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Vale Col Huntingdon

The Huntingdon family arrived in Dee Why in 1936, renting a cottage near the beach in Pacific Parade. Colin, the eldest child, joined Dee Why Swimming Club and showed great promise as a future champion, going on to represent the club at State level.

Colin joined the Surf Club as a 14 year old Cadet during the Second World War, and so began a long association with our great club. He gained his Bronze in 1945, Instructors in 1946 and went on to become Chief Instructor. After a period of instructing in the club he gained his Examiners Certificate and joined the Board of Examiners. Colin was a first class sportsman and was a member of the R & R Team which won the Metropolitan, State and Australian Premiership in 1950-51. He also played Basketball with the all conquering Dee

Why Savers, undefeated Premiers in 1951 and 1952.

Colin's record of community service is outstanding, being a multi term Warringah Shire Councillor including a term as Shire President. He was Chairman of Mackellar County Council, a member of the Sydney Water Board, and Vice President of Cromer Golf Club. Col was heavily involved with the planning, approval and building of our current clubhouse. On the plaque in the entrance commemorating the opening, his name is engraved for posterity as Shire President, along with his great friend Councillor Richie Burke.

Colin was awarded the Queen's Silver Jubilee Medal for services to the Realm in 1969, celebrating Queen Elizabeth's 25th Anniversary. In later years, as his health deteriorated Col often reflected on his wonderful years on Dee Why Beach.

Vale Col! A great contributor to Dee Why Surf Club and its surrounding community. Thanks Col, you will be greatly missed by many.

Vale John Milford

John spent all his "Life Saving" life in Queensland before moving to Sydney for business.

He followed his sons into our Club and became Assistant Secretary - Registrar for two years 1989 - 1991.

John then held the office of President for four years 1992 - 1995.

He was best known for his endeavour in trying to make the club self sufficient through the establishment of a supporters club as is the fashion in his home state.

Although unsuccessful in this area he brought the members together with his building of a family club.

John died aged 73 in Queensland last November.

Vale Peter O'Reilly

Peter O'Reilly was well known as an Army Reserve (previously CMF) soldier with 1/15 Royal NSW Lancers having risen from the ranks to holding a commission.

Following his retirement from military service he retained his military interest through the Lancer Museum at Parramatta

Peter was well known in the plumbing and associated trades having been a plumber and later a teacher of plumbing and Head Teacher at North Sydney TAFE. He authored a respected text book on plumbing. Peter's trade background also led to him working for the Water Board as an inspector

Peter was a keen surfer and very proficient on a surf board and on a surf ski. He was a member of Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club and its jet boat crew in the 1970's. His sons and grandchildren followed his surfing interests.

Peter's health was indifferent for the past few years. He spent the last years of his life living at Wesley Heights Nursing Home at Manly.

President's Report by Simon Moriarty

Welcome to the 101st Annual Report of the Dee Why Surf Life Saving Club to be presented at the 100th Annual General Meeting of the Club.

It was always my intention that this this would be my penultimate annual report however circumstances during the season have made it my final report. I wish to thank all those that have contributed over my four years leading this amazing Club. I have certainly gone looking for opportunities to promote the Club, supplement the club subscriptions income with grants and events and provide opportunities for members to gain new skills as well as enhance their existing skills. I have been lucky that so many members supported my vision and assisted in making this club one that is recognised as being extremely professional in its attitude towards and support of the events held on Dee Why beach. Either that or they merely followed me to see where I might end up!

Following the excitement and action packed Centenary season one would have imagined that we could all take a breather and maybe lessen the intensity but alas at Dee Why beach, named the third most visited beach in New South Wales after Bondi and Manly during the year, the pace did not slow with improved weather from the previous season and increased crowds.

We have certainly had a very successful season in club achievements many of which are highlighted elsewhere in this report. In my report I intend to focus on the major milestones that the Club was involved with this season.

The main major milestone is again being able to report no lives lost on Dee Why beach whilst the volunteer lifesavers were on patrol and indeed several major rescues successfully conducted by club members and recent Bronze Medallion recipients no longer active in the club during non patrol days.

EDUCATION

The Education department had a change of leadership with Matt Molinia taking over after Vaughan Williams succumbed to the avalanche of paperwork now associated with maintaining the SLSNSW Registered Training Organisation status. I think every year I have written about the increased responsibility imposed upon the volunteer club members with no obvious benefit back to the club and its lifesaving operations to maintain this RTO status. While I appreciate that there is a monetary benefit received by the club each season from the commercial activities associated with SLSNSW running courses, the amount is not one that would create any hardship if it was not received if there

was a corresponding reduction in the Bronze medallion associated documentation. Hopefully there are enough members complaining about this imposition so that action is taken to improve the situation. I know that Matt will thank his trainers elsewhere, however on behalf of the Management Committee thank you for the work that you do and the lifesavers that you mould to protect the bathing public on Dee Why beach.

BEACH PATROLS

It goes without saying, but needs to be recorded, our patrolling members, many of whom also compete for the club, have done an outstanding job on the beach this season with increased beach usage from the community. Their ability to be able to work efficiently on the beach commences with the annual gear inspection. In previous years I have rallied against what I consider to be biased interpretations of the application of the checks carried out and again this season we found ourselves the subject of questionable understandings of what is required. As previously reported I was successful in gaining an ATV for half price after it was used at the Australian Championships at North Kirra. After servicing and cleaning the vehicle arrived in time for presentation at gear inspection, only to be declared unsuitable because of no horn and no lights. How a vehicle

that has been used for over seven days at a major Australian Championships without these items and then is unsuitable is a mystery to me!

Once again the Council Lifeguards proved to be a valuable resource and worked well with the volunteer lifesavers, so to Clinton Rose, Steve Downman and Tim Donkin the Beach Services leaders and to Senior Lifeguards

Scott Mortimer and Heath Brown and the regular Lifeguards Madison Quinn, Neil Dannenberg, Josh Wall, Adam Murray, Jason Gard, Parker Graham, Cameron Bealy, Brad Meaney, Boody Smith, Sean McBean and Mitchell Trim thank you for the courtesies shown to me and the club members.

ROCKS TO REEF SKI RACE

Our first event is the Rocks to Reef Ocean Ski Paddle part of the SNB Ocean Ski Series. Traditionally by its name it has gone between Dee Why and Long Reef however it has now changed its focus and heads down towards Manly giving the entrants a better opportunity for a downwind leg during the event. Over 130 paddlers enjoyed a sparkling day and great competition and again Pete Hatfield was the organiser for the event and what has become quite the place to be, the ocean craft expo which attracted the biggest number of exhibitors across many aspects of being on or near the water.

OCEAN THUNDER

Ocean Thunder returned to our beach for another four rounds of quality surf boat rowing. The surf for every round was on the smallish side although there were plenty of spills when a rogue wave found its way into the competition arena.

Dee Why had our young Reserve crew step up to represent the club and did so with little preparation and the added handicap of having three sweeps within a very short period of time. In the end Sean Stacey joined the club as their sweep from North Curl Curl and got Jay Yeomans, Scott Cable, Willis Casey and Brett Babicci working hard and heading in the right direction. Results were difficult to come by in such a competitive event, however, each round saw the crew improve until the last round when they beat home the eventual series winners Bateman's Bay with a first place. It has certainly given them a good grounding for the future seasons.

SURF BOATS

In support of their work late in the season I and Marty Quinn were approached with a proposition to make the Dee Why SLSC boat section one of the pre-eminent in the Branch by properly funding and rotating gear and attracting new members. Riley and Sons and their brand Riverina Milk have been a sponsor of Ocean Thunder for several years and in the last couple of years have become one of the major sponsors. Aaron Riley rowed with Dee Why several years ago when we needed a rower and left when other opportunities presented themselves. With his dad Stephen he has had a long history in boat rowing and has decided that the place they want to continue their support is Dee Why. Initial conversations took place before the State Championships with an agreement in principle in place subject to further detail being negotiated. When Stephen saw the state of the trailer used to tow the competition boat to the State Championships he was embarrassed enough to immediately order a new one! After the Australian Championships a further meeting was

held where agreement was reached for a three year sponsorship with a further 2 x 2 year option at the end of the third year with approximately \$120,000 being spent in support of the boat section over the three year period commencing the 2014/2015 season with two new boats and a refurbished boat, three new trailers, two new sets of oars along with four slightly used sets of oars, two new sweep oars plus four others, storage space for the boats to be kept undercover along with a dedicated gym for the rowers to use in Cromer. Also all three boats sign written with the sponsor's logos. Further if any new racing oars, sweep oars, rollicks, batteries etc are required then the sponsor will also pick up the tab for the next 3 seasons.

There is no doubt that this has set up the surfboat section of the club in a manner which has probably not been seen in the history of the club and will certainly provide an impetus to draw new members to compete and patrol.

SUN-HERALD SWIM

Our March 2013 postponed Sun-Herald Surf Swim was conducted in November with around 750 entries. Again club members excelled at providing the work party for the event with several of our new SRC's doing the 750 metre swim for the first time. Fairfax Events are continually amazed at the manner in which the club members conduct themselves when supporting these events and always leave saying they wished they could take them all to every event they run as it would make it so much easier. In fact for this event they put all their 'junior' team members in charge and not because it is a relatively small event but because they knew that we as a club would just get on with the job required with a minimum of fuss and that everything that needed to be done would be done. That says volumes for the high esteem we are held by the senior management of Fairfax.

Our planned swim in March was held and this was the fourth one to be supported by the Sun-Herald. Unfortunately numbers were down as they have been for all the swims this year. In fact the day before our swim Long Reef SLSC had to cancel their swim due to lack of numbers. Our contract with Fairfax for the swim was for three years and was extended to include this event. While writing this report I am in discussions with Fairfax as to the future of the event.

Despite the low numbers our members excelled in providing a professionally run event with once again the Fairfax people putting their young team members in charge as well as commenting again on the efforts of all involved.

YOUNG PRESIDENTS ORGANISATION

During the season the club was approached by a person who had attended the building to give blood at one of the Red Cross blood weeks run here every month. They wanted to hire the club for the Christmas Party of the Young Presidents Organisation and it grew into a packed half day of events run by the members of our club.

The Young Presidents' Organisation (YPO) is an organisation for high profile members of the business community. To become a member you must be under 45 years of age. You must be either the President, Chairman of the Board, Chief Executive Officer, Managing Director, Managing Partner or Publisher, or equivalent of any of the above. You must meet two of these requirements to be accepted:

- Must have at least 50 full time employees or the total compensation for all employees excluding the member must exceed US\$1,000,000.
- The corporation of the member must have sales exceeding US\$8,000,000 or if a financial institution it must have US\$160,000,000 in assets or the corporation must have net assets before depreciation of at least US\$10,000,000

The party was for 100 adults and about the same number of children. It is free for the members and has been held at all sorts of venues. Some months of planning went into the party which turned into our club members providing entertainment and surf lifesaving experiences for about 100 kids aged from babies up to 17 year olds. I and Function Manager Erin Quinn had many meetings with the organisers building rapport and demonstrating our ability to conduct the sort of event that would satisfy their members, until it suddenly dawned on me that I would be overseas when the event was planned to be held. Thankfully Erin, Phil Thomas and Marty Quinn, along with Cam 'Santa' Wyllie and about 30 other club members made sure the day was a success.

The YPO members expressed that the event was the best ever Christmas Party they have ever attended and in addition to the almost \$6,000 they paid for the day they donated a stainless steel BBQ worth about \$1,000 to the club. It is interesting to reflect on the following received from a club member who helped on the day about the day:

The club's reputation for providing hard working, happy and efficient volunteers was very evident again on Sunday. I had a look around the bedraggled faces sipping on a well earned beverage late in the afternoon and it dawned on me just how much I get out of surf-lifesaving and particularly the Dee Why club. I think the swan is such an apt motif for the club. The YPO people look out from the balcony to see boards, surfboards, beach flags, tug a war,

IRBs and oceans of orange vested people smoothly negotiating the torrid conditions all the while oblivious to the 'feet below the surface' thrashing manically to power the machine on! There is always such good spirit when we get involved in these events and having been involved in the movement since 1968, I have never seen any other club come close to the efficiency, effectiveness and camaraderie that is intrinsic to Dee Why's ethos.

YPO members who attended the event have already booked further events at the club.

SYDNEY MORNING HERALD SUN RUN

Once again about 130 club members were called on to assist with the running of the fourth Sydney Morning Herald Sun Run part of the Cole Classic weekend. This year we had wonderful sunny conditions and about 7,000 runners/walkers. Again our club members excelled in their attitude and willingness to take on rolls that don't usually come their way. An example of their ingenuity is provided by the following; with a small change to include a loop that made the run 10kms one of our intrepid water station groups were given directions to the appointed position, with neither of us thinking it is still dark until just before the race, and their tables etc. were in the middle of a grassed area beside North Curl Curl lagoon about 50 metres or more from any light source. Needless to say their "adventures in deepest, darkest North Curl Curl" was handled with the usual Dee Why SLSC volunteer aplomb.

It would appear that even though Fairfax Events are rationalising all their events the Sydney Morning Herald Sun Run will survive.

CLUBHOUSE

Since the retrofit of our clubhouse by Ausgrid we have certainly been benefitting from reduced electricity usage, for example in January 2013 we used 2,900 kilowatt hours of electricity and in January 2014 only 1,500 kilowatt hours and of course this transfers into lower payments although the introduction of various taxes has reduced the benefit somewhat.

Having dramatically increased the hiring of our clubhouse for various community and corporate functions we have continued the improvement in services and devices we provide which allows us to receive a greater return on our investment. During the season member Roger Jacobs and his company worked with Emma Jeffcoat father's business in installing a projector and microphone wireless system including Wi-Fi for additional hire. In all over \$15,000 of goods and labour were provided by both Roger and AJ Jeffcoat at a cost of just over \$5,000 to the club. To both of them a big thank you for your very generous assistance.

Along with these improvements we have now installed blinds on some of the eastern windows to reduce the impact of external light and shutters on the western windows to improve noise abatement.

I would hope that the incoming Management Committee continues with the improvement and

maintenance of the Swan Lounge and the Northern room to continue to increase this welcome income stream to support and resource the core operation of lifesaving on the beach. I would like to thank Erin White, who took over the Function Managers role in August 2013, for continuing and enhancing the work commenced by Bec Marshall soon after I assumed the role of President.

During the season the Council called for tenders to lease out the old boatshed. While I defended the club use of the building against the misinformation disseminated by Council, even resorting to lodging a complaint with the NSW Ombudsman, it was to no avail and as I write this report work is currently underway to transform the property into a café. What was particularly disappointing about this matter was the lack of interest, bar a couple of the cafes in The Strand, from the restaurants and cafes along the beach front in stopping this development.

However as a result of this move by Council the club was inundated by commercial interests, after viewing the opportunity on offer from Council, ranging from a seven day coffee/cake/sandwich outlet using the existing BBQ area, using the northern room on Saturday and Sunday mornings for breakfast, using the Swan Lounge for breakfasts from early morning to mid-afternoon on Saturday and Sunday, to turning the Swan Lounge into a restaurant on the weekends, turning the old committee room into a kiosk seven days a week and the northern room into a bar.

Some of these proposers had experience working with Warringah Council and others had novel ways of dealing with Council reluctance to see their point of view in them adding to the amenity of the neighbourhood. None of them understood how the surf club and its building sit within the Plans of Management and with Warringah Council regarding commercial activities. Any fruitful discussion was curtailed when Council issued their Draft Proposed Community Facilities and Assets Subsidy Policy which has determined that surf clubs will be charged rent.

QUALITY CLUBS PROGRAM

We were the first club on the Sydney Northern Beaches to be awarded Bronze status in the SLSNSW Quality Clubs Program.

The Quality Clubs Program is a tool for clubs to utilise for reviewing their current activities and ensure best practice is being achieved in all areas of club operations and management.

This includes governance, finance, member development, education, lifesaving and training. There are three levels to work through – Bronze, Silver and Gold.

Surf Life Saving NSW President, Tony Haven, praised the club for following the program which helps surf clubs put in place more integrated and professional systems to run their club. "This achievement highlights the hard work, dedication and motivation the members of Dee Why SLSC have in creating stronger clubs and safer beaches within their community and

hopefully we will continue to see more and more clubs continuing to embrace the program."

Of course achievements of this nature do not happen by chance and to Rowena Clarke, Ben Davies, Dave Lang and I am sure others thank you for the time and effort put into achieving this milestone for the club.

GRANTS

I have continually undertaken a program of sourcing and applying for grants from all levels of Government and the private philanthropic sector of the community. We have had success again from the NSW State Government with three grants from the Community Building Partnership Grants Program 2013 with \$20,000 for the upgrade of the gym, a kitchenette in the northern room to make it self-sufficient when offering it for hire and a speaker system in the ceiling of the Betty Barry room to enhance our training facilities.

SURF SPORTS

Again we had a season with lots of surf sport activity right across the board with again a successful Branch Masters and Open competition along with a vastly improved Nipper participation and results which augers well for our position in the Branch Handicap Point score.

The highlight of the season was again at the Australian Championships held in Perth. We had a small touring team of 14 people and we came home with two Gold medals. Our first Gold was achieved by Madison Quinn in the Open Female Short Board Championship of Australia and this was followed a few days later with our second Gold by Emma Jeffcoat in the U/19 2km Beach Run Championship of Australia. This was Emma's third in a row success in this event and she remains the current Australian and World Champion. Emma also made several other finals for a successful championship. To provide some context North Burleigh went to the championships with a female team that was larger than our team and a total team of about 80 and came home with five gold medals, a couple of silvers and a bronze. And two of those medals were in one race so not a bad strike rate by our team.

SPONSORS

Previously I recognised the new partnership with Riley and Sons and Riverina Milk which I hope will endure as long as many of our other sponsors.

Our long association with Dee Why RSL continues to flourish and again I attended the Dee Why RSL Sub-branch march to the cenotaph at Dee Why Beach and laid a book, as well as the dawn service at the Dee Why RSL club where I laid our Centenary publication. All the books are distributed to local schools which make it ideal for our book to be exposed to a new audience each year.

With 2015 being the centenary of the landing at Gallipoli and the birth of the Anzac legend I have been in discussion with the Dee Why RSL, Warringah Council and our local Federal Member the Hon. Bronwyn Bishop about the role we may play in recognising this Australian milestone. As we get closer

all will be revealed, however, I am certain it will be an event not to be missed.

The Dee Why RSL are now sponsors of our patrol area with signage on the patrol trailer and a banner on the southern end of the building announcing their sponsorship and also used for promoting events at the Dee Why RSL club.

The Dee Why Grand Shopping Centre has again been a great supporter of our IRB section and along with another of our new sponsors, Grove Building Group, we were able to purchase a new IRB this season. This is in addition to their sponsorship of the Nippers and senior competition singlets now required by SLSA. We were able to return their support in a meaningful manner when Vaughan Williams, Jack-Henry Bryant, Adam Hockley, Grace Bryant and I conducted three workshops for the shoppers at the Dee Why Grand Shopping Centre on resuscitation and other lifesaving methods. They were conducted over one morning and focussed on babies, children and adults and provoked a lot of interest from those that attended.

Raine and Horne Dee Why and Collaroy continued their long association looking after our Nipper water safety with rash vests and our trainers and candidates for the Surf Rescue Certificate and Bronze Medallion with identification shirts and providing the manuals needed to undertake their studies.

Bennett Boards continue their sponsorship of our Bennett Craft Carnival and support of our Ocean Ski Race however their true demonstration of our partnership occurred in Perth during the Australian Championships. Emma Jeffcoat was in the semi-final of the U/19 Ironwoman event and at the completion of the ski leg her \$600 paddle was in two pieces. With only about 20 minutes before her final Greg Bennett immediately provided a new paddle for Emma to use at no cost. While I am sure that Greg would be benevolent to any member of surf lifesaving in need it certainly assisted that we had a close relationship.

Mason & Brophy continued their very valuable sponsorship of our first aid room which was put to very good use this season with many first aid cases however we were lucky this season with very little bluebottles and seaweed on Dee Why Beach.

Chill Bar again assisted in keeping our IRB motors up

to scratch and in working order so that we were able to be operational all season long as well as after hours. They also kept half the club operational with coffee each weekend.

The Big Brother Movement continued their long partnership and again supported the Nipper Development Camp in January with participation from the members from Orange.

Wavescape Orthodontics supported our BBQ area again this year with an even a further connection when Dr Riaan Foot, who heads up the practice, completed his Bronze Medallion with the club.

Deck again provided our touring team clothing and has agreed to a long term sponsorship to do the same for the next ten years. We ordered additional shirts for those competing for the club in the World Championships in Montpellier later this year.

We have a close relationship with Brookvale Rotary who conducts the Pub2Pub event each year and this year our involvement in that event grew with many more of our members involved. This event continues to grow and we are well recognised for our contribution over the 20 years of the event.

THE FUTURE

The future is not as assured as it should be for ours and all other Warringah clubs in particular as it has been in past years.

Surf Life Saving has been an iconic 'brand' in Australia for many years however with over 25% of the Australia population being born overseas with little or no understanding of the role of volunteers, after too much exposure to shows like Baywatch, our place in society is under threat. Warringah Council in particular have taken a view that the top floors of surf club buildings would make ideal restaurants with all the income being returned to Council and the surf clubs would use the ground floor for their activities.

As previously written in this report during the year Council introduced a Draft Community Facilities and Asset Subsidy policy which in plain terms imposes rent on all buildings under the control of Council. The Council contends that this was introduced because of the number of community groups that are looking at using community buildings. After submissions from many interested people, including one from me, Council called a meeting where it claimed there was a lot of misunderstanding about the application of rent. I am unsure how there is misunderstanding when there is no rent now and Council wishes to impose rent.

An example was given of an organisation that agreed to a very low rent, but in fact had paid no rent, but was going to refurbish their building and then rent it out to commercial operations. While I can see the error of their ways, others who abide by the conditions of their lease etc should not be penalised for others' misdemeanours.

In correspondence with the Mayor he wrote that there were very worthy charities doing much needed social work within Warringah's LGA and were paying

significant rent to Council which he claimed was unfair. Here I agree with the Mayor and it is within his and Council's power to not charge them any rent and I feel certain that the community would not see it as corrupt behaviour. It was interesting to note that at the meeting held with Council other sporting body representatives remarked that they were surprised that the surf clubs were included considering the vital community service their members provide. The Mayor argued that there are many organisations wanting to use the community buildings in Warringah however he has never asked any surf club if there were opportunities to accommodate those groups, he also advised that the community wanted this to happen. Staff on the other hand advised that the community were unaware of the existence of the draft policy which hardly supports the need to implement the policy.

Other changes that have an impact on the operations of the clubs in their current guise are commercial activities being conducted by other levels of the Association. For instance this year SLSNSW won a contract to provide water safety at Wet 'n Wild Sydney and several of our members were contracted to provide water safety and also assist with running a Nippers program at the site. While this is great for SLSNSW and our members, who were paid for their time, it depleted our available members for patrol and while in past years judicial action could be taken against members who miss patrols or if their substitute fails to attend it is not that easy today with many other activities available to members. Sadly the notion of providing volunteer patrol hours when needed now competes with many other social and domestic activities. It also impacted upon our water safety for our events which may be a bigger issue if the club swim continues.

While I acknowledge that we want all levels of our Association to be successful it is not satisfactory that they seek programs from which to benefit, with no input from clubs, when there is a direct impact felt at the club level.

Through recent deaths at the Australian Championships and members of North Narrabeen on a club activity there are now many new safety requirements required in general lifesaving and specifically in competition. We have already seen the introduction of fluoro safety vests for all those that enter the water. In concert with this there have been alterations to the lifesaving clothing worn for specific tasks while on patrol i.e. when crewing an IRB you can no longer wear a patrol shirt but rather a patrol rash vest or wetsuit.

In October 2013 it became compulsory for patients in IRB training and IRB competition to wear an approved helmet and in coming months it will be compulsory for IRB crew to wear personal flotation devices when on patrol as well as in competition. Currently under testing but slated for future implementation is the use of helmets in surf boats. All of these items are creating a serious cost to clubs and while in some circumstances they may well be justified there are many instances when they could be considered dangerous.

Administration Reports

With the difficulty of attracting sponsorship and being able to fund and properly resource our members it is becoming more difficult each year and it is taking up more time for members of committees rather than concentrating on the core disciplines.

On a positive note, through Peter Hatfield's progressive thinking, our ski event insisted on participants carrying a waterproof flare for an emergency situation. This was adopted by all other approved Ocean Ski series races and proved to be fortuitous when in the 20 Beaches event later in the season a competitor became disorientated out to sea due to the conditions and released her flare which was seen by Tim Jacobs who went to her assistance thus throwing away his chance to continue his outstanding success at ocean paddling. To their credit the other competitors allowed Tim to be credited with the same time as the winners. Once again Dee Why SLSC members have added to a long list of firsts adopted by the Association.

CONCLUSION

With the number of initiatives completed prior to the commencement of this season the club was on a sound footing to take full advantage of any opportunities that may come their way, we did not sit on our success but continued to strive for improvement and seek out ways to be smarter in the way we operate.

Of course this has seen the whole club working together to progress however the lead comes from the Management Committee. To all those people who, over the last four years, have offered themselves to take on extra responsibilities and accountability thank you for an excellent job and take pride in your achievements and the part you played in making the club so successful.

In past years I have recorded my thanks to those members of the current Management Committee so to my **Deputy President** Marty Quinn, **Secretary** Sue Cheney, **Treasurer** Dave Lang, **Club Captain** Ben Davies and **Junior Development Officer** Warren Hannam. Of course without the rest of the Management Committee our jobs would be so much more difficult so to **Chief Instructor** Matt Molinia, **Assistant Chief Instructor** Vaughan Williams, **Registrar** Kerryn Chad, **Vice Captains** Rowena Clarke, Peter Firminger, Jack-Henry Bryant, Nicola Quinn and Greg Punch, **Competition Manager** Phil Thomas, **Boat Captain** Tom Wilson, **IRB Captain** Dave Spink, **Board and Ski Captain** Pete Hatfield, **Social Co-ordinator** Gary Yabsley, **Cadet Co-ordinator** Roger Jacobs, **Facilities (Building) Manager** Grant Marshall, **First Aid Officer** Seb Kadziela, **Nipper (Parent) Representatives** Dannealle Hannam and Roger Jacobs, **Youth Representative** Adam Hockley and Jennifer Lang, **Licencee** Peter Greenow, **Radio Officer** Ross Gammidge and **Head Coach** Marty Quinn thank you all for your contribution and support in the running the club.

Of course assisting these people in their roles are a number of people such as our BBQ Co-ordinator Dannealle Hannam, Uniform Shop Manager Janine Portelli, our Club Coach Scott Mortimer, and our BBQ

King and Queen Ivor Rees and Mary Gason among many others who have assisted so much over the past season.

However in many organisations some people shine continually and take on more than their position description requires so to Martin Quinn, Sue Cheney, Grant Marshall, Matt Molinia, Peter Hatfield, Roger Jacobs, Phil Thomas, Gary Yabsley and the most constant for the last 15 years Dave Lang, Bec Marshall and Erin White thank you for your outstanding contribution over my four years leading this club.

It is my belief that over the past four years I have added significantly to the resources for all the members, the club building and to the financial security of the club through partnerships and events. When I came into the position there were many things that needed to be achieved to secure our future and as I will detail at the AGM all of those and more has been accomplished.

It was most pleasing to hear from several long term members in my early months as President that there was now a real buzz about the place as things were happening and also to receive an email congratulating me and others on following through on the matters I considered important for the future of the club that I highlighted prior to my election and that had been commenced and actually completing them rather than seeking votes with grandiose plans and then not following through.

This was only matched by the many emails I received when I announced my intention not to seek re-election thanking me for the manner in which I had lead the club.

Of course to even open the doors to provide our unique service we need the assistance of our many partners so to the Branch who certainly has a role to play in the life of the Dee Why SLSC and to President David Murray, CEO Steve McInnes and the rest of the Branch Executive I thank you for your support of the Club and to the staff of the Branch thank you for all the assistance you provided to myself and other Club members on so many occasions.

Overarching all of our activities is the very important role of our Council. To Warringah Council and Mayor Michael Reagan and CEO Rik Hart and all of the Councillors and staff thank you for providing valuable assistance in maintaining our clubhouse.

To the Branch sponsors Ausgrid Australia, Coca-Cola AMATIL, Streets Ice Cream, DHL, Westpac and Telstra thank you for providing the funding to keep the Branch operating and allowing them to provide the services they do to the Club.

As usual when one leaves a position prior to their planned exit there are a number of possibly pet projects or matters that one would like to see at least discussed. These are usually matters that may well have a divergence of opinion within the club so left until that time when one may not necessarily be reliant on the vote of all members.

Of course I do have some pet projects which I place before the club and the incoming Committee to at

least discuss and if necessary abandon but hopefully prepare for implementation by way of vote at a Special General Meeting prior to a future AGM.

We currently have a rule that only one Life Member may be elected per annum. While this may have been a rule supported by sound evidence many years ago the awarding of Life Membership should never be seen as a popularity contest which, if two nominations are received, it may become due to the nature of the make-up of the Management Committee. That Committee is progressively being made up of members without a long history of involvement in the Club as the Club evolves. That a worthy member may miss out on Life Membership because of a ballot based on only the personal preferences of a member of the Management Committee, as dictated by our rules, would appear to me to be failing in the process of proper recognition of a member's contribution.

We have in place a process whereby the Club Life Membership Committee assesses any nomination for suitability against the criteria and it is my belief that should all those nominations received within the correct timeframe meets the criteria then they should all be sent to the AGM for decision.

While on Life Membership we also have a rule that only Bronze Medallion holders are able to be nominated for Life Membership. Again when this rule was devised there was probably strong reasoning to have it included in our rules as we also had at that time a Ladies Auxiliary where I understand a female could become a Life Member of that body but not the surf club.

While in the recent past we have recognised female service by awarding a Distinguished Service honour it appears to me that there are several female members who over the past thirty years in the case of Judy Pitt and over the last nearly twenty years in the case of Sue Cheney have exceeded the criteria for that award. I am sure there was never a time contemplated by our preceding rule developers when females would make such a sustained and conspicuous contribution to the club and maybe it is time that we considered their contribution in light of the criteria for Life Membership.

Now if that hasn't got the blood boiling of some of our members how about we consider the design of our club cap? For those of us that attend carnivals and are not Team Managers or handlers who are able to be closer to the event it has become almost impossible to distinguish our club cap when it is wet. Added to the introduction of every competitor wearing a pink fluoro vest thus reducing the ability to identify competitors by their club costume; and possibly the type of material that is now used in the manufacture of caps, when wet we are indistinguishable from clubs like Terrigal as our cap becomes 'solid' blue even when viewed with binoculars.

The solution to this issue is not something that I am able to provide however research could be conducted with cap manufacturers to determine a viable alternative design combination to maximise the distinguishability when wet.

Lastly, with the new northern room having been in operation for three years now it would be appropriate

to consider naming the room. Some suggestions have been the Life Members room, the Nelson Chad room and I am sure that there are others that would be suitable candidates to recognise the contribution made by a member(s) to reflect the heritage of the club. Like the Swan Lounge I believe it should be free of club memorabilia so as to enhance it as a room for hire which it is currently gaining popularity among corporates and other community groups.

So four things for the membership to discuss, consider, reject or research. I may possibly have committed public lunacy here however I believe that if we do not search out alternative ways of doing things, continue our proud tradition of being first with so many commonplace Association practices and at least discuss matters that initially may look improbable then we will be standing still and that is not the club our founders formed over 100 years ago.

In thinking of a conclusion to my report I find it very hard to go past the words I used to conclude my speech at the Centenary Dinner in 2012:

The people that need to be thanked are those that met on Dee Why beach on the 12th October 1912 to elect the first Committee of President J H Rose, Honorary Secretary F C Bauer, Honorary Treasurer M Mahony and Club Captain H Bloomfield.

Fifty years ago E J Thomas concluded the Drowning Don't Die with "There are many more stories of Dee Why and of the men who passed through the club's portals; incidents and characters. They have bequeathed a legend from the club's first 50 years, and now, as the club stands on the threshold of further years of service and progress, more incidents and more characters will make a mark on the future that lies ahead. The year of the club's centenary should, indeed, be a noteworthy epoch".

"Those early members left a heritage, exemplified over the intervening years, which has placed the club in the proud position it holds today".

I hope that in my four years as President I have continued the heritage that has been exemplified over the intervening years and that I leave the role with the club in a proud position?

It has been an honour and a privilege to have led this club and I wish it well into the next century of its existence.

Treasurer's Report

Trust Funds

Since 1975 when the late Frank Conroy established an anonymous donor fund, the club has been the beneficiary of a number of bequests. Committees of the day have nominated these funds outside of general income either by virtue of conditions attached or a desire to provide for the long term future of the club.

Frank Conroy Scholarship

At the time of his initial donation, Frank expressed the wish that the funds be established to help junior members improve their competitive abilities. To date, grants have been made to junior members to assist in subsidising their costs on professional instruction. In his will Frank hoped, without binding the club, that the funds should continue in this vein. To ensure that Frank's scholarship continues to support junior members, the committee decided to put some restraints on the monies. It was decided:

- Only the annual interest accrued on the capital be allocated for assistance
- Candidates are chosen through selection criteria laid down by the junior and senior club committees.

James MacLachlan Fund

Jim MacLachlan was an associate member of the club from 1955 who on his death in 1981 provided for us as a beneficiary in his estate. No specific conditions were attached to the grant. The funds have been invested and the income has been applied at certain times to defray costs of the club patrol efficiency competition.

Betty Barry Memorial Scholarship Fund

The Betty Barry fund was established by the then Ladies Auxiliary to remember the contribution of their late President and Life Member. The club now administers the fund in similar terms and conditions to the Frank Conroy Scholarship.

1 Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements cover Dee Why Surf Lifesaving Club Incorporated as an individual entity. Dee Why Surf Lifesaving Club Incorporated is an association incorporated in NSW under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 and the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations) and the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 and the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991. The association is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the IASB. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the members of the committee.

Accounting Policies

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Financial Instruments

Initial Recognition and Measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the association commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (i.e. trade date accounting adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transactions costs except where the instrument is classified 'at fair value through profit or loss', in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately.

Accounts Receivable and Other Receivables

Accounts receivable are recognised initially at the transaction price (i.e. cost) and are subsequently measured at cost less provision for impairment. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the carrying amount of accounts receivable and other receivables are reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that the amounts are not recoverable. If so, an impairment loss is recognised immediately in statement of comprehensive income.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the entity and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liabilities at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association that remain unpaid.

Accounts payable are recognised at their transaction price. Accounts payable are obligations on the basis of normal credit terms.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

This season has been a safe and productive year for the Club due, in large part, to the five motors and four fully operational IRBs, providing water safety for nippers, patrols, training and events. Our Instructors have also been able to run driver and crew training simultaneously using a boat for each course, thereby allowing more water time for each candidate.

In early September we commenced our IRB crew and driver training and during the season completed one driver and three crew courses with everyone passing with flying colours. This year for the first time we have new IRB crew members from Orange.

As with any good training program we are refining our courses with great success. As a new initiative we are now running the driver and crew courses together. The new crew candidates benefit from the drivers' experience. Secondly we introduced a more flexible training program. During the season our IRB instructors were on the water nearly every Sunday morning. This enabled the crew and drivers to get the necessary experience throughout the year to achieve their awards. Another excellent effort from our experienced team of Instructors made this possible.

The Dee Why Race Team (The Black Ducks) are still alive. Next year, with a little promotion and the new training programs, we hope to expand the team. The team welcomes all drivers and crew and encourages them to join us every Sunday morning at 7am for training; its great fun!!

We'd like to thank Matt Molinia (Active Automotive), Ron Tyson, Darren Armitage, our new mechanic Matt, Grove Building and Dee Why RSL for their continued support.

On the patrolling side, the IRB has definitely proved its worthiness at Dee Why Beach. Countless rescues and water safety initiatives have identified what an essential piece of rescue equipment it is.

On the water safety side, our boats were very busy at the Ski Marathon, the 2km swim and every Sunday

at Nippers. Our crews did everything they could to maintain a strong culture of safety. We are grateful to the drivers and crewpersons who helped on these days and made these events possible.

We have finally got the IRB shed in order. With custom IRB stacking, instant air-filling capabilities, fire safety and security now under control, this is an IRB shed which other clubs envy. Also our equipment is renewed when needed.

Training and Education Report

This season the education department set its focus on working in conjunction with the patrol group by updating and maintaining the skill levels of the existing patrolling members, along with bringing in new and dedicated members in order to achieve compliance.

With an era of focus on safety upon us all candidates were required to wear a fluorescent pink rash vest and Dee Why club cap to all training sessions in the water. I believe this to be a great move forward. It enabled the patrols to easily identify groups that were training to do rescues and enabled the trainers to keep track of their squad more efficiently in the water.

Proficiencies:

It was brought to my attention prior to the start of the season that we had a shortfall of proficient members who had current higher awards such as ARTC, IRB Driver and Crew, Spinal Management etc. Current members who held these awards which had recently expired or due for renewal were targeted. Proficiencies were run very early in the season for these awards in order to maintain a suitable level of compliance on the beach for the start of the season.

Organising and running Bronze and SRC proficiencies for 15 patrolling groups is a challenge in itself. This season 3 Dry Land and 6 Water proficiencies were scheduled and advertised at the start of the season. In order to accommodate the diverse expectations of the group, a variety of days and time slots were offered including holding proficiencies during patrol changeover times and even running the proficiency as a part of Sunday morning events. The major update to the proficiency system was that the patrolling members were asked to book in for the proficiency session so that we could better manage the numbers and the assessors required. Our small pool of assessors consisting of Adrienne Lowe, Steve Haggett, Vivienne Creswell, Allen Lakeman, Greg Punch, Dave Spink and Darren Armitage set themselves to this new format and put in the time to make it run smoothly. This enabled the members to turn up at a set time and not have to wait around for their assessment. It worked well for many of the more diligent members but will take some getting used to for the less organised members.

Courses:

Our first course of the season as usual was the SRC course aimed at the U14 Nippers, the future of our club's patrolling base. They were joined by a contingent from Orange who have been participating in the Junior Development Camp for several years and training up for this award. This was successfully run and completed over the October long weekend with all candidates performing very well. The other SRC members that were unable to attend that weekend were put through a course over several weekends, still achieving the award but over a much longer time span.

With a move away from large and diverse bronze groups, three Bronze courses were run in the first half of the season in a condensed squad format. With no more than 6 candidates per trainer the squads were split up into new members, Nipper Parents and a fast track course for those with experience and SRC members upgrading to a Bronze level. The format worked very well and the groups bonded due to their like interests and common level of knowledge or lack of knowledge bringing them together. Unfortunately a course was not run in the new year due to lack of numbers and other external commitments of those wishing to participate. Hopefully next season we can schedule that course earlier and attract more interest. The majority of the candidates that successfully completed their bronze showed an interest and diligence in their patrolling and also went on to do other courses or showed an interest in doing higher awards.



Several of our current members stepped up to complete much needed higher awards. Eleven of our members acquired their Silver Medallion Basic Beach Management award in order to relieve some pressure on patrolling requirements and current Patrol Captains.

Steve Haggett, using patrol competition and champion lifesaver as an additional incentive, along with the need for qualified members on patrol, encouraged a group of members to step up their life saving skills and attain their Advanced Resuscitation Techniques (ARTC) Award.

In excess of 30 members attained for the first time or updated their Senior First Aid award. This was the only award held for some of these members but enabled them to patrol on the beach and fill the patrolling requirements.

Two of our members, Dave Spink and Darren Armitage, went through the arduous process of attaining their Rescue Water Craft awards (RWC) and now in addition to their rostered patrols also patrol an area containing several beaches on a jet ski.

After several seasons as a probationary trainer Ron Tyson finally ticked all the boxes and attained his IRB trainers award and joined the team of diligent IRB trainers, Dave Spink, Darren Armitage and

Matt Molinia. Three IRB Crew and an IRB drivers course were run this season increasing our pool of drivers and crews by 19. A special mention to John and Amber Collins from Orange in country NSW who attained their Bronze Medallion last season and successfully completed their crew certificate this season. The courses were run efficiently and in some of the most testing conditions any IRB driver or crew will ever have to go out in. The candidates stepped up to the challenges put in front of them and hence by the end of the course were comfortable in the boat in all conditions.

The way forward:

In order to fulfil our primary objective of maintaining fully compliant patrols on the beach I believe that we need to continue on the current path of training Bronze groups in smaller squads and putting these squads together with candidates at a similar skill levels. We also need to identify those patrolling members who are interested in, or should be encouraged to attain higher awards, and lead them to a pathway to fulfil this. Change is always difficult and there is always resistance but now that we have broken the ice with a more structured format of running proficiencies, next season should run much more smoothly for the members.

Two of our younger members Jack-Henry Bryant and Adam Hockley are assisting with courses with a view to becoming qualified trainers. We will need to target additional members next season who have an ability to impart knowledge onto others to take the step and become trainers and share the load around. We will also be looking for new assessors to step up in order to assist with the smooth running of proficiencies.

The program is designed to help Cadets bridge that gap with the added bonus of introducing them to the Olympic Sport of Kayaking. Sydney Northern Beaches Kayak Club will be hosting this program we look forward to building a strong future for our club through this arrangement.

Nipper Report by Warren Hannam

This season Nippers started with a whole lot of new challenges. Firstly we had to find a new Nipper Coordinator as Matt Molinia our previous Nipper Coordinator of many years moved into the role of Chief Instructor. So after many hours of discussion amongst club members I was nominated as the lucky candidate, but with the help of a fantastic Secretary and an energetic committee I survived my first season. Our second challenge was the surf conditions that proved to be unfavourable for the first half of the season. The swim cans were only set for the nippers to swim around once before Christmas and we only managed one club championship day instead of the usual four. I would like to personally thank the fantastic water safety team led by Cam Wyllie that had to be very creative with new ways to educate our Nippers due to the surf conditions.

All the Under 14 nippers took the first step into the senior club by successfully completing their Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC). The SRC course was held over the October long weekend when the water was cold and the conditions were very challenging. This year we had candidates that had been nippers since U6s, new members that had just joined the club and a few members from Orange. They all worked together and helped each other through the course and are now patrolling members of Dee Why Surf



Club. Courtney Campbell has even taken the next step and has decided to join me as an age manager next year with the Under 14 age group. This should be commended as it is great to see our kids giving back to the surf club not only as patrolling members but helping out with nippers.

This year all the Under 14's were interviewed by a panel of senior club members for the Junior Lifesaver of the Year. This hasn't been done in the past and I

believe it was a worthwhile process and would like to see this continue. The presentations by all candidates were excellent and a second round of interviews was required in order to split them. Our representatives were Charlotte Carr who joined Nippers in the Under 9's and Anthony Molinia who has been a Nipper since the Under 6's. 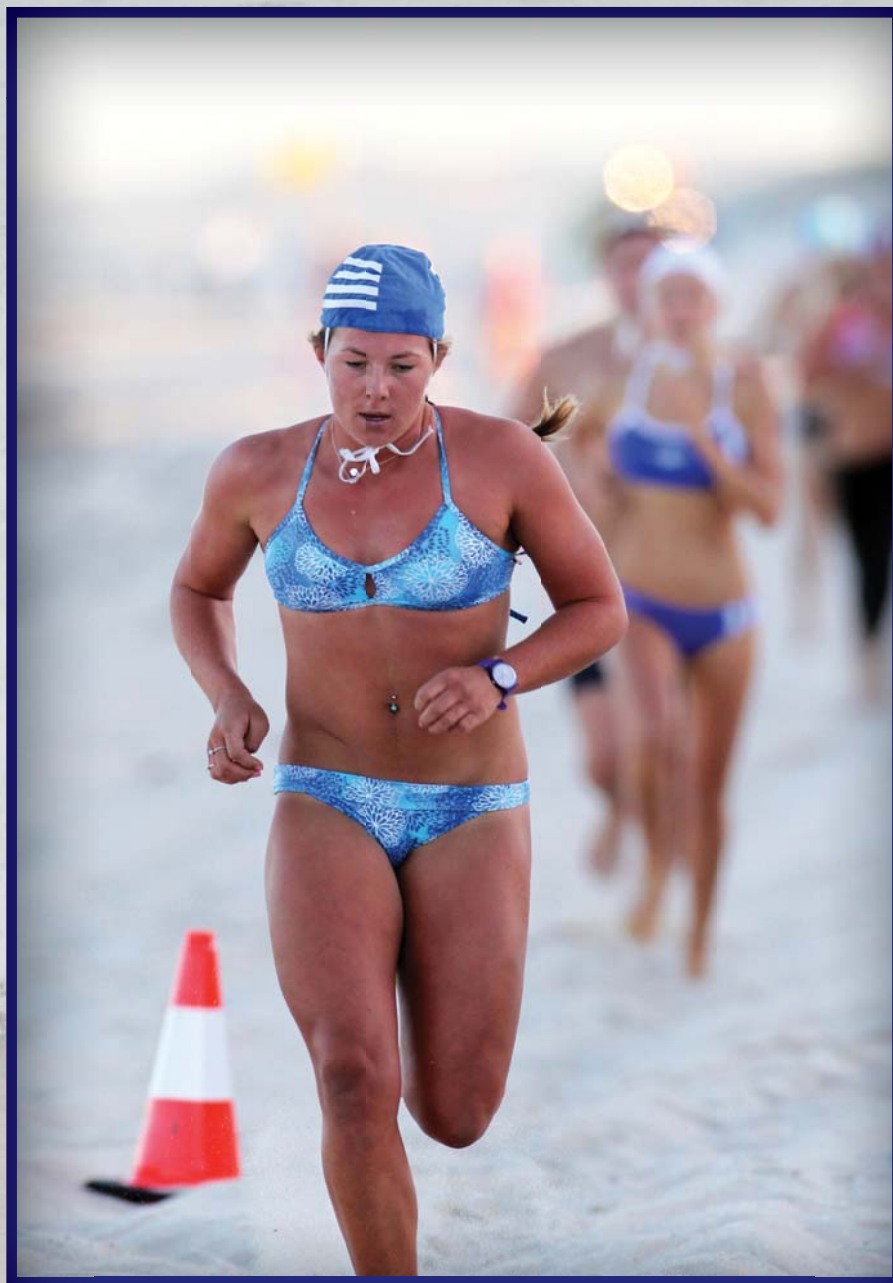
