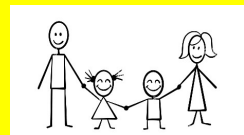

# President's Report

G'day fellow members and all other interested parties,

It gives me great pleasure to report that the season 2023/24 ran well at the beautiful Dee Why Beach. Across our Life Saving patrols, Nippers, Surf Sports, Training and Education much fun was had, new friendships were made and many old friends caught up.

I would like to extend a huge thank you to all our members for their ongoing dedication to beach safety, particularly those who continually volunteer their time in all the many different capacities that keep a Club like ours functioning and successful.

Dee Why beach continues to grow in popularity with the public, with over 400,000 visitors joining us across the patrolled hours of the season. Increasingly, many visitors travel long distances to grace our beautiful stretch of sand, including a growing number of whom it may be one of their first proper visits or swims at an Australian beach. We are very conscious of this shifting demographic, and increasingly vigilant that surf safety education is an ever more important part of beach safety.

Our number of Patrolling members grew this season, despite the ongoing increase in other commitments on the time of our volunteers. Likewise, we saw strong growth in our Nippers membership, with the spectacle of hundreds of pink-rashie kids, age managers, water safety and the associated boards/flags/IRBs and other trimmings being an amazing sight to see each Sunday morning. One of the many highlights for me this season - watching an U14s Age Manager giving a sign off speech for the final time, after taking a group of beach-scared hyperactive 6yr olds all the way through to graduating, about 20 of them as SRC qualified surf life savers, must be one of the more touching moments in surf life saving.



Throughout the year, the Club organised or participated in a wide range of Carnivals and social events that contributed to the vibrancy of our community, including our members providing the starting line volunteers for both the Sun Run and Beach-to-Beach fun runs, and cooking thousands of sausages and cup-cakes for the public at our weekly Nippers BBQs and the Warringah



Mall Ducks-for-Duckies event. Our First Aid team devised a new initiative to upskill our members with a handy weekly 5-minute first aid lesson/revision, with this First Aid Fridays initiative later rolled out to a general public audience to much acclaim.



Dee Why members again made up the largest contingent of the NSW SLS Beach-to-Bush program and this year also became the largest group within the SLS NSW Beach Safety Presenter team. Amongst these two initiatives, our members collectively made over 100 visits to present Beach Safety to well over 10,000 people at schools, TAFES, universities, community groups and events across NSW.



Indeed, our membership also increasingly travels some distance to the beach, and not just from over the bridge in Ku Ring Gai – our list of member LGAs continues to grow, including an exceptionally dedicated and sizable group of two Patrols that travel all the way from Orange in Central West of NSW several times a season to commit to a full patrolling workload. These members are to be congratulated for their ongoing efforts, including that it's always a great weekend for everyone at the Club whenever the Orange patrols are in town.

During the season our members achieved 146 new awards, including 21 SRCs, 3 Radio Operator Certificates, 29 Bronze Medallions, 62 First Aid, 18 Advanced Resuscitation Techniques, 7 IRB Crew, 4 IRB Drivers and 2 Silver Medallion Patrol Captains. A truly outstanding



effort! Well done to all candidates who showed the perseverance and determination to enrol and complete these courses, but also a huge thank you to all our Trainers, Assessors, Facilitators and Content Experts who faced this long season with calmness and positivity. Lifesaving education is the gateway to our Club, and it is this dedication that keeps us moving forward. Interestingly - whilst we have no specific diversity targets on any of these courses, over two-thirds of our new award attainers this season were female.

Like many Clubs we are currently targeting upgrades and improvements of our building and associated facilities. The current Club House is the 4th in DYSLSC's long history and was granted to the Club via Deed in the early 1970s. Whilst we are proud of this building, and it is still in good health overall - much has changed in life saving over the past 50 years, and an upgrade to our female members' changing rooms and an extension of our life saving storage areas are priority projects that we are currently working hard to bring to fruition.

Thank you to all our Club sponsors and donors for their ongoing support without which we would struggle to be able to provide the equipment and training we need to be so effective on the beach. Through sponsorships, grants and other fundraising we have this year been able to successfully purchase a new IRB Motor and IRB Hull that will be available for the start of next season, in addition to a full suite of replacement defibrillators (AEDs) and range of new equipment to support the growth of our Nippers programs. We also placed 2 public access AEDs along the Dee Why foreshore in association with Northern Beaches Rotary. Thank you - Active Automotive, Advantage Healthcare Support, Apex Signage, Beaches Sea-Doo & Can-am, Bennett Surf Co, Chocolate Box Training, Dee Why RSL, DHL, IGA Dee Why, Nickelodeon, Upstate Real Estate, Rod Finlayson Remedial Building and URM.



On behalf of the Committee, I would like to express our appreciation to everyone involved with and supporting our Club – our Members and their families, the Club and Branch Sponsors, Branch Staff, Assessors, Officials, our fellow Clubs, the Council Lifeguards, Northern Beaches Council and all those who have supported us throughout the year. We are cautious that we must not rest on our laurels, and that next season will bring many new challenges. May we continue to rise to these.

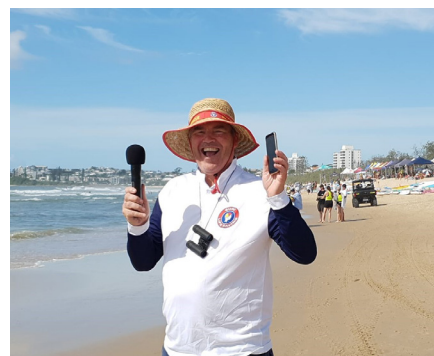
Club President Lachlan Pike took on some beach events and the 2k swim, while Deputy President Phil Thomas provided the transport for our gear up and back.

# Building and Development Report

*- Allen Lakeman and Susan Sky*

On 11 October 2023, the Management Committee resolved pursuant to Rule 22.1 of the Club's Statement of Objects and Rules to re-appoint the sub-committee known as the Building and Development Committee including Allen Lakeman (Chair), David Lang, Hugh Long, Susan Sky and David Spink.

The functions delegated to the sub-committee were to liaise with Northern Beaches Council staff and elected councillors and to proceed with the proposed Development Application for the equipment storage area and deck to the north of the existing clubhouse and the balcony adjacent to the Betty Barry Room (the DA), and to instruct such persons or companies to prepare reports to support the DA as may be required by Council.

On 28 November 2019, Allen Lakeman with planning consultant Kinga Monaghan attended a pre-development lodgement meeting (PLM) with officers of the council. As part of the pre-lodgement advice from the meeting, documents that were to accompany the development application included a coastal engineering report and a storm water management plan. The planning officers, however, rejected the application on the basis that the clubhouse already occupied all the area the club was entitled to under the local government plan of management.

On 27 April 2021, Northern Beaches Council adopted a motion to amend the Dee Why Lagoon Wildlife Plan of Management to permit the extension of the Surf Club northwards to include the additional storage area for safety equipment, and a balcony above the storage area.

Since the initial PLM in 2019, the State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP) Transport and Infrastructure 2021 has come into force and the previous SEPP Infrastructure 2007 has been repealed. The SEPP Transport and Infrastructure 2021 allows the club's proposal to proceed as an Emergency Service Facility where the development is permitted without consent.

On 14 March 2024, a second PLM was attended by Allen Lakeman, Susan Sky and Lachlan Pike with Council planners and other staff to discuss this path, including:

- the application of Part 5 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act
- the preparation of a Review of Environmental Factors (REF) and
- the Council acting as a Determining Authority rather than a Consent Authority under Part 4 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act.

The club has obtained most of the documentation required for the determination, principally the architectural plans (Fistum Gerber) and the survey and site analysis plans (Warren Bee). The outstanding documentation includes the Coastal Erosion Report (to be prepared by James Carley, Water Research Laboratory, Manly) and the storm water plans (Cameron Read).

Once these documents have been obtained, Susan and Allen and other club members will prepare the REF to be lodged for determination with the Council's Manager of Building Assets, Building, Design and Infrastructure as a Council project rather than through the State Planning Portal.

## Notes of the Financial Statements

Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc  
For the year ended 30 April 2024

### Summary of Significant Account Policies

The financial statements cover Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as an individual entity. Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW).

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and the club's constitution. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the Club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements  
AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows  
AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors  
AASB 124 Related Party Disclosures  
AASB 1031 Materiality  
AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards  
AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

## **Income Tax**

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

## **Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)**

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

## **Depreciation**

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

## **Employee Provisions**

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

## **Provisions**

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

## **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

## **Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors**

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

## **Revenue and Other Income**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.



Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

## **Financial Instruments**

### **Recognition, initial measurement and derecognition**

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below.

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

### **Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets**

Except for those trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component and are measured at the transaction price, all financial assets are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs (where applicable).

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)
- equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

### **Classifications are determined by both:**

- The entities business model for managing the financial asset
- The contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables, which is presented within other expenses.

### **Subsequent measurement financial assets**

#### **Financial assets at amortised cost**

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost if the assets meet the following conditions (and are not designated as FVPL):

- they are held within a business model whose objective is to hold the financial assets and collect its contractual cash flows
- the contractual terms of the financial assets give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding

After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Association's cash and cash equivalents, trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments as well as long-term deposit that were previously classified as held-to-maturity under AASB 139.

### **Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)**

Financial assets that are held within a different business model other than 'hold to collect' or 'hold to collect and sell' are categorised at fair value through profit and loss. Further, irrespective of business model financial assets whose contractual cash flows are not solely payments of principal and interest are accounted for at FVPL. All derivative financial instruments fall into this category, except for those designated and effective as hedging instruments, for which the hedge accounting requirements apply (see below).

### **Equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (Equity FVOCI)**

Investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading are eligible for an irrevocable election at inception to be measured at FVOCI. Under Equity FVOCI, subsequent movements in fair value are recognised

in other comprehensive income and are never reclassified to profit or loss. Dividend from these investments continue to be recorded as other income within the profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents return of capital.

### **Impairment of Financial assets**

AASB 9's impairment requirements use more forward looking information to recognize expected credit losses - the 'expected credit losses (ECL) model'. Instruments within the scope of the new requirements included loans and other debt-type financial assets measured at amortised cost and FVOCI, trade receivables and loan commitments and some financial guarantee contracts (for the issuer) that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Association considers a broader range of information when assessing credit risk and measuring expected credit losses, including past events, current conditions, reasonable and supportable forecasts that affect the expected collectability of the future cash flows of the instrument.

In applying this forward-looking approach, a distinction is made between:

- financial instruments that have not deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition or that have low credit risk ('Stage 1') and
- financial instruments that have deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition and whose credit risk is not low ('Stage 2').

'Stage 3' would cover financial assets that have objective evidence of impairment at the reporting date.

'12-month expected credit losses' are recognised for the first category while 'lifetime expected credit losses' are recognised for the second category.

Measurement of the expected credit losses is determined by a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of the financial instrument.

### **Trade and other receivables**

The Association makes use of a simplified approach in accounting for trade and other receivables and records the loss allowance at the amount equal to the expected lifetime credit losses. In using this practical expedient, the Association uses its historical experience, external indicators and forward-looking information to calculate the expected credit losses using a provision matrix.

### **Classification and measurement of financial liabilities**

As the accounting for financial liabilities remains largely unchanged from AASB 139, the Association's financial liabilities were not impacted by the adoption of AASB 9. However, for completeness, the accounting policy is disclosed below.

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payables.

Financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value, and, where applicable, adjusted for transaction costs unless the Association designated a financial liability at fair value through profit or loss.

Subsequently, financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for derivatives and financial liabilities designated at FVPL, which are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss (other than derivative financial instruments that are designated and effective as hedging instruments).

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.

## **Leases**

### **Prior Treatment**

Finance Leases were capitalised, recording an asset and a liability.

Leased assets were depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Finance leases were allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remained with the lessor, were charged as expenses in the periods in which they were incurred.

### **New Accounting Standards Introduced**

AASB 16: Leases (applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2019) replaces the previous accounting requirements. AASB 16 introduces a single lessee accounting model that eliminates the

requirement for lease to be classified as operating or finance leases.

The main changes introduced by the new Standard are as follows:

- recognition of a right-of-use asset and liability for all leases (excluding short-term leases with less than 12 months of tenure and leases relating to low-value assets);
- depreciation of right-of-use assets in line with AASB 116: Property Plant & Equipment in profit or loss and unwinding of the liability in principal and interest components;
- inclusion of variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate in the initial measurement of the lease liability using the index or rate at the commencement date;
- application of a practical expedient to permit a lessee to elect not to separate non-lease components and instead account for all components as a lease; and
- inclusion of additional exposure requirements.

AASB 2018-8 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Right-of-Use Assets of Not-for-Profit Entities allows that where the lessee is a not-for-profit entity, the lessee may elect to measure right-of-use assets on a class-by-class basis at initial recognition at fair value in accordance with AASB 13 Fair Value Measurement for leases that have significant below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives. AASB 1058 Income for Not-for-Profit Entities addresses the recognition of related amounts.

In addition, where a lessee is a not-for-profit entity and elects to measure a class or classes of right-of-use assets at initial recognition at cost for leases that have significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives, the lessee shall disclose additional qualitative and quantitative information about those leases which shall include, but is not limited to, information that helps users of financial statements to assess:

- a. the entity's dependence on leases that have significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives; and
- b. the nature and terms of the leases, including:
  - i. the lease payments
  - j. the lease term
  - k. the description of underlying asset; and
  - l. restrictions on the use of the underlying assets specific to the entity.

The disclosures so provided by a not-for-profit entity shall be provided individually for each material lease that has significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives or in aggregate for leases involving right-of-use assets of a similar nature.

## **Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

## **Inventories**

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

## **Accounts Payable and Other Payables**

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

## **Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies**

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

### **Estimation uncertainty**

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

**Impairment**

In assessing impairment, management estimates the recoverable amount of each asset or cash-generating units, based on expected future cash flows and uses an interest rate to discount them. Estimation uncertainty relates to assumptions about future operating results and the determination of a suitable discount rate.

**Useful lives of depreciable assets**

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain software and IT equipment.

**Inventories**

Management estimates the net realisable values of inventories, taking into account the most reliable evidence available at each reporting date. The future realisation of these inventories may be affected by future technology or other market-driven changes that may reduce future selling prices.

**Long Service Leave**

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

**Related Party Transactions**

The Association's related parties include its key management personnel and related entities as described below.

Unless otherwise stated, none of the transactions incorporate special terms and conditions and no guarantees were given or received. Outstanding balances are usually settled in cash.

**Transactions with related entities**

The Association had no transactions with related parties during the financial year.

The Association sourced goods and services from members at market rate during the financial year. All related party services and contracts are approved by the Committee.

**Transactions with key management personnel**

All key management personnel and volunteers are not compensated for holding office positions.



### Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

I have audited the financial report of Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. (the Association), which comprises the Statement of Financial Position as at 30 April 2024, the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income, Statement of Changes in Equity and Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended on that date, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the Declaration by Members of the Committee.

### Auditor's Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial report of Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. has been prepared in accordance with Div 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth)* and the *Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW)*, including:

- (a) giving a true and fair view of the Association's financial position as at 30 April 2024 and of its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended; and
- (b) complying with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements and the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013*.

In accordance with the *Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (as amended) (NSW)* and the *Charitable Fundraising Regulation 2008*, in my opinion, except for the effects described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph:

### Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting

I draw attention to Note 1, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Association's financial reporting responsibilities under the *Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth)*, the *Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW)*, the *Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW)* and the Club's constitution. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter

### Responsibility of the Committee's for the Financial Report

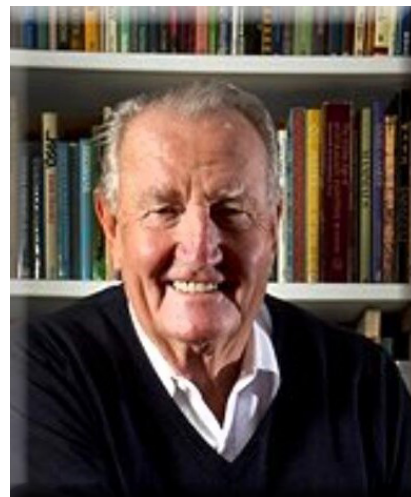
