

# Life Membership - Ian Nicol

After 17 years as a swimming competitor with the Manly Masters and Manly Amateur Swimming Club, and a water polo player and a keen surfer since 1960, Ian felt that he could be an asset to the club. He was eager to learn surf lifesaving, rescue and first aid skills and to compete in surf carnivals. He had already completed his St John Lifesaving Bronze Award while at school.

Ian's first contact with Dee Why SLSC was in February 1991 when he participated in the Dee Why 2km Ocean Swim and Ironman events, as well as the weekly Sunday Morning Races run by Ray Martin. He joined the club and became a patrolling member.

Since gaining his Bronze in 1991 Ian has gained a further 54 awards and won more than 40 SLSA medals. Steve Haggett was in Ian's Bronze squad, and the two became lifelong friends. Their instructor was Bruce Richardson. He has a supportive family in wife Philippa, daughter Kate (former Bronze and patrolling member) and son Jonathon (former Nipper member).

Ian has patrolled at Dee Why for over 30 Years, achieving 100% attendance on 15 occasions. He has logged over 1,000 hours of patrols for the club. He has been a Patrol Captain for over 20 Years, where he is hugely valued as a leader, colleague, lifesaver and friend and a Masters Competitor for over 25 Years. Ian received a Distinguished Service Award 2004.

In 1997 and 2001 he was Race Secretary and organiser of Sunday Morning Events and in 2007 and 2008 he was Masters Coordinator. Ian was part of the Club Organising Committee for the 2km swim since joining in 1991. It was a major fundraiser, attracting as many as 450 entrants and raising up to \$10,000 per annum.

In 2002 Ian, having competed in many ocean swim events, convinced the committee to add a running discipline to the event, as he felt it would attract more entrants (triathletes). This resulted in more than 100 additional registrations. In 2002 Ian assumed the role of Club Event Coordinator and continued in this role until Fairfax Events took over. His meticulous planning, as well as his contacts from other organisations made him a perfect fit for the significant amount of time and planning required in this role.

Ian has always put his hand up to volunteer at events. Roles have included setting up start lines as part of the workforce, on course marshalling and directing, manning hydration stations and providing First Aid for events such as Bayfield's Pub to Pub Fun Run, Rotary Beach2Beach Fun Run - Dee Why to Newport, Sun Run – Dee Why to Manly, Fairfax Events Ocean Swim, Rotary Car Raffle – selling tickets, purchasing the puddings for the Annual Christmas Plum Pudding Race at DYSLSC on Xmas Day, dressing up as Santa Claus for the Nippers Christmas Carnival and Annual Christmas Party and the weekly DYRSL Cash Housie as the Dee Why SLSC Representative on a roster basis. .

He was involved in two notable patrolling rescue events, one on Australia Day long weekend in 2006 when there were multiple incidents and the other in December 2019 where he performed a tube rescue of a man trapped in a rip 80metres from shore.

Ian is a worthy recipient of Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Life Membership.

The first is Fiona Ronge our Sports Coordinator and IT Administrator. Both roles are important roles within the Club which demanded time, energy and resourcefulness.

It is to your credit that all members of the Club have worked together so well this year for a successful season.

Cameron Read our Club Captain has made a very significant contribution to our patrols and the lifesaving section of the Club. His diligence in the replacement of equipment including the ATV and the organising of rosters has been particularly outstanding.

She has successfully seen through two training courses for SRC and Bronze candidates in December 2024 and March 2025. Our Club is fortunate to have a Chief Training Officer with the skills and dedication of Sanja.

I was honoured to receive a National Service Medal this year for my services to Surf Life Saving. This involved performing service for thirty hours or more, for a minimum of fifteen full seasons. # President's Report

It gives me great pleasure to report that the season 2024/25 ran well at Dee Why SLSC. Across our Life Saving patrols, Nippers, Surf Sports, Training and Education we've had a lot of fun, forged new friendships, and reconnected with old ones, weaving another rich tapestry of memories at our beloved Dee Why beach.

I would like to extend a huge thank you to all our members for their ongoing dedication to beach safety, and for their commitment to volunteer their time in all the many different capacities that keep a Surf Club functioning.

This season our volunteer lifesavers contributed over 7,000 hours of patrols, watching over an estimated 350,000 beachgoers. This presence meant we provided 288 first aid actions and many thousands of preventive actions. The consistent efforts of our patrolling members, particularly when the weather or surf present challenging conditions, helped ensure the community enjoyed Dee Why beach with confidence. A humbling moment this season, highlighting our training's effectiveness, involved a significant rescue that received widespread recognition. This incident powerfully attested to our members' dedication and commitment to ongoing training, demonstrating their readiness to respond with skill and courage.

Dee Why beach continues to grow in popularity, attracting many visitors from near and far, including many who are relatively new to Australian beaches and for whom their visit to Dee Why beach may be their first proper ocean swim. We are very conscious of this shifting demographic, and increasingly vigilant that surf safety education is an ever more important part of beach safety. To assist in the broadening of our community reach, we expanded our Lifesaver on Land initiative to local high schools to welcome them into the education programs offered by our Club and make beach safety and education more accessible to newer members of our community. This program has proved remarkably successful and we're particularly proud of how our club's geographic and demographic diversity increasingly mirrors the public we serve.

It was inspiring to see so many of our members, from Nippers to seasoned patrolling veterans, embracing the many opportunities that exist within Surf Life Saving to grow and learn. This season, our members gained a huge variety of new awards and advanced their awards and qualifications. It was particularly heartening to see many of our youth stepping into leadership roles commendably.

Special thanks go to our dedicated Trainers and Educators; their unwavering commitment is a bedrock of our club.



Witnessing our Nippers' journey through our education programs is particularly rewarding. Many of our youngest members arrive initially fearful of the waves and happiest digging and throwing sand, many are likely bribed to come with the promise of an ice-cream afterwards. Within a few short years they confidently achieve their Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) and then their Bronze Medallion,

powerfully and proudly demonstrating our programs' transformative impact and the nurturing environment provided by our dedicated Age Managers and assistants. This coming season will be particularly special for me as I look forward to watching the oldest of my own children go through the SRC program and on to Patrols. All the ice-cream bribes will be worth it!

Throughout the year, the Club organised or participated in a wide range of Carnivals, community and social events that contributed to the vibrancy of our local area. Our members again volunteered to run the Start Line at the Sun Run and Beach-to-Beach fun runs attended by over 15,000 community members, whilst our weekly Nippers BBQ consistently delivered full bellies and happy faces. Dee Why members again made up the largest contingent of the NSW SLS Beach-to-Bush program and this year also became the largest group within the SLS NSW Beach Safety Presenter team. Amongst these two initiatives, our members collectively made over 100 visits to present Beach Safety to well over 10,000 people at schools, TAFES, universities, community groups and events across NSW.



Our success in all aspects of the Club this past season is a direct reflection of the selflessness and collective efforts of our incredible volunteers in every aspect of club life. Every single contribution, from Patrolling, Nippers BBQs, Surf Sports coaching and administration, IT support, and proficiencies, plays a vital role maintaining the spirit of Dee Why SLSC. My sincere thanks also extend to our Management Committee, who provided steady leadership and guidance despite the sad passing of our Deputy President Phil Thomas during the season.

We are incredibly grateful to our valued Sponsors for their unwavering belief in our mission and generous support. Their contributions directly funded crucial initiatives like our new IRB (Inflatable Rescue Boat), supported our Surf Sports team's growth, enabled new boards, and provided vital member-focused initiatives such as sun-safety rash vests. We're also thankful to the NSW Government Department of Sport for helping fund a refresh of our members'



changing rooms, enhancing amenity for our volunteers. We deeply appreciate the ongoing support from Surf Life Saving NSW, Surf Life Saving Australia, and the Northern Beaches Council – their partnerships are vital to our operations. # Club Captain's Report

This year has seen a number of successes — from the many members we put forward for awards, to those who progressed to State level recognition. Your commitment and achievements make our club proud.

We also faced a major incident this season. While the ultimate outcome was not what we had hoped for, our club was commended for how we handled the situation and for our overall response. The person at the centre of the rescue left the beach in a far better state thanks to your efforts.

On behalf of myself and the Club Captain's team, I want to say a massive thank you to everyone involved in the rescue and to those who supported the team afterwards: Herve Vichemont, Matt Molinia, David Spink, Craig Katen, Jenny Graves, Jeremy Ferguson, Lee Wellings, Hamish Pankhurst, Bailey Dickinson-Bubb, Mark Rosenthal, Adam King, Colin Kjoller and Toby Hagan. The Duty Officer who attended the scene was so impressed that he has followed up numerous times to see how the team was doing and to offer further support. He stated repeatedly how well the team's training kicked in and how professional and calm everyone was during the rescue. Their efforts have been recognised, with the team winning the Sydney Northern Beaches Branch and the NSW State Rescue of the Month. They then went on to win the Rescue of the Year for the Sydney Northern Beaches Branch, gaining not just recognition but also a new rescue board for the club.

It was important for us to give back to our members this year. The merch packs handed out were a small token of appreciation from the Committee, recognising the hours dedicated to patrols - time spent away from family and friends.

We have had a big year chasing and securing grants to upgrade our facilities and provide a better space for everyone to patrol from. Our President, Lachlan Pike, has been a powerhouse in applying for and securing these grants. Without his huge efforts, we wouldn't be in the strong financial position we are in today.

One highlight was receiving a grant for the Life Saver on Land program. A huge thanks to David Spink and Matt Molinia for developing and running this initiative. The program is already fully booked for next season, and three out of the seven participants from the last course are now going on to undertake their Bronze. This program is set to make a massive impact, supporting our patrolling members on the beach.

We also received a State Government grant for bathroom upgrades, which we aim to complete before or just after the start of next season. This was a major concern raised in the member survey, and the upgrade will be a huge improvement for everyone using our facilities.

On the equipment front, we have acquired a new IRB and motor, and we are looking at further upgrades - including the First Aid Room, new boards and other essential gear. Watch this space for more improvements!

Looking ahead, we are already planning more enhancements for the club and the patrol team for next season.

Finally, I want to personally thank the Club Captain's Team - Danielle Edwards, Steve Polley and Shankar Pariyar - for their invaluable support throughout the year. I could not have done it without you.

Thank you all for your hard work, passion and commitment to DYSLSC. Let's look forward to another fantastic season ahead!

The first Group trained and assessed for Surf Rescue Certificate in 2012. Due to the previous years spent learning at the Junior Development Camp, an intensive training course was put together and the group were trained and assessed over the Australia Day long weekend. The participants were Amber Collins, Molly Collins, Abbey Glennon, Alice Kjoller and Synetta Manns.

The initiative was so well received from the Orange group that a few of the parents asked if they could be involved. This initiated Stage 2 of the process, where Alice and Amber, who were old enough to do their Bronze Medallion, were joined by a group of parents (5 in all) to complete this award. This enabled some very proud parents to become involved and from here the partnership between Dee Why and Orange really gained momentum.

This was just the start. We had dedicated club members such as Dave Spink assisting with IRB training, Adrienne Lowe, Herve Vichemont and Steve Haggett working on First Aid and Advanced Resuscitation courses and Darren Armitage, Hugh Long and Matt Molinia conducting the SRC and Bronze intensive courses and with the assistance of content experts such as Ben Davies, Cam Wyllie and Warren Hannam passing on invaluable knowledge in relation to surf skills and board competencies. Due to the geographical nature of the relationship, the training structure was very different. Intensive blocks of training were done for the Bronze and SRC members on the weekends when Orange members were on patrol and also on the October long weekend when the main course and assessment was held - usually relating to 4 full days of training with members from Orange and Dee Why. As the IRB is a very specific type of training that requires exposure to the actual surf, Dave Spink dedicated entire weekends to block training sessions with Orange members to maximise exposure under all conditions and situations. Several of the above members even travelled to Orange to run courses and assist with training. Herve and Adrienne spent a weekend training and assessing 8 members in Advanced Resuscitation.

John Collins, Col Kjoller and Paul Ryan became invaluable members as content experts assisting with training in Orange and at Dee Why. Not only did they prepare the members in Orange for the beach but they promoted the program, were key in the organisation of getting the participants to Sydney, organised extra sessions where required, organised training sessions on the beach on the weekends when they were down on patrol and managed communications and attendances. External assessors are very impressed with the level of training and competence of the members from Orange - some are quite amazed that they are not local to a beach!

The attitude of the Orange member is amazing. They are keen, on time, dedicated, focussed and willing to learn at every opportunity. They are always well prepared and organised.

The Orange members started on an active reserve patrol due to their circumstances in relation to distance. Over the years, with more and more qualifications and members, our Orange membership represents more than two full patrols. They are dedicated and well organised, always have a full patrol and have a sub if required and are very diligent when on patrol. They have built strong relationships with the Dee Why members on their patrol and there is a mutual respect amongst the group. The Orange members set up events and invite the entire patrolling groups and their families to activities on weekends away in Orange on an annual basis.

#### Milestones achieved from the relationship with Orange

- A total of 59 members from Orange have received an award and have patrolled, all initially trained in their first award by Matt Molinia
- Orange members have contributed 5965 patrol hrs to date
- Have currently 25 active patrolling members spread across 2 patrols + as a fill in for a third
- 22 Members have 100+ hrs
- 6 members have 200+ hrs
- Over the last 5 seasons 17 of 18 members trained still patrol and attend regularly
- 28 of 45 members trained in the SRC award have upgraded to the Bronze Medallion Award
- One of the first patrols split their patrol into 2 patrols and manage and maintain the patrol.
- The group is proactive in relation to patrolling and offered a solution of spreading themselves across 3 patrols, unofficially, in order to maintain a patrol struggling to have enough people to comply with our Lifesaving Agreement

- John was awarded Patrol Captain of the Year for the club and at the Sydney Northern Beaches Branch Awards of Excellence and was nominated at State level
- Col was awarded Patrol Captain of the Year for the club and was nominated for Sydney Northern Beaches Branch Awards of Excellence
- John and Col both received the Club Presidents Award

The relationship between OBN and DYSLSC has been of benefit to both organisations. Dee Why has not only increased its membership with strong and dedicated SLS patrolling members, but the friendships, camaraderie and sense of community between the beach and country for the club

members and their kids has been invaluable. Orange members have utilised the skills learned and developed via SLS in various other areas of their lives. For example, 10 members have taken up paid positions such as pool lifeguard at their local aquatic centre, and 2 of them have worked in summer camps overseas. The members that have completed their SRC or Bronze or further awards have had the opportunity to include these achievements in their resumes or applications for work or school and are looked upon favourably.

The members from OBN that have been involved in the training at Dee Why and Orange have learnt valuable skills and surf awareness making them more confident and safer in the surf environment. Most country kids are lucky if they get to see the beach once a year and generally end up in the water with little or no preparation for the associated dangers other than "swim between the flags". Orange Bush Nippers are thoroughly prepared to handle surf conditions and know what to do and when it is just not safe to enter the water.

The first aid knowledge learnt when training for the SRC and Bronze Medallion has provided them with the life skills and confidence to help others calmly and effectively in their moments of need. This training has been implemented and adapted to real life situations in their own environment. As part of the OBN format, their development doesn't finish after nippers. As part of each nipper's SRC and Bronze program, an integral part of their training is to volunteer as mentors to the junior members of the club and pass on learned skills as assistants to Age Managers when at home. These young individuals have embraced this responsibility over the years and grown and developed into young adults that now have this knowledge and these leadership skills in their toolbox moving forward.

Some comments from our OBN Members:

- **Amber Collins:** one of the first to get their SRC from Orange, credits her exposure to first aid and helping people to choose a career in nursing.
- **Molly Collins:** Another from the first SRC group rates her opportunity to teach and mentor the Crabs as being one of the best things about nippers and now teaches primary school children.
- **Zac Collins:** has travelled to Michigan in the U.S. several times to lifeguard and mentor kids in summer camps.
- **Colin Kjoller:** "Where do I start! I am on the record saying, I have been part of many business mergers, community organisations and partnerships, none come anywhere near the program with Dee Why! Without Dee Why I would suggest we would struggle to keep Nippers longer than age nine or ten, Dee Why provides an expansive pathway for Nippers to look towards and aim for. Being able to start a training program within a different environment from about 11 year olds keeps interest and renews commitments. This has only gained in relevance this year with the ability to plan well ahead and deliver Nipper groups going to Dee Why with each of our patrols for important experiences in surf conditions and learn valuable skills and insights into ocean conditions from years five, an example of the continuing relationship between the two clubs. From the very beginning Dee Why's support has been so supportive, from initial invitations to our first Development Camp in Dee Why, providing free Nipper boards and rescue boards to letting us reference important documents such as position descriptions, operations documents and training guides and materials. And finally, the skills Nippers learn from our involvement with Dee Why, most probably, saved lives. Nothing could be of more importance than that."
- **Belinda Mills:** "When my daughter was a child she wanted to be a lifeguard, every Sunday morning we would bundle all three girls in the car and drive 45 minutes to Orange to start nippers at 8.30am, not once did I have to drag them out of bed, in fact one season we didn't attend as we were over committed and during the season all three girls said they wanted to join up again the following season. When our eldest was SRC age I also did my bronze, having been a pool lifeguard and living the beach it was a natural move for me. The two of us patrolled together for two seasons. When life changed direction for Paris, I made the decision to stay on due to the lovely friendships I had made. I have a friend in my small town of Molong whose sister is a distance swimmer and was looking for a boat and operator to accompany her on a beach to beach swim in Sydney, one of my life saving colleagues was able to assist her on this journey. We invited the Dee Why families out to our small farm to experience farm life on one of our bush nipper camps, the bush kids loved teaching the city kids how to shear a sheep, crack a whip and ride a motorbike. In a time when the world is digital it is experiences and bonds like this that keep community alive. I will continue to travel 4.5 hours to volunteer my time for many years to come due to the welcoming Dee Why family I now have."

- Matt Molinia:** "From a personal perspective, from my first interactions with the group from Orange as an Age Manager to training them and working with them on patrol, it has been a fulfilling experience. The welcoming nature that greets Dee Why when we travel as a group to Orange, or even when I go on my own is like visiting family - nothing is too much effort! They are a pleasure to train, so keen and attentive. I have made several friendships that would never have occurred without this program, from the original group where it all started to all the new members that have joined and engaged along the way. I hope to see this relationship thrive for many years to come."

## Assessments Hosted

Dee Why Surf Club continues to play a key role in supporting surf lifesaving excellence by hosting central venue assessments for the northern beaches branch. Over the last season the club has provided its facilities for Bronze Medallion and IRB assessments, as well as the Silver Medallion Patrol Captain course, First Aid and Advanced Resuscitation Techniques. By consistently making its resources and experienced assessors available, Dee Why Surf Club helps ensure that new and existing members across multiple clubs meet the high standards required for surf lifesaving duties. Its ongoing commitment to this responsibility highlights the club's dedication to safety, training, and the broader lifesaving community.

## Proficiencies

This season, dry proficiency sessions were held on midweek nights, while wet sessions took place during patrol handovers and after Nippers, creating a more efficient and flexible process for members. Separating the dry and wet components and aligning them with existing club activities, made it easier for members to complete their annual proficiency requirements. Holding dry sessions midweek allowed for focused attention on theory and CPR, while conducting wet proficiencies during regular beach activity times ensured better use of resources and higher participation. Overall, this streamlined approach improved convenience and boosted member engagement, meaning that the large majority of proficiencies were completed well before the 31st December deadline.

We will continue to offer evening midweek dry sessions at the start of the season next season and work on tweaking wet proficiencies to ensure best use of volunteers' time. One such adjustment for next season is allowing members to book themselves into the dry and wet proficiency that they will attend through their members area. This will make running proficiencies easier and more efficient for trainers as they will know how many people are attending and it will reduce the bottleneck at sign in. Instructions on how to do this will be shared with members via email.

## Change to Bronze Medallion Long Course Format

The delivery format for the Spring and Summer Bronze Medallion training changed this season, shifting from the previous schedule of Monday nights and Saturday mornings to a more streamlined approach of Saturday mornings only. This adjustment aims to simplify scheduling for both trainers and participants, reducing the midweek time commitment while maintaining the same high standard of training. By consolidating sessions into a single weekly time slot, the new format allows for more focused instruction and improved consistency in attendance. This change reflects ongoing efforts to make lifesaving training more accessible and manageable for volunteers with busy weekly schedules.

Lachlan and I have managed to secure a relationship with Forest High School, and with the help of some multicultural funding that Lachlan has put together, we have successfully put seven students through Lifesaver on Land and they are now helping us on patrol. Over the 2024/2025 season, Dee Why Nippers has once again demonstrated a commitment to providing a safe and enjoyable environment for children to develop lifelong surf skills.

Our program, which caters to children aged 5-13, continues to grow and evolve, offering a mix of surf education, physical fitness, and fun activities. The goal is to equip our Nippers with the skills needed to be safe in the surf, promote healthy lifestyles, and foster a sense of community.

**Age Groups:** U6 – U14

**Total Participants:** 350+

**Sessions Held:** 20+

**Volunteers:** 50+

This season saw an increase in participation numbers across the program. We are thrilled to have reached over 350 Nippers, with growth in our U6 and U7 age groups. This highlights the community's continued interest in surf lifesaving and our program's strong reputation.

Our Nippers were educated in beach safety practices, including understanding rip currents, safe swimming zones, and identifying beach hazards. With the guidance of our 22 excellent Age Managers, we ensured that each Nipper was able to enjoy the surf safely.

Prior to the season we updated some of our vital equipment, with a huge order of new boards and rescue tubes. These upgrades have helped to create a more effective environment for our Nippers.

Dozens of our Nippers also participated in multiple regional and state-level carnivals, showcasing their hard work and dedication. Our Nippers not only excelled in individual and team events but also displayed outstanding sportsmanship across the entire season. 10 of our Nippers also competed at the State Championships, with three achieving top 10 finishes.

None of this would have been possible without our junior Surf Sport organizers, led by Chris West and Joyce Nehme. They have been expertly instructed by our new professional coach Hayden Cotter, and our board coaches Alex Suhr and Neil Kafer.

This season, we introduced a couple of new initiatives:

1. An exciting and fun new format for our Club Championships, designed to encourage greater participation and foster team spirit. In addition to celebrating our Nippers' individual achievements, we introduced some new team events, building a huge sense of camaraderie among the Nippers.
2. Our all new Christmas raffle, held at our Nippers Christmas event. A huge amount of work went into raising over \$4500, and we thank all those who donated the fantastic prizes. Special mention must be made of Santa's arrival in the IRB!

## Notes of the Financial Statements

Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc  
For the year ended 30 April 2025

### Summary of Significant Account Policies

The financial statements cover Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as an individual entity. Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW).

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and the club's constitution. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the Club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements  
AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows  
AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors  
AASB 124 Related Party Disclosures  
AASB 1031 Materiality  
AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards  
AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

## **Income Tax**

No income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

## **Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)**

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

## **Depreciation**

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

## **Employee Provisions**

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

## **Provisions**

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

## **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

## **Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors**

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

## **Revenue and Other Income**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

## Financial Instruments

### Recognition, initial measurement and derecognition

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below.

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

### Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

Except for those trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component and are measured at the transaction price, all financial assets are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs (where applicable).

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)
- equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

### Classifications are determined by both:

- The entities business model for managing the financial asset
- The contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables, which is presented within other expenses.

### Subsequent measurement financial assets

#### Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost if the assets meet the following conditions (and are not designated as FVPL):

- they are held within a business model whose objective is to hold the financial assets and collect its contractual cash flows
- the contractual terms of the financial assets give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding

After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Association's cash and cash equivalents, trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments as well as long-term deposit that were previously classified as held-to-maturity under AASB 139.

### Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)

Financial assets that are held within a different business model other than 'hold to collect' or 'hold to collect and sell' are categorised at fair value through profit and loss. Further, irrespective of business model financial

assets whose contractual cash flows are not solely payments of principal and interest are accounted for at FVPL. All derivative financial instruments fall into this category, except for those designated and effective as hedging instruments, for which the hedge accounting requirements apply (see below).

### **Equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (Equity FVOCI)**

Investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading are eligible for an irrevocable election at inception to be measured at FVOCI. Under Equity FVOCI, subsequent movements in fair value are recognised in other comprehensive income and are never reclassified to profit or loss. Dividend from these investments continue to be recorded as other income within the profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents return of capital.

### **Impairment of Financial assets**

AASB 9's impairment requirements use more forward looking information to recognize expected credit losses - the 'expected credit losses (ECL) model'. Instruments within the scope of the new requirements included loans and other debt-type financial assets measured at amortised cost and FVOCI, trade receivables and loan commitments and some financial guarantee contracts (for the issuer) that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Association considers a broader range of information when assessing credit risk and measuring expected credit losses, including past events, current conditions, reasonable and supportable forecasts that affect the expected collectability of the future cash flows of the instrument.

In applying this forward-looking approach, a distinction is made between:

- financial instruments that have not deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition or that have low credit risk ('Stage 1') and
- financial instruments that have deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition and whose credit risk is not low ('Stage 2').

'Stage 3' would cover financial assets that have objective evidence of impairment at the reporting date.

'12-month expected credit losses' are recognised for the first category while 'lifetime expected credit losses' are recognised for the second category.

Measurement of the expected credit losses is determined by a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of the financial instrument.

### **Trade and other receivables**

The Association makes use of a simplified approach in accounting for trade and other receivables and records the loss allowance at the amount equal to the expected lifetime credit losses. In using this practical expedient, the Association uses its historical experience, external indicators and forward-looking information to calculate the expected credit losses using a provision matrix.

### **Classification and measurement of financial liabilities**

As the accounting for financial liabilities remains largely unchanged from AASB 139, the Association's financial liabilities were not impacted by the adoption of AASB 9. However, for completeness, the accounting policy is disclosed below.

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payables.

Financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value, and, where applicable, adjusted for transaction costs unless the Association designated a financial liability at fair value through profit or loss.

Subsequently, financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for derivatives and financial liabilities designated at FVPL, which are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss (other than derivative financial instruments that are designated and effective as hedging instruments).

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.

## **Leases**

For any new contracts entered into on or after 1 January 2020, the Association considers whether a contract is, or contains a lease. A lease is defined as 'a contract, or part of a contract, that conveys the right to use an asset (the underlying asset) for a period of time in exchange for consideration'.

To apply this definition the Association assesses whether the contract meets three key evaluations which are whether:

- the contract contains an identified asset, which is either explicitly identified in the contract or implicitly specified by being identified at the time the asset is made available to the Association
- the Association has the right to obtain substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the identified asset throughout the period of use, considering its rights within the defined scope of the contract
- the Association has the right to direct the use of the identified asset throughout the period of use. The Association assesses whether it has the right to direct 'how and for what purpose' the asset is used throughout the period of use.

### **Measurement and recognition of leases as a lessee**

At lease commencement date, the Association recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability on the balance sheet. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which is made up of the initial measurement of the lease liability, any initial direct costs incurred by the Association, an estimate of any costs to dismantle and remove the asset at the end of the lease, and any lease payments made in advance of the lease commencement date (net of any incentives received).

The Association depreciates the right-of-use assets on a straight-line basis from the lease commencement date to the earlier of the end of the useful life of the right-of-use asset or the end of the lease term. The Association also assesses the right-of-use asset for impairment when such indicators exist.

At the commencement date, the Association measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments unpaid at that date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease if that rate is readily available or the Association's incremental borrowing rate.

Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability are made up of fixed payments (including in substance fixed), variable payments based on an index or rate, amounts expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee and payments arising from options reasonably certain to be exercised.

Subsequent to initial measurement, the liability will be reduced for payments made and increased for interest. It is remeasured to reflect any reassessment or modification, or if there are changes in in-substance fixed payments.

When the lease liability is remeasured, the corresponding adjustment is reflected in the right-of-use asset, or profit and loss if the right-of-use asset is already reduced to zero.

The Association has elected to account for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets using the practical expedients. Instead of recognising a right-of-use asset and lease liability, the payments in relation to these are recognised as an expense in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

On the statement of financial position, right-of-use assets have been included in property, plant and equipment and lease liabilities have been included in finance liabilities.

### **Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

### **Inventories**

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

### **Accounts Payable and Other Payables**

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

### **Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies**

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

### **Estimation uncertainty**

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

### **Impairment**

In assessing impairment, management estimates the recoverable amount of each asset or cash-generating units, based on expected future cash flows and uses an interest rate to discount them. Estimation uncertainty relates to assumptions about future operating results and the determination of a suitable discount rate.

### **Useful lives of depreciable assets**

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain software and IT equipment.

### **Inventories**

Management estimates the net realisable values of inventories, taking into account the most reliable evidence available at each reporting date. The future realisation of these inventories may be affected by future technology or other market-driven changes that may reduce future selling prices.

### **Long Service Leave**

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

### **Related Party Transactions**

The Association's related parties include its key management personnel and related entities as described below.

Unless otherwise stated, none of the transactions incorporate special terms and conditions and no guarantees were given or received. Outstanding balances are usually settled in cash.

### **Transactions with related entities**

The Association had no transactions with related parties during the financial year.

The Association sourced goods and services from members at market rate during the financial year. All related party services and contracts are approved by the Committee.

### **Transactions with key management personnel**

All key management personnel and volunteers are not compensated for holding office positions.



For his 90th. Birthday he bought himself a new MX 5 sports car; and he paid extra for a full 5 year warranty. He got his moneys worth.


Bill never looked back, only forward. What happened in the past stayed there. His words were kind, not harsh. He got on with everybody.

It is in Phil's nature to be motivated and well organised and lead by example. There were seasons where Phil patrolled in excess of 100 hours personally. He patrolled well in excess of 1000 hours throughout his career and was always there to motivate his team on the beach or on hand when a patrol is short or in need of a higher qualification.

Over and above Phil's passion for lifesaving, he also had a passion for competition. Phil competed in anything from IRB racing to Swim, Board and Ski events to First Aid and Patrol Competition events. Phil did very well in team events, especially the lifesaving events, taking out medals in all levels of competition from Branch to National. Phil's passion for surf sports was apparent when he took on the Competition Manager position and maintained this position for in excess of 12 years. He ensured that he was across all aspects of surf sports even to the point of becoming an official and up to the level of a Carnival Referee. With this experience he had an intimate knowledge of the rules and workings of surf sports events. Not only was Phil meticulous in ensuring that the competitors had all the correct qualifications and prerequisites for carnivals, he also ensured that gear and equipment such as tents and boards and ski's were there for the competitors. He often resolved issues on the competition day to ensure fair treatment of competitors. Phil not only ensured entries were put in but also supported and attended many of the carnivals that he was not personally involved in. It was not unlike Phil to turn up to an IRB racing event on the South Coast just to support Dee Why. It even went to the extreme where Phil would put his hand up to be a driver or Board Guide at the Coolangatta Gold, travelling at his own expense to support the team.

As a club Dee Why is involved in the running of many events from the Pub to Pub and Sun Run to the 2 km Ocean Swim and Ocean Thunder. Phil Thomas was one of those members who was always there to help out. Phil's ongoing commitment to the management and maintenance of the high standards of the Club across all aspects of the Club led to him being awarded Life Membership in season 2016/17.

This season Phil was the Club's Vice President and was actively answering emails and phone calls from his hospital bed as recent as the week his death. He will be deeply missed by his many friends. Our thoughts, love and deep condolences also go to Phil's family at this difficult time. May his memory live on in the lives he touched and at the Club he helped shape.
