


# Vale

Dee Why SLSC wishes to extend our condolences to the families of all those members who are no longer with us. Some of these members include:

## Howard (Bruce) Thorn

Bruce joined Dee Why in the 1963/64 season and was a member of the Club until 2019. He gained his Bronze Medallion in November 1963 and was a valued patrol member, receiving his 25 Year Patrol Service Award in 1993. His wife, Margaret, recalls that Bruce would work a half day on Saturday and travel from their home in Windsor to the beaches where they stayed with friends whilst Bruce patrolled on the Sunday, before returning home later that afternoon. He only stopped patrolling in 1972 as commute times had greatly increased due to population increases and more traffic. He received various Long Service Awards, including his 50 Year Long Service in 2014.



The Club was pleased to fulfil Bruce's wish to have his ashes scattered beyond the first line of breakers at Dee Why Beach.

We offer his wife Margaret and family our sincere condolences.

## John Thornhill

Raymond John Thornhill, or John as he preferred to be called, joined our Club in 2003 and gained his Bronze Medallion in 2004 and his Advanced Resuscitation Certificate in 2006. On completing his Bronze he proudly patrolled as a Lifesaver from 2004 through to 2007. In 2014 he rekindled his association with our Club patrolling from 2015 through to 2017.



He was a familiar sight around Dee Why Beach, especially in the ocean pool.

His last wish was to feel the Dee Why sand between his toes and the salt water on his forehead. Family and friends sprinkled his casket with Dee Why water and sand.

We thank his family for the donation made to the Club and offer our sincere condolences to his family.

## Howard (Howie) Jack

Howie joined the club in the 1997/98 season and gained his Bronze Medallion in 1999. In the same year went on to obtain the Silver Medallion IRB Driver Certificate. The following season he completed the Silver Medallion Patrol Captain Award. In 2002 Howard became an IRB Trainer, later taking on the role of IRB Assessor and the Club's IRB Captain.



During his time at Dee Why Howie was best known for his passion for IRBs, spending many a long hour servicing and repairing motors in the 'old' IRB shed just south of the main clubhouse. He helped the Club with annual gear inspections, ensuring the IRBs were in pristine patrol condition. Around the Club if an IRB was involved Howie was there to help, be it training, assessing or assisting with numerous water safety events including Sunday Nippers, Bronze training, Surf Carnivals, and our DY2K Ocean swim.

In 2007 Howie became an IRB surf sports official leading to the reformation of the DYSLSC IRB racing team, who went on to compete at the State Titles.

Howie passed away in September 2022. We offer his daughters Cate and Amanda our sincere condolences.

Member Services have also put together a new unofficial patrol category, Lifesaver on Land. This was trialled for the first time this year, and it was extremely successful. # President's Report

Moving into what looked like a year going back to normal, a great deal of focus was put into the members this season. As a club we believe that keeping our members happy, not by diluting responsibility but by creating a friendly welcoming environment, is the key to member retention. We do not want our members to feel they have to do anything, rather that they want to be there, to want to stay back and help, be a part of our club and be involved. This is an ongoing challenge with more responsibility and work being put on each and every member, from executives to patrolling members and nipper parents, but there are no problems, only challenges, and working on resolutions not roadblocks.

Our Member Services Department, led by David Spink this season, kick started a new initiative, the Lifesaver on Land (LOL) program in conjunction with the Education Department. New members, who may be unsure about their swim and board skills, complete their First Aid and Radio Operators Certificate whilst training with a Bronze squad, learning all the dry skills involved with being a patrolling member. From here they are able to patrol as an integral part of the team with a view to accomplishing the wet components in order to complete their full Bronze Medallion. It is a great stepping stone and encouragement for members who do not have the confidence to step straight in to the Bronze, and as they are trained with a squad they build relationships with other members and feel part of the surf community.



Our club room upgrade was completed and opened in December. The new room is now available for all of our members. Events such as Choppers Kitchen (*pictured left*), a monthly event aimed to create a social atmosphere for members and their guests, is one example of how the room can be used to provide our members with recreational activities over and above lifesaving obligations. I would like to thank Dave Spink for all of his time and effort managing and implementing this long overdue project and making it happen.

As a club we are always looking for ways to raise much needed funds for our gear and equipment. With the upgrade of our licence and all restrictions being relaxed, hall hire in the Swan Lounge is rebuilding slowly. A concerted effort is now required to take advantage of this asset and realise its full potential, ensuring that our core business of lifesaving and our membership are still a priority. The running of integral fundraising events such as the

Beach2Beach, Sun Run and a club trivia night raised much need funds after the drought of income over Covid. Justine was an integral part in the organisation and management of these events, almost single handedly pulling them together.

Dee Why members work outside the club environment to assist in spreading the message for surf lifesaving and safety on our beaches. We had three members, Adrienne Lowe, Lachlan Pike and Justine Head participate in the Beach to Bush program (*pictures below*). We also had several members who participated in live streams for International Refugee Day and the rainbow beaches events. As a club we embrace diversity and a welcoming environment for all of our members - as the ocean does not discriminate nor do we.



Junior Activities has moved forward with great strides. Our Junior Activities Coordinator, Lee, has managed to not only maintain our numbers this season but grew them, one of the only clubs in the branch to have a positive membership retention in nippers. With the help of the Age Managers and Parent Helpers Dee Why ran a fantastic, fun and educational program, even with difficult conditions and weather at the start of the season. It is great to see an influx of members committed to the nippers by taking up coaching and surf sports roles, doing a great deal of additional work outside normal Sunday nippers. Competition in nippers is not about winning and losing, although this is a valuable lesson learned, it is about participation and improving skills and confidence in the water with an aim to becoming future patrolling members. Watching the weekday afternoon training session, it was great to see a large number of nipper participants surrounded in a sea of orange water safety vests in all types of conditions.



Training and Education had a slow start this season with difficult conditions and poor weather delaying the completion of our normal intensive courses. We suffered low numbers in new bronze candidates this season but the training group ensured that there was no diminishing in the quality of the awardees. As usual a great deal of effort was put in by our IRB team in training essential Drivers and Crew, a constant battle every season. A great deal of work was required this season for compliance and proficiencies, which stretched our resources of assessors and delegates, and tested the resolve of some members with proficiencies becoming very time consuming and complicated. A great result this season was one of our members, Herve, becoming an endorsed facilitator, able to run first aid courses for our members, removing the financial burden of having to pay for a first aid course and thus giving our members the convenience of doing the course in house. Herve's enthusiasm also stretched to Orange where he travelled to run their courses.

Dee Why continued with support of surf sports, supplying senior officials for carnivals, hosting of the Dee Why Bennett and Fast Fives carnivals along with hosting Ocean Thunder, now a high profile SLSA event. We had a strong masters team but had difficulties maintaining U15 - Open competitors. Hopefully the Surf Sports Coordinator can assist with growth in this area next season.

The Club Captain's team managed to motivate members, even with extended time on patrol to match daylight savings hours, which resulted in significantly less after hours call outs, and early starts when nippers started early. As a club we work well with the council lifeguards, a cooperative approach with consultation as opposed to direction makes for an efficient and effective team. To reduce the number of patrols required by each team, a 2 year trial of upskilling members on a patrol and then splitting to make 2 patrols was implemented, resulting in a 20% reduction in the number of patrols required to be completed in a season. The split patrol does a morning and afternoon shift on same day and support each other with subs. This program has been implemented with two patrols successfully.

One of the privileges of the Club President position is being able to award the President's Award. This award is in recognition of a member showing outstanding commitment to Dee Why and taking initiative to move things forward and fill gaps where required. The recipient of the award this season was Chris West (pictured right). As a nipper parent Chris is not only a committed Age Manager but also the Gear Steward. Only completing his Bronze Medallion last season, Chris was a nominee for the Bruce Richardson award, conducting himself so well in the assessment that the assessors on the day commented that he would be a very capable trainer. Over and above all of this Chris took on the role as a Water Coach for nippers, completing the arduous course and dedicating himself to training and carnivals. Chris also did his Official's course. As a new Official, Chris performed so well that he was requested specially at the State championships to officiate. Not only did Chris happily agree to do this but he took two days off work during the week to do so. I am a strong advocate of recognising new members who do work and especially those who do a lot of the work behind the scenes. Chris is the epitome of this member and well deserving of this award.

On a personal note I will be stepping down from the Management Committee, taking much needed time out, after more than 15 years of filling positions from Junior Activities Coordinator, Chief Training Officer, Club Captain and President. I have taken on several initiatives in my time that will take time to be realised and I understand that not all projects I have started have been completed but I am hopeful that if the value in the projects is seen they will be continued. I have always been an advocate for moving forward and having new members with new ideas coming through to move the club forward. ## Skills Maintenance (Proficiencies)

He sets up the booking forms, provides ample communication to ensure each member is aware of upcoming sessions and undertakes all the checks and balances to maintain records in Surf Guard. It is a huge task to undertake, and we thank those members who work with the education team by keeping an eye on the calendar, booking early, and turning up on time.

Our utmost appreciation goes to the assessors and delegates that ran proficiencies this season, particularly Matt Molinia, David Spink, Darren Armitage, Greg Punch, Herve Vichemont, Cameron Read and Bruce Richardson. We appreciate the effort you put in to ensuring our members' skills are sustained to the highest standards.

## Courses

While Post-Covid enrolment numbers are down for all aspects of volunteering across the board, we still had new members contacting us and club members continuing their education at the club. We started the season with the SRC to Bronze and Intensive Bronze Medallion courses also ran our Spring Bronze Medallion Course. We ran a Bronze Medallion and IRB crew course during the Summer. This year also saw the introduction of a new award pathway – Lifesaver On Land was developed by David Spink and Matt Molinia as a way for Bronze candidates complete the dry sections of the course and join a patrol.

# Surf Sports Report

## - Surf Sports Department

Another tough season for surf sports with several carnivals in the Branch being cancelled.

Dee Why once again, with the help of a few committed volunteers, hosted the Junior Bennett Craft Carnival and one round of the Fast Fives. The second round was cancelled due to poor conditions. It is great to see events held at Dee Why. The team ensures that they are well run and it brings in much needed funding and exposure for our club.

There is more to surf sports than just attending and competing at carnivals. There is a great deal of training required by the competitors and a commitment of officials and water safety necessary to allow us to compete. I would like to make special mention of the following people that made competing for Dee Why possible:

- Our coaches, both senior and junior, especially our new junior coaches, Alex Suhr, Neil Kaffer and Chris West who attained their qualifications and filled the gap to ensure that our juniors are well trained and committed.
- Our water safety team, on boards and tubes at junior carnivals, especially Alex Suhr who filled all the requirements as IRB driver for the carnivals we attended. Without these committed water safety members, we would not be able to compete.
- Our Officials, who are among the most experienced and most sought-after officials in the branch, holding senior positions at all carnivals. Special mention to Chris West who was specially requested at the State Championships to officiate and took time off work to do so.

Thank you to Justine Head and Evette Wenlock, our Senior and Junior Carnival Coordinators who ensured all entries were put in, that no one missed out and that the competitors had everything they needed on the day, including their state team gear.

This season our nippers did us proud at carnivals. After numbers dropped off, a revitalised and keen group proudly represented Dee Why at all carnivals from local events to State Championships, constantly improving as the season progressed and achieving well deserved results. The results can be found in the junior activities section of this report.

In all clubs and branches, the numbers in the Open category are progressively reducing. Between commitments to other sports and life pressures, the competitor base is diminishing. Dee Why is in no way immune to this with our Open section and U15 to U30 age group consisting of just Mikey Molinia and Aiden Armitage representing the club this season and winning a Bronze medal in the 2x1km beach run at Branch Championships. Unfortunately, it is a very small team with only Mikey attending the water events at the State Championships. Hopefully from the juniors we can start to develop and rebuild this team.

### **Masters Competition Report - Peter Hatfield**

In the Masters category, once again a small but determined group of members represented the Club at carnivals around the state. All Masters competitors take great pride in representing the club.

The group trains during the week and twice over the weekend during the competition season, with longer paddles over the winter months. Most of the group have taken up surf sports during their 40's and have become proficient, competitive athletes over the years proving it is never to late to start.

It was great to see one time Dee Why Nipper and Interbranch Team representative Hayden Quinn making a comeback to the 35/39 age group this season, and the Club's oldest Masters competitor Ian Nicol returning with some great results at Branch and State.

The friendships and comradery you build within the club and with fellow competitors is something we love and one of the reasons we still show up every year and have a go.

We have certainly had our ups and downs over the years and lady luck hasn't always been on our side.

Hard training, determination and fitness don't guarantee success, but lack of the aforementioned will almost certainly result in failure.

The team represented the Club at Fast Fives, Freshwater, Branch and the State Championships, which were held at Queenscliff.

Branch Championship were held at Collaroy. We sent a strong team and represented the club in almost every event on the water, both team and individual. The team collected numerous Gold, Silver and Bronze medals throughout the day and left the carnival pumped for state.

Our team consisted of Martin Quinn, Barry Marshall, Ian Nicol, Peter Hatfield, Geoff Crittle, Neil Smith, Hayden Quinn, Peter Sharkey and Wayne Weisse. Our Team Manager was Phil Thomas.

Carnivals don't always go as planned. A bad start or a rogue wave can ruin your race and your chance of a medal. Examples of this year, Life Member and perennial competitor Marty Quinn tore his calf muscle whilst attempting to win a medal in the Board at State, then Hayden Quinn, who had claimed Silver in the Tube, was disqualified on a technicality, only to be approached by a very apologetic official the next day who admitted they got it wrong. To Hayden's credit they shook hands and got on with the carnival. That's the true spirit of sportsmanship on display in surf lifesaving. We are all life savers, we are all volunteers, and at the end of the day we are all good mates.

As we were not attending the Australian Championships being held in Perth, our goal was to have our best results at State Championships held at Queenscliff, which was achieved.

## Notes of the Financial Statements

Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc  
For the year ended 30 April 2023

### Summary of Significant Account Policies

The financial statements cover Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as an individual entity. Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW).

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and the club's constitution. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the Club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

- AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements
- AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows
- AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
- AASB 1031 Materiality
- AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards
- AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

### **Income Tax**

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

### **Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)**

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

### **Depreciation**

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

### **Employee Provisions**

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

### **Provisions**

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

### **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

### **Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors**

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

### **Revenue and Other Income**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

## Financial Instruments

### Recognition, initial measurement and derecognition

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below.

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

### Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

Except for those trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component and are measured at the transaction price, all financial assets are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs (where applicable).

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)
- equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

### Classifications are determined by both:

- The entities business model for managing the financial asset
- The contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables, which is presented within other expenses.

### Subsequent measurement financial assets

#### Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost if the assets meet the following conditions (and are not designated as FVPL):

- they are held within a business model whose objective is to hold the financial assets and collect its contractual cash flows
- the contractual terms of the financial assets give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding

After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Association's cash and cash equivalents, trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments as well as long-term deposit that were previously classified as held-to-maturity under AASB 139.

### Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)

Financial assets that are held within a different business model other than 'hold to collect' or 'hold to collect and sell' are categorised at fair value through profit and loss. Further, irrespective of business model financial assets whose contractual cash flows are not solely payments of principal and interest are accounted for at FVPL. All derivative financial instruments fall into this category, except for those designated and effective as hedging instruments, for which the hedge accounting requirements apply (see below).

### **Equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (Equity FVOCI)**

Investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading are eligible for an irrevocable election at inception to be measured at FVOCI. Under Equity FVOCI, subsequent movements in fair value are recognised in other comprehensive income and are never reclassified to profit or loss. Dividend from these investments continue to be recorded as other income within the profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents return of capital.

### **Impairment of Financial assets**

AASB 9's impairment requirements use more forward looking information to recognize expected credit losses - the 'expected credit losses (ECL) model'. Instruments within the scope of the new requirements included loans and other debt-type financial assets measured at amortised cost and FVOCI, trade receivables and loan commitments and some financial guarantee contracts (for the issuer) that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Association considers a broader range of information when assessing credit risk and measuring expected credit losses, including past events, current conditions, reasonable and supportable forecasts that affect the expected collectability of the future cash flows of the instrument.

In applying this forward-looking approach, a distinction is made between:

- financial instruments that have not deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition or that have low credit risk ('Stage 1') and
- financial instruments that have deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition and whose credit risk is not low ('Stage 2').

'Stage 3' would cover financial assets that have objective evidence of impairment at the reporting date.

'12-month expected credit losses' are recognised for the first category while 'lifetime expected credit losses' are recognised for the second category.

Measurement of the expected credit losses is determined by a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of the financial instrument.

### **Trade and other receivables**

The Association makes use of a simplified approach in accounting for trade and other receivables and records the loss allowance at the amount equal to the expected lifetime credit losses. In using this practical expedient, the Association uses its historical experience, external indicators and forward-looking information to calculate the expected credit losses using a provision matrix.

### **Classification and measurement of financial liabilities**

As the accounting for financial liabilities remains largely unchanged from AASB 139, the Association's financial liabilities were not impacted by the adoption of AASB 9. However, for completeness, the accounting policy is disclosed below.

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payables.

Financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value, and, where applicable, adjusted for transaction costs unless the Association designated a financial liability at fair value through profit or loss.

Subsequently, financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for derivatives and financial liabilities designated at FVPL, which are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss (other than derivative financial instruments that are designated and effective as hedging instruments).

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.

## **Leases**

### **Prior Treatment**

Finance Leases were capitalised, recording an asset and a liability.

Leased assets were depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Finance leases were allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remained with the lessor, were charged as expenses in the periods in which they were incurred.

### **New Accounting Standards Introduced**

AASB 16: Leases (applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2019) replaces the previous

accounting requirements. AASB 16 introduces a single lessee accounting model that eliminates the requirement for lease to be classified as operating or finance leases.

The main changes introduced by the new Standard are as follows:

- recognition of a right-of-use asset and liability for all leases (excluding short-term leases with less than 12 months of tenure and leases relating to low-value assets);
- depreciation of right-of-use assets in line with AASB 116: Property Plant & Equipment in profit or loss and unwinding of the liability in principal and interest components;
- inclusion of variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate in the initial measurement of the lease liability using the index or rate at the commencement date;
- application of a practical expedient to permit a lessee to elect not to separate non-lease components and instead account for all components as a lease; and
- inclusion of additional exposure requirements.

AASB 2018-8 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Right-of-Use Assets of Not-for-Profit Entities allows that where the lessee is a not-for-profit entity, the lessee may elect to measure right-of-use assets on a class-by-class basis at initial recognition at fair value in accordance with AASB 13 Fair Value Measurement for leases that have significant below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives. AASB 1058 Income for Not-for-Profit Entities addresses the recognition of related amounts.

In addition, where a lessee is a not-for-profit entity and elects to measure a class or classes of right-of-use assets at initial recognition at cost for leases that have significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives, the lessee shall disclose additional qualitative and quantitative information about those leases which shall include, but is not limited to, information that helps users of financial statements to assess:

- a. the entity's dependence on leases that have significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives; and
- b. the nature and terms of the leases, including:
  - i. the lease payments
  - j. the lease term
  - k. the description of underlying asset; and
  - l. restrictions on the use of the underlying assets specific to the entity.

The disclosures so provided by a not-for-profit entity shall be provided individually for each material lease that has significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives or in aggregate for leases involving right-of-use assets of a similar nature.

## **Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

## **Inventories**

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

## **Accounts Payable and Other Payables**

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

## **Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies**

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

### **Estimation uncertainty**

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement

of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

#### **Impairment**

In assessing impairment, management estimates the recoverable amount of each asset or cash-generating units, based on expected future cash flows and uses an interest rate to discount them. Estimation uncertainty relates to assumptions about future operating results and the determination of a suitable discount rate.

#### **Useful lives of depreciable assets**

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain software and IT equipment.

#### **Inventories**

Management estimates the net realisable values of inventories, taking into account the most reliable evidence available at each reporting date. The future realisation of these inventories may be affected by future technology or other market-driven changes that may reduce future selling prices.

#### **Long Service Leave**

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

### **Related Party Transactions**

The Association's related parties include its key management personnel and related entities as described below. Unless otherwise stated, none of the transactions incorporate special terms and conditions and no guarantees were given or received. Outstanding balances are usually settled in cash.

#### **Transactions with related entities**

The Association had no transactions with related parties during the financial year.

The Association sourced goods and services from members at market rate during the financial year. All related party services and contracts are approved by the Committee.

#### **Transactions with key management personnel**

All key management personnel and volunteers are not compensated for holding office positions.

The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Association's financial reporting responsibilities under the Australian Charities and Not-For-Profits Act 2012 (Cth), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), the Associates Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW) and the Club's constitution. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.
