed this by implementing a simple format split shift, running two sessions every Sunday. With the support of council and patrol starting an hour early for nippers, we could ensure that flags were up by 8 am. This protocol proved to be a big winner and enabled nippers to run smoother than it ever has. With fewer nippers on the beach at the same time and parents outside of the field of play,

there was more time and attention for activity. Our Junior Activities Coordinator, Muni Duerinckx, and his team of age managers, water coordinators and water safety were able to get through more activities and able to give individual attention where needed. With the restriction that parents need to either be an official helper or water safety to be in the field of play, we had more volunteer helpers and water safety than we ever had. Even though there can be nothing positive said about the COVID-19 pandemic, the management processes created have forced us to think differently and change some of our operations, and in this case, for the better.

As with every season, all our U14s do their SRC assessment and participate in the Junior Lifesaver of the Year (JLOTY) program. With all of the changes to the SRC course and COVID-19 restrictions, the young 13 year olds did an exceptional job on the intensive course over the October long weekend. Following this, all our SRC holders participated in the JLOTY program and the successful candidates, Mikey Molinia and Rosemary Cooper represented Dee Why at a Branch level with pride.



Dee Why was once again very active in surf sports, running the Bennett Craft Carnival and a round of the Fast Fives along with hosting the Ocean Thunder series. With only a small number of competitors we were still well represented. Our officials were involved in all carnivals, many in senior roles from Branch Carnivals to Championship Carnivals such as State Championships and Aussies. There is a great deal of depth from Junior and Senior beach and water carnival to lifesaving events and it is great to see these dedicated people continue to give up their time and pass on their experience.

As with many clubs we are always looking to improve our facilities to better serve our community. Allen Lakeman and his expert team of

developers have been tirelessly working to have the northern end of the club extended to give us some much-needed storage space. This will enhance our ability to move forward with operations and give us some additional balcony space for our members at the north end of the building.

With Dee Why hosting one of the support skis during the season and taking on the hosting of training in the upcoming off season for the Jet Skis along with working with the DPI with their drone program, space is getting tight, and the extension will be a welcomed upgrade.

A club is unable to effectively run on its own and get everything done. I would like to thank the Management Committee along with all club members for their contribution. I would like to give a special thanks to Emily Buckle, recipient of the DYSLSC President's award this season, for all of her enthusiasm and work throughout the season especially in relation to the administration and documentation of the changes proposed in moving the club forward. As volunteers we are asked for a lot and it is great to see that the answer is an enthusiastic yes.

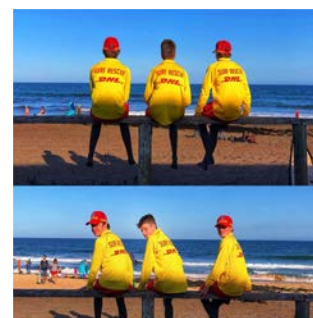

The stand out performance of the carnival went to Wayne Weisse and Peter Sharkey who fought hard in the Double Ski 60 to 64 years to take out 3rd place.

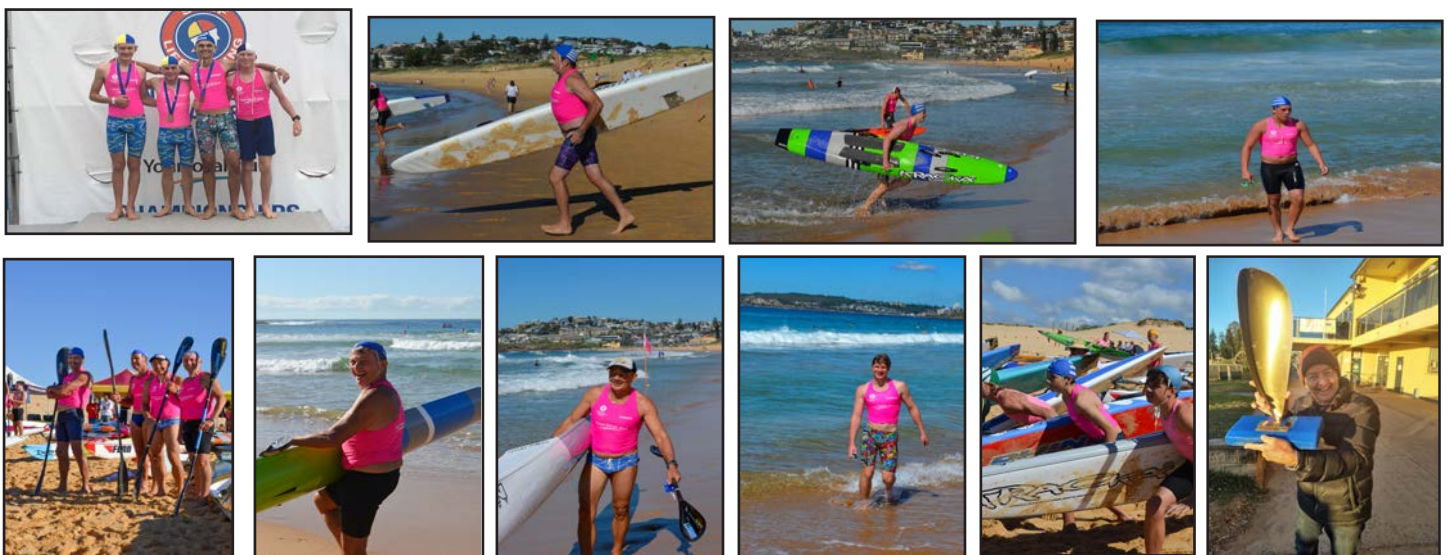

# Junior Competition Report

We were very lucky on the Northern Beaches to be able to participate in competition during the 2020/21 season as many other regions held no carnivals apart from their own branch events. One of the benefits of this was the number of competitors from other branches attending our local events giving our kids a great opportunity to test themselves and get an eye on the opposition prior to the State Championships.

Unfortunately, we did miss out on a couple of carnivals due to the Christmas lockdown and poor weather, but we did get to enjoy 3 water and 2 beach carnivals as well as our Branch Championships and the State Championships. I was delighted to see how many of our Nippers who had never attended a carnival before 'gave it a go' and my great hope is that even those who chose not to attend another competition keep attending the training sessions in order to improve their skills which will ultimately keep them safe in the ocean. Eden was the Branch Champion in flags for the Under 13 girls and came in 5th at State, while Elio won the Silver medal at Branch and the Bronze medal at State in the Under 12 boys 1km beach run. 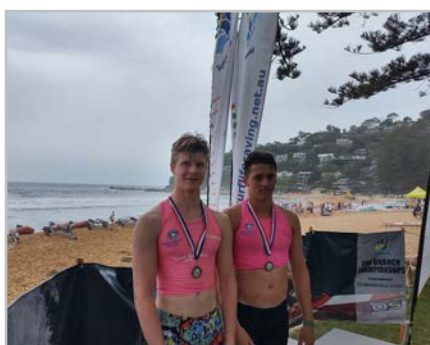

# Building and Development Report

*- Allen Lakeman*

Since 2018 the club has successfully been involved in progressing plans for the extension of the Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club clubhouse.

The proposal is to increase the storage of the clubhouse by the provision of additional area for surf patrol and safety equipment to the northern side of the clubhouse of an area of 6.5 metres by 14 metres. In addition, the storage area would be covered by a new deck recreational adjacent to the first storey of the clubhouse over the new storage area of 6.5 by 17 metres.

The additional storage would house more IRBs, PWCs, surf safety equipment as well the equipment for the Council Life Guards.

Allen Lakeman and David Spink were involved in arranging a sponsor Kinga Monaghan of Blue Sky Building Designs to prepare the concept plans in 2018 for the extension of the existing clubhouse as a club sponsor.

On 9 October 2019 Allen obtained Council's consent to the extension.

Allen then lodged the application for the pre-DA lodgement meeting with council staff and attended the meeting on 28 November 2019 with Ms Monaghan. There were six members of council present covering not only planning issues, but storm water, coastal erosion and traffic considerations. The Pre-Lodgement Advice opposed the new development principally on the ground that the local Dee Why Lagoon Wildlife Refuge Plan of Management did not authorise such a development.

Allen wrote to and arranged meetings with the Northern Beaches Council CEO Mr Ray Brownlee and staff of Council. Allen liaised with the individual Councillors and was given great support from Councillors Stuart Sprott and David Walton.

In order to facilitate an amendment to the Plan of Management, Allen arranged a letter box drop at adjoining properties and meetings adjacent neighbours personally about the plan.

After lodging pre-DA application for and attending meeting with Council staff, liaising with the CEO and council staff for amendments to the Dee Why Lagoon Wildlife Plan of Management to permit the DA to proceed, Allen attended the Council meeting at Council Chambers on 15 December 2020 to address Council on the proposed amendments.

The Council passed the resolution to open the amendments to the Plan of Management to public comment between 22 January and 19 March 2021.

207 submissions were received by Council of which 192 were supportive, 3 were supportive with changes, 1 was neutral and only 11 were not supportive.

On 27 April 2021 Allen again attended and addressed the Councillors. The motion to amend the Dee Why Lagoon Plan of Management was passed unanimously by the council and the club was given permission to lodge the Development Application.

The Club is now in a position to lodge the formal Development Application.

Allen, David and Susan Sky are proceeding with the proposal in obtaining the documentation required in the Pre-Lodgement Advice, including the master design plans, site analysis documentation, a survey, the Statement of Environmental Effects, Building Code of Australia report, a wastewater report and storm water diversion plans and an erosion and sediment report.

As the club has the Council's consent (and support) and with the amendment to the Plan of Management, Allen is confident the club will obtain a Development Consent in the coming months.

The members of the Club's sub-committee, Susan Sky (planner) and David Spink (builder), should be thanked for their assistance and Kinga Monaghan of Blue Sky Building Designs who provided the plans as a sponsor, as well as the council staff who prepared the report for Council.

## Notes of the Financial Statements

Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc  
For the year ended 30 April 2021

### Summary of Significant Account Policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and the club's constitution. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows

AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 1031 Materiality

AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards

AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

### **Income Tax**

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

### **Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)**

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

### **Depreciation**

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment(excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

### **Provisions**

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

### **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

### **Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors**

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

### **Revenue and Other Income**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.



## Financial Instruments

### Recognition, initial measurement and derecognition

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below.

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. Financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

### Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets.

Except for those trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component and are measured at the transaction price, all financial assets are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs (where applicable).

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)
- equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

Classifications are determined by both:

- The entities business model for managing the financial asset
- The contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables, which is presented within other expenses.

### Subsequent measurement financial assets

#### Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost if the assets meet the following conditions (and are not designated as FVPL):

- they are held within a business model whose objective is to hold the financial assets and collect its contractual cash flows
- the contractual terms of the financial assets give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding

After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Association's cash and cash equivalents, trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments as well as long-term deposits that were previously classified as held-to-maturity under AASB 139.

#### Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)

Financial assets that are held within a different business model other than 'hold to collect' or 'hold to collect and sell' are categorised at fair value through profit and loss. Further, irrespective of business model financial assets whose contractual cash flows are not solely payments of principal and interest are accounted for at FVPL. All derivative financial instruments fall into this category, except for those designated and effective as hedging instruments, for which the hedge accounting requirements apply (see below).

#### Equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (Equity FVOCI)

Investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading are eligible for an irrevocable election at inception to be measured at FVOCI. Under Equity FVOCI, subsequent movements in fair value are recognised in other comprehensive income and are never reclassified to profit or loss. Dividend from these investments continue

to be recorded as other income within the profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents return of capital.

### **Impairment of Financial assets**

AASB 9's impairment requirements use more forward looking information to recognize expected credit losses - the 'expected credit losses (ECL) model'. Instruments within the scope of the new requirements included loans and other debt-type financial assets measured at amortised cost and FVOCI, trade receivables and loan commitments and some financial guarantee contracts (for the issuer) that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Association considers a broader range of information when assessing credit risk and measuring expected credit losses, including past events, current conditions, reasonable and supportable forecasts that affect the expected collectability of the future cash flows of the instrument.

In applying this forward-looking approach, a distinction is made between:

- financial instruments that have not deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition or that have low credit risk ('Stage 1') and
- financial instruments that have deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition and whose credit risk is not low ('Stage 2').

'Stage 3' would cover financial assets that have objective evidence of impairment at the reporting date.

'12-month expected credit losses' are recognised for the first category while 'lifetime expected credit losses' are recognised for the second category.

Measurement of the expected credit losses is determined by a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of the financial instrument.

### **Trade and other receivables**

The Association makes use of a simplified approach in accounting for trade and other receivables and records the loss allowance at the amount equal to the expected lifetime credit losses. In using this practical expedient, the Association uses its historical experience, external indicators and forward-looking information to calculate the expected credit losses using a provision matrix.

### **Classification and measurement of financial liabilities**

As the accounting for financial liabilities remains largely unchanged from AASB 139, the Association's financial liabilities were not impacted by the adoption of AASB 9. However, for completeness, the accounting policy is disclosed below.

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payables.

Financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value, and, where applicable, adjusted for transaction costs unless the Association designated a financial liability at fair value through profit or loss.

Subsequently, financial liabilities remeasured at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for derivatives and financial liabilities designated at FVPL, which are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss (other than derivative financial instruments that are designated and effective as hedging instruments).

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.

### **Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

### **Inventories**

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

### **Accounts Payable and Other Payables**

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

# Independent Auditor's Report

## **Qualified Opinion**

I have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. (the Association), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 April 2021, the statement of profit and loss and other comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows for the year then ended, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the responsible entities' declaration.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis of Qualified Opinion section of my report, the financial report of the Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as at 30 April 2021 presents fairly in all material aspects the financial position of the Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the basis of accounting described in Note 1 to the financial report and satisfies the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth) and the Club's constitution including:

## **Basis of Qualified Opinion**

The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Association's financial reporting responsibilities under the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth) and the Club's constitution. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

## **Responsibility of the Committee for the Financial Report**

The Committee of the Association is responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth) and the needs of the members. The Committee's responsibility also includes such internal control as the Committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the Committee is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Committee either intend to liquidate the registered entity or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

## **Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report**

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion.
